#### Performance against the Highland Local Policing Plan 2014-2017

## Report by the Highland Local Policing Commander – Chief Superintendent Philip MacRae

#### Summary

This report provides an update to Members on the progress with reference to the objectives outlined in the Highland 2014-2017 Policing Plan.

#### 1. <u>Performance</u>

1.1 Crime in the Highland area has decreased over the past year; Recorded Class 1-5 Crimes have decreased from 5804 last year compared to 5741 this year to date which is a decrease of 1.09%.

The Performance in Highland remains strong with an overall detection rate of 61.71% (Class 1-5 Crimes).

Class 1 – Crimes of Violence: 2.27% reduction from the previous year (176 last year compared to 172 this year to date).

Class 2 – Sexual Crimes: 7.19% increase from the previous year (387 last year compared to 417 this year to date).

Class 3 – Crimes of Dishonesty: 2.64% increase from the previous year (2099 last year compared to 2156 this year to date).

Class 4 – Fire-Raising, Malicious Mischief: 3.27% decrease from the previous year (1436 last year compared to 1389 this year to date).

Class 5 – Other (Pro-Activity) Crimes: 5.8% decrease from the previous year (1706 last year compared to 1607 this year to date.)

A summary of the current performance against the 2014-17 Highland Local Policing Plan objectives is at **Appendix 1**. The period covered by the report is as at 31 December 2016 unless stated otherwise.

#### 2. <u>Policing Plan</u>

2.1 The 2014-17 Local Policing Plan is due for renewal this year; the Local Policing Plans are a statutory requirement derived from the Police and Fire Reform (Scotland) Act 2012 and demonstrate Police Scotland's legislative responsibility in the delivery of national, corporate and local outcomes. The community planning landscape and the development of the LOIPs differs throughout each local

authority area and as such this presents an opportunity to take a more flexible approach to the implementation of the Local Policing Plans. Scottish Government and COSLA are supportive of flexible implementation dates for the Local Policing Plans; in order to fully imbed the priorities within the LOIP in the Highland Local Policing Plan it is proposed to extend the current plan and have the new plan approved and in place by October 2017. This allows us a period of further community engagement and a full year's return from our Public Consultation Survey. Festive Drink & Drug Drive Campaign-The Festive Drink/Drug Drive Initiative 2016 ran between Friday 2 December 2016 and Friday 2 January 2017. This year's initiative focussed on offenders who were just over the drink drive limit and 'morning after' offenders. Across the Highland and Islands Division during the initiative, 879 negative tests were carried out. A total of 38 drivers were caught under the influence in the Division, of which 8 were detected between 0600 hours and 1000 hours. This represents an increase of 2.5% from the previous year.									
Trunk Road/Divisional Policing Units to conduct a targeted motorcycle campaign each Spring.	Operation Zenith will recommence at the end of April 2017 with a formal launch of the campaign anticipated at the beginning of April 2017, and will run for several months. The focus of the campaign continues to focus on improving rider behaviour particularly aimed at the contributory factors which result in riders being killed or seriously injured, raise awareness and enforcement of legislation when required. Out with the campaign, the Road Policing Unit continues to carry out regular motorcycle patrols throughout the Highland Division.

Licensed Premises Checks				9025		Working collectively and constructively with licensees, with robust enforcement when required we continue to work towards keeping people safe. During the reporting period, the Highlands and Islands Division conducted 21.07% of all licensed premises checks carried out in Scotland (2224 checks out of 10554 recorded checks). This correlates to a 5.7% reduction in violence, a 13.9% decrease in anti-social behaviour and a 20.1% decrease in drunkenness and disorderly conduct over the Festive season compared with		
Conduct a test purchasing operation within each of the Inspector led areas each year.	Image: Construction of the scheme consists of a fully briefed teenager (under 18 years of age) entering licensed premises under controlled conditions and in line with agreed guidelines to purchase alcohol. By taking part in these operations young volunteers are helping to protect their peers from potentially being a victim of or being involved in crime. They are effectively contributing to keeping friends, family and entire communities safe. During the last reporting period, six youths have been identified as potential candidates and the recruitment process continues. It is anticipated these youths will be ready to be

Substance Misuse Custody Initiative- This initiative was piloted in December 2016 with the aim and objective being to provide help/assistance/advice in respect of drug or alcohol addiction to people finding themselves held in custody over selected weekend periods through the year. This initiative is also being run by the Drug & Alcohol Recovery Service.         During the pilot, 17 individuals accepted a private, confidential consultation with a healthcare professional and as a result 12 individuals accepted onward referral to specialist support. As a result of this success of this trial, further work is being carried out with a view to running the trial for a longer period.

In the Tain area delivery to secondary school pupils of the 'Choices for Life', interactive drugs awareness presentation to each year group by Police Scotland Preventions and local School Liaison officers as well as Youth/drug Support workshops involving discussion groups with former addicts exploring the dangers of drug misuse were carried out.

This initiative ran for three weeks and during this time nearly 2000 members of the public were spoken to and given advice relating to online safety, party safety, home and business safety.
