Report Title: Performance Report – Children's Services

Report By: Director of Care and Learning

1. Purpose/Executive Summary

1.1 This report provides an update on the performance framework for Children's Services.

2. Recommendations

- 2.1 Members are asked to:
 - i. Scrutinise and comment on the performance information.
 - ii. Note the information provided on quality improvement.

3. For Highlands Children 4 performance framework

- 3.1 Highland Council and NHS Highland have agreed a performance framework for children's services, as set out in *For Highlands Children 4*. This performance report is presented to this Committee as well as to NHS Highland.
- 3.2 All of the performance measures in the current framework have been allocated to For Highlands Children 4 Improvement Groups.
- 3.3 A summary of the data including analysis of each measure is included at Appendix 1.
- 3.4 There is further detail available on those indicators associated with the Child Health Commission in the subsequent assurance report.
- 3.5 Commentary on new performance data which is either not on target or otherwise of note is detailed below.

4. Performance Data

- 4.1 NHS Highland has advised that the technical issues for the Child Health Surveillance data have not yet been resolved. This matter is reported to be out of NHS Highland's control, as the next steps sit with NHS National Services Scotland. NHS Highland are seeking for the issues to be resolved, and state that this risk forms part of the wider work that is in progress, as the 'Child Public Health and Wellbeing Transformational Change system' is developed nationally. This new system will replace the current system.
- 4.2 Since April 2017, an additional review of infants aged between 13 and 15 months has been undertaken by Health Visitors. This report to committee has not previously included this data. This review is offered to all children. Examples of information collected include: development (social, behavioural, communication, gross motor, vision and hearing), physical measurements (height and weight) and diagnoses and concerns. Identification data such as name, address and GP are also checked and updated. The table below shows the percentage of children who have been reviewed within the period. The target will be to improve the percentage of reviews from the 2017 baseline and updates will be included for Members within this report.


4.3 Indicator 31 concerns waiting times for Allied Health Professional services to be within 18 weeks from referral to treatment. The baseline was established in 2014. The latest quarterly data is from August 2018. The table below provides updated additional detail on waiting times across each of the AHP disciplines.

- 4.4 Indicator 46 concerns the aspiration to reduce the number of Looked after children accommodated outwith Highland. This data is reported monthly. The baseline was established in 2016. The latest data is from August 2018, and there is a separate report on this issue at this meeting of the Committee.
- 4.5 The overall number of spot purchased placements has increased in the last 18 months due to an increased demand for placements. A suite of supported accommodation and two small-scale residential units have been developed. This has enabled 26 children to return to Highland, avoiding costs of £3.6M in 2017/18. However, a significant increase in the overall number of Looked after children in the last year, in-house placements often being full and the more complex needs of young people has necessitated more out of authority placements.
- 4.6 New placements have mainly been for young people with Additional Support Needs and challenging behaviour which couldn't be managed in our mainstream or specialist schools in Highland. In addition, there have been a significant number of young people in secure or step-down care. There are also young people in Children's Services residential care who are over 18 years old, have an Additional Support Need and require the support of Adult Services into their adulthood. The resulting lack of available residential beds makes it more difficult to return young people from out of authority.
- 4.7 Indicator 41 concerns the reduction in multiple exclusions. As reported annually, the data for multiple exclusions shows little variance over time. The table below shows that data relating to the total number of exclusions across Highland schools shows a similar pattern, with a small improvement in the total number of children excluded from Highland schools over the last six years. Focussed improvement activity is being undertaken to further analyse the data in order that more targeted intervention can be undertaken. The Exclusion policy was updated in 2016, and it is considered likely that the improvement data for the last reporting period reflects the impact that this has had.

4.8 Exclusion data for 2017-18 by stage is shown below. The pattern shown is consistent with the pattern shown over recent years and is helpful in determining where targeted improvement activity is undertaken.



5 Quality improvement

- 5.1 The Improvement Groups have adopted a quality improvement model, supported by Scottish Government funded improvement collaboratives. In addition, frontline staff and managers across a range of services are using this 'Model for Improvement' to accelerate change.
- 5.2 The National 'Children and Young People Improvement Collaborative' (CYPIC) continues to develop the method and culture for delivering improvement.
- 5.3 The National Improvement Collaborative has its annual National showcase event in Glasgow in November each year. This year, Highland has been invited to deliver in three separate arenas during the two day event. The Director of Care & Learning and NHS Highland's Chief Executive will also be making the keynote address.
- 5.4 Highland's Improvement Co-ordination Group has a key role in leading and driving forward this work. A series of quality Improvement learning networks have been

established and three 6 month learning programmes were undertaken last year. The programmes provided an opportunity for a total of twenty participants to develop skills to support the use of improvement methodology and build capacity within services. The fourth quality improvement network commences in November 2018 and is already fully subscribed.

6 Scottish Government: Appreciative Inquiry

- 6.1 The Scottish Government has initiated an 'appreciative inquiry' of all Integrated Children's Services Plans. This involves an analysis of the local plan, which is a statutory requirement within the Children & Young People (Scotland) Act 2014, and a half day session with the partnership and senior officers from across Scottish Government.
- 6.2 Highland was the first partnership to be visited, and this took place on 5 October, involving:
 - Michael Chalmers, Director of Children and Families
 - Iona Colvin, Chief Social Work Adviser
 - Hannah Keates, Children and Families Department
 - Bill Scott-Watson, Learning Department
 - Paul Leak, Health Department
- 6.3 The analysis of the plan confirmed many strengths in the comprehensive and thorough, integrated approach set out in *For Highland's Children 4*. The visit enabled a helpful and positive discussion, supported by colleagues in Care & Learning, NHS Highland, Police Scotland and the 3rd sector.

7. Implications

- 7.1 There are a range of resource implications with regard to these performance indicators but, in most cases, performance can be addressed within current resources.
- 7.2 There are no legal, community (equality, poverty and rural), climate change/carbon clever, risk or Gaelic implications arising from this report.












