**Report Title: Performance Report – Children's Services**

#### 1. **Purpose/Executive Summary**

1.1 This report provides an update on the performance framework for Children's Services.

## 3. For Highlands Children 4 performance framework

- 3.1 Highland Council and NHS Highland have agreed a performance framework for children's services, as set out in *For Highlands Children 4*. This performance report is presented to this Committee as well as to NHS Highland.
- 3.2 All of the performance measures in the current framework have been allocated to For Highlands Children 4 Improvement Groups.
- 3.3 A summary of the data is included at **Appendix 1.**
- 3.4 There is further detail available on those indicators associated with the Child Health Commission in the subsequent assurance report.
- 3.5 Commentary on new performance data which is either not on target or otherwise of note is detailed below.

### 4. Performance Data

- 4.1 In October 2017, NHS Highland reported that there was a national technical issue which affected the provision of data for measures related to health assessments for children at 6-8 weeks and 27-30 months, and that work was ongoing to resolve this issue. In addition, NHS Highland has agreed that they will provide data on a quarterly basis and, as a consequence, there is no new child health data for this report.
- 4.2 Performance measure 36 concerns the percentage of statutory health assessments that are completed for a child within 4 weeks of becoming Looked After. Progress continues to be made towards seeing children and young people for their initial health assessment within 4 weeks of notification, despite an increase in the number of children becoming Looked After in the past 6 months. A breakdown of the data shows improved performance with assessments for children under the age of five years. Between January and December 2016, 86% of children received their Health assessments, whereas, between January and September 2017 89.1% were assessed. This is significant given that early identification of health needs is crucial for children under five as they are more likely to move to adoption. Performance and the delivery model for school age assessments are under review by both the Looked After Children health improvement group and the school nurse review group.
- 4.3 Performance measure 37 relates to the percentage of health assessments for Looked after children who are accommodated, that are available for the initial child's plan meeting at six weeks. When considering the assessment of children placed directly out of Highland when they become Looked After, out of authority assessments are undertaken by the receiving NHS Board. The reduction in the number of health assessments available correlates with the number of children being placed directly outwith Highland. This causes a delay in the assessment process due to a lack of capacity within receiving NHS Boards to undertake the assessments within the timescales.

## 5. New performance measures

5.1 The performance framework for children's services, as set out in For Highlands Children 4, is designed to be dynamic, enabling changes to the performance measures throughout the lifetime of the plan. This enables the addition of new

- measures which reflect changes to national and local policy and strategy.
- 5.2 The 2017 National Improvement Framework and Improvement Plan brings the Scottish Government's vision for Scottish education together in a single, definitive document that sets out how it will secure educational improvement.
- 5.3 The National Improvement Framework and Improvement Plan is designed to align collective improvement activities across all partners in the education system to address key priorities. This includes closing the attainment gap between the most and least disadvantaged children.
- 5.4 In line with this key priority the following additional measures are proposed.
  - Reduce the attainment gap for primary literacy in p1, 4 and 7
  - Reduce the attainment gap for secondary literacy in S3
  - Reduce the attainment gap for primary numeracy in p1, 4 and 7
  - Reduce the attainment gap for secondary numeracy in S3
  - Reduce the attainment gap at SCQF 5
  - Reduce the attainment gap at SCQF 6
  - Reduce the attainment gap for primary attendance rates
  - Reduce the attainment gap for secondary attendance rates
  - Reduce the attainment gap for primary exclusion rates (rates per 1000 pupils)
  - Reduce the attainment gap for Secondary exclusion rates (rates per 1000 pupils)
  - The percentage of 16-19 year olds participating in education, training and employment is above the national average.
- 5.5 'Enhancing Learning and Teaching Through the Use of Digital Technology' is a national strategy that aims to ensure all learners and educators are able to benefit from digital technology in their education. This strategy aims to create the conditions to allow all of Scotland's educators, learners and parents to take full advantage of the opportunities offered by digital technology in order to raise attainment, ambition and opportunities for all.
- 5.6 The strategy sets out a series of national actions and local expectations structured around four essential and interrelated objectives:
  - Develop the skills and confidence of teachers
  - Improve access to digital technology for all learners
  - Ensure that digital technology is a central consideration in all areas of curriculum and assessment delivery

- Empower leaders of change to drive innovation and investment in digital technology for learning and teaching
- 5.7 In line with both this strategy and a service commitment to enhance learning and teaching through the use of digital technology the following additional measures are proposed:
  - The percentage of ASGs where one to one devices are deployed successfully increases.
  - The percentage of staff who feel they are confident in using ICT in the delivery of learning and teaching increases.
  - The percentage of pupils who feel they are confident in using ICT to support their learning increases.

# 6. Quality improvement

- 6.1 All of the performance measures detailed within the performance management framework have been allocated to For Highlands Children 4 Improvement Groups.
- 6.2 In recent years, the improvement groups have significantly enhanced their effectiveness by adopting a quality improvement model supported by Scottish Government funded improvement collaboratives. In addition, frontline staff and managers across a range of services are using the 'Model for Improvement' to accelerate change.
- 6.3 The National 'Children and Young People Improvement Collaborative' (CYPIC) continues to develop a method and culture for delivering improvement.
- 6.4 An annual two day National Learning event took place late in November 2017, involving more than 700 practitioners across Scotland, with 18 delegates attending from Highland. This provided an opportunity to showcase a range of improvement projects acknowledged by the collaborative as being outstanding.
- 6.5 Our Improvement Co-ordination Group has a key role in leading and driving forward this work. A series of Quality Improvement learning networks have been established, and a 6 month learning programme was undertaken earlier this year. The programme provided an opportunity for eight participants to develop skills to support the use of improvement methodology and build capacity within services. The second quality improvement learning network finishes this month, and has brought together twelve participants from across the Community Planning Partnership, working on a wide range of projects. The third quality improvement network commences in February 2018, with 22 participants identified.

## 7 Implications

- 7.1 **Resources** there are a range of implications with regard to these performance indicators but, in most cases, performance can be addressed within current resources.
- 7.2 There are no legal, community (equality, poverty, rural), risk, climate change/carbon clever, rural or Gaelic implications arising from this report.
