1. Purpose/Executive Summary

1.1 This report provides an update on the performance framework for Children's Services.

2. Recommendations

- 2.1 Members are asked to:
 - i. Scrutinise and comment on both the performance information and the new reporting template at appendix 1.
 - ii. Note the information provided on quality improvement.

3.0 For Highlands Children 4 performance framework

- 3.1 Highland Council and NHS Highland have agreed a performance framework for children's services, as set out in *For Highlands Children 4*. This performance report is presented to this Committee as well as to NHS Highland.
- 3.2 All of the performance measures in the current framework have been allocated to *For Highlands Children 4* Improvement Groups.
- 3.3 A summary of the data including analysis of each measure is included at **Appendix 1**.
- 3.4 There is further detail available on those indicators associated with the Child Health Commission in the subsequent assurance report.

4.0 **Performance Data**

- 4.1 NHS Highland has advised that the technical issues for the Child Health Surveillance data have not yet been resolved. The People Committee has requested an update regarding this, which is that this matter is reported to be out of NHS Highland's control, as the next steps sit with NHS National Services Scotland. NHS Highland are seeking for the issues to be resolved, and state that this risk forms part of the wider work that is in progress, as the 'Child Public Health and Wellbeing Transformational Change system' is developed nationally. This new system will replace the current system.
- 4.2 Appendix 1 of this report has been restructured for Committee, to seek to enable members to better scrutinise the performance information that is provided. Detailed analysis of this information is provided regularly both within this performance report and within the accompanying Assurance report.
- 4.3 A number of members have indicated that they would wish to join specific Improvement Groups, where this data is considered.

4.4 Lifestyle Survey

The Highland Lifestyle Survey has been carried out with P7, S2 and S4 pupils every two years since 2009. It provides key findings for each year the survey is undertaken and also trend data over time.

- 4.5 The Survey provides local data relating to self-reported responses of P7, S2 and S4 pupils to questions relating to health and wellbeing across the following categories:
 - Young Carers
 - Food and Health
 - Physical Health
 - Mental Health and Wellbeing
 - Substance Use
 - Relationships and Bullying
 - School and Learning
- 4.6 In 2017, children in 20 Secondary Schools and 99 Primary Schools completed the survey. Ten Primary Schools were unable to complete it, as they had no P7 pupils enrolled at that time. The response rate was lower than in the past, and there are some obvious gaps in responses across some ASGs. It is therefore intended to

request that all schools participate in the 2019 survey, to ensure greater confidence in the data analysis.

- 4.7 Schools have been provided with feedback on the Survey results at authority, ASG and individual level where results allow. Information at school and ASG level will be used for internal monitoring and improvement work and will not be made public, but can easily be used by Head Teachers to monitor their own interventions and supports to pupils.
- 4.8 The analysis of the 2017 Highland Lifestyle Survey highlights the benefits of carrying out a Highland specific biennial exercise in addition to using national data to inform service improvement. Overall, the information supports the view that the great majority of children in Highland are happy, healthy, enjoy school and have good family and peer relationships. There are some areas of slippage and these will need to be explored further and targeted action taken forward. The results are important in contributing to planning children's services and will continue to inform the implementation of *For Highlands Children 4* through the work of the Improvement Groups.
- 4.9 Details of the performance data from the survey are included within the performance management updates at Appendix 1.

5.0 Quality improvement

- 5.1 All of the performance measures detailed within the performance management framework have been allocated to *For Highlands Children 4* Improvement Groups.
- 5.2 In recent years, the improvement groups have significantly enhanced their effectiveness by adopting a quality improvement model supported by Scottish Government funded improvement collaboratives. In addition, frontline staff and managers across a range of services are using the 'Model for Improvement' to accelerate change.
- 5.3 The national 'Children and Young People Improvement Collaborative' (CYPIC) continues to develop a method and culture for delivering improvement.
- 5.4 Our own Improvement Co-ordination Group has a key role in leading and driving forward this work. A series of quality Improvement learning networks have been established, and two 6 month learning programmes were undertaken last year. These programmes provided an opportunity for twenty participants to develop skills to support the use of improvement methodology and build capacity within services. The third quality improvement network commences in February 2018, with 22 participants.
- 5.5 Quality improvement underpins much of the improvement activity across the Northern Alliance. Working alongside the other authorities, Highland has identified five participants to undertake coaching training on the model for improvement. This training will take place throughout 2018 and enable participants to further develop skills and competencies to enable them to support others and further embed this approach across services for children in Highland.

6.0 Northern Alliance Regional Improvement Plan

- 6.1 Members are aware that all Regional Improvement Collaboratives were tasked by Government with finalising an Improvement Plan by January 2018.
- 6.2 Senior officers across the Northern Alliance have continued to work on this Plan, but the timeline for publication has now been revised. Education Scotland has indicated that a first draft is required in January, but that final submission will not be required until later in the year, providing the opportunity for significantly enhanced consultation.
- 6.3 The draft Regional Improvement Plan is due to be considered by Strategic Chairs later this month, and it is envisaged that it will be presented to Committees across the eight authorities during February and March.

7.0 Implications

- 7.1 There are a range of resource implications with regard to these performance indicators, but in most cases, performance can be addressed within current resources.
- 7.2 There are no new legal, equality, risk, climate change/carbon clever, rural or Gaelic implications arising from this report.
