# 1. Purpose/Executive Summary


1.1 This report provides an update on the performance framework for Children's Services.



#### 3. Performance


- 3.1 Highland Council and NHS Highland have agreed a performance framework for children's services, as set out in For Highlands Children 4. This performance report is presented to this Committee as well as to NHS Highland. All of the performance measures in the current framework have been allocated to For Highlands Children 4 Improvement Groups. The report is subject to constant review and changes to the format of the report will be agreed prior to the next committee. Within the framework, there are a number of Performance indicators which are benchmarked for performance against other Scottish Local Authorities. Our current performance is noted in the illustrations below.
- 3.2. The overall Average Total Tariff score has been calculated based on total attainment on leaving for each young person, using the Unified Points Score System. This system includes all passes and awards each individual has achieved for all levels of formal attainment at SCQF levels 3-7 from throughout their schooling. The tariff scale provides a measure of the latest and best achievement in each subject area for national qualifications and a range of wider awards. Qualifications are awarded tariff points based on their SCQF level.




3.3 The percentage of children achieving 5 or more awards at SCQF Level 5 or higher. This is calculated from Insight data provided by SG of pupil's attainment by S6 based on the S4 cohort. In general this method will give similar results to the Insight cohort but the achievement of individual pupils leaving school during S4 or S5 will be counted in the year they would have been expected to finish S6 rather than in their actual year of leaving.




3.4 This indicator concerns the percentage of children pupils in lowest 20% SIMD achieving 5 or more awards at SCQF Level 5 or higher. Calculated from Insight data provided by SG of pupil's attainment by S6 based on the S4 cohort.




3.5 This indicator concerns school attendance rates (per 100 pupils). It is reported every 2 years. The number of half-days attended for a local authority, as a percentage of the total number of possible attendances. This is based on a 380 half day year. The data from SG Attendance and Absence Supplementary Dataset




3.6 This measure concerns the school attendance rates (per 100 looked after children). It is reported every 2 years. The number of half-days attended for a local authority, as a percentage of the total number of possible attendances. This is based on a 380 half day year. The data from SG "Education Outcomes for LAC".




3.7 This data set shows the school exclusion rates (per 1000 pupils). It is reported every 2 years. The number of half-days of temporary exclusions and number of pupils removed from the register per 1000 pupils. The data is from SG Supplementary Dataset for Exclusions.



3.8 This measure dataset shows the percentage of pupils leaving school and entering education, employment, training or voluntary work. This information is collected by Skills Development Scotland (SDS).




3.9 This measure concerns the percentage participation rate for 16-19 year olds (per 100). The annual participation measure (PM) reports on the activity of the wider 16-19 year old cohort, including those at school. The annual measure takes account of all the available status information for individuals over the course of the year. The participation status of each person is calculated by combining the number of days spent in each status between 1st April and 31st March. The overall participation headline classification (participating, not participating and unconfirmed) is based on the classification which has the highest sum of days. Data provided by SDS.



3.10 This measure looks at the average number of working days per employee lost through sickness absence for Teachers.

Sickness Absence Days Per Teacher = No of Sickness Days / No of FTE Teachers Councils return this data direct to the Improvement Service.

### 6. For Highlands Children 4 Performance Framework

- 6.1 For Highlands Children 4 provides a performance framework for planning. The framework articulates the mechanism agreed for evaluating and measuring outcomes, responsibilities and timescales. Each of the performance measures outlined in the framework is owned by the improvement groups and where performance is of concern it is the responsibility of the group to articulate the action it is taking within its improvement plan.
- 6.2 A summary of the data including analysis of each measure is included at **Appendix 1**.
- 6.3 There is further detail available on those indicators associated with the Child Health Commission in the subsequent assurance report.
- 6.4 NHS Highland has advised that the technical issues for the Child Health Surveillance data have not yet been resolved. This matter is reported to be out of NHS Highland's control, as the next steps sit with NHS National Services Scotland. NHS Highland are seeking for the issues to be resolved, and state that this risk forms part of the wider work that is in progress, as the 'Child Public Health and Wellbeing Transformational Change system' is developed nationally. This new system will replace the current system.

#### 7. Quality improvement

- 7.1 The Improvement Groups have adopted a quality improvement model, supported by Scottish Government funded improvement collaboratives. In addition, frontline staff and managers across a range of services are using this 'Model for Improvement' to accelerate change.
- 7.2 The National 'Children and Young People Improvement Collaborative' (CYPIC) continues to develop the method and culture for delivering improvement.

7.3 Highland's Improvement Co-ordination Group has a key role in leading and driving forward this work. A series of quality Improvement learning networks have been established and three 6 month learning programmes were undertaken last year. The programmes provided an opportunity for a total of twenty participants to develop skills to support the use of improvement methodology and build capacity within services. The fourth quality improvement network commences in May 2019 and is already fully subscribed.

## 8. Implications

- 8.1 There are a range of resource implications with regard to these performance indicators, but in most cases, performance can be addressed within current resources.
- 8.2 There are no legal, community (equality, poverty and rural), climate change/carbon clever, risk or Gaelic implications arising from this report.


