## Highland Council – Inverness Rural Transport Information

Summary Profile Information:

- 1. Inverness Rural and Culloden area (Wards 13, 18, 20).
- 2. Most buses in the urban area and along the main routes are operated commercially, but there are also contract services on many routes into Inverness.
- 3. Overall spend in the whole of Inverness, including £101,000 on city routes, is £1,945,000.
  - 3.1. £1,118,000 (57%) is dedicated schools only transport
  - 3.2. £130,000 (7%) is dedicated public only transport
  - 3.3. £697,000 (36%) is public bus contracts also providing schools transport.
- 4. 11 providers are involved in delivering these services.
- 5. The school contracts support transport to 7 secondary school and 20 primary schools.
- 6. Significant public bus contracts include:
  - Aviemore Grantown Tomatin Inverness
  - Whitebridge Inverness
  - Foyers Inverness
  - Fort Augustus Inverness
  - Tomich Drumnadrochit Inverness
  - Tomich Beauly Inverness/Dingwall
  - Kiltarlity Inverness
  - Inverness Beauly Dingwall (evenings)
  - Inverness Ardersier (evenings)
  - Cromarty Inverness Croy (evenings)
- 7. Issues are:
  - Sustainability of contracts given budget pressures.
  - Most services are built around school transport needs.
  - Level of service required on more likely used routes.
  - Access to UHI from various locations.
  - Some off-peak commercial services (notably at Cannich) are dependent on school transport contracts.
  - Evening bus usage.
- 8. Savings target on this expenditure is £292,000.
- 9. It is intended to have new contracts in place on 1 January 2017. Some key steps to accomplish this is timescale are likely be:
  - 9.1. Member consultation
  - 9.2. Routes and Specifications development
  - 9.3. Community consultation period
  - 9.4. Supplier Briefings and Public Contracts Scotland tender/auction training

- 9.5. Tender phase
- 9.6. Highland Council Committee and Project Partner approvals
- 9.7. Award process
- 9.8. Contract implementation TUPE, communications to schools and parents, and other key stakeholders.
- 10. Highland Council also funds Ardersier, Petty, Croy and Culloden Moor Association (up to £4,415 annually); and South Loch Ness community transport projects up to £10,750.
