Suggested criteria for 'small settlement policy' for new Inverness Plan.

1

(Suitable for all settlements within the area.)

- single houses, not blocks
- recognition that rural housing is different for that suitable for suburbia no ribbon development, no blocks of two or more identical houses
- development should fit within the existing settlement pattern without sprawling into the surrounding countryside
- spacing between housing should follow existing traditional patterns
- rate of development should be gentle enough to be absorbed without changing the character of the settlement
- development should not place unreasonable strain on existing services, nor require large amounts of public expenditure on new infrastructure or services (eg roads, water, schools)

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
