Introduction

The Highland Council collects data on a wide range of performance indicators. Of these, there are 27 which the Council considers to be Key Performance Indicators (KPIs).

These provide a high-level overview of the Council's overall performance. The 27 indicators were selected as they provide key insights into effective service delivery across the Council's functions and provide a focus for strategic and operational improvement and decision making.


For many of these indicators, data is collected at each of the 32 Local Authorities in Scotland. The Highland Council's performance can therefore be compared to other councils – either all of the 32, or councils which are similar to The Highland Council – also known as our 'Family Group'.

Latest Performance

Of the 27 Key Performance Indicators, the latest performance against our targets indicates 13 (48%) are on target, 5 (19%) are within an agreed performance threshold, and for 9 (33%) there is no significant progress.

Children's Services



62% of Highland secondary school pupils in 2019/20 achieved 5 or more awards at SCQF level 5 or higher.



The average across Scotland was 64%, and for comparable councils (family group), was 63%.




Highland is ranked 19th. Our target is to be at least 16th by August 2022.

37% of Highland secondary school pupils from deprived areas achieved 5 or more awards at SCQF level 5 or higher in 2019/20.



Average total attainment points



The average total points awarded for levels of attainment in 2019/20 in Highland was 839 points.



Highland is ranked 21st. Our target is to be at least 16th by August 2022.

94.8% of Highland pupils entered positive destinations in 2018/19. This compares to 95.1% across Scotland and 94.8% for comparable councils (Family group).



Highland is ranked 18th in Scotland. Our target is to be in the top 8 councils.

Children's Services

Sickness absence - teachers



Teachers took on average 6.9 days of sickness absence in Highland in 2019/20.

The Scottish average was **6.4 days** and for comparable councils it was **7.1 days**.





Looked After Children out with Highland



The average number of Looked After Children accommodated out with Highland in 2019/20 was 30. Our target is for this to be 20 children by March 2022.



School attendance – All pupils



School attendance rates are calculated every two years. For 2017-19, the school attendance rate amongst all pupils in Highland was 92.75%.

The Scottish average was 92.95% and for comparable councils it was 93.32%.



Highland is ranked 21st.

Our target is to maintain at least position 24 by December 2022.

The latest school attendance rates for looked after children are from 2018-19. This data indicates an attendance rate of 83.7%.


6.3% of adult social care funding was allocated using direct payments or personalised managed budgets in Highland in 2019/20.



The Scottish average was 9.0% and for comparable councils it was **5.4%**.




Highland is ranked 11th in Scotland, and our target is to be in the top eight councils by 2021/22.

Cost per museum visit




Road Services

Road maintenance

Street lighting



11.9 million kWh of energy was consumed by our street lights in 2019/20. Our target is to reduce this to less than 10 million kWh by March 2022.

The street cleanliness score for Highland was **95.7%** in 2019/20.



The Scottish average was **92.3%** and for comparable councils it was **96.4%**.



Highland is ranked **7th** in Scotland. Our target is to remain above the national average.

Household waste that is recycled



We recycled **41.3%** of household waste in 2020.


The Scottish average was **44.9%** and for comparable councils it was **32.4%**.

There are **14,197 Council houses** in Highland.

Our target is to maintain this below 35 days.


Homelessness case duration



The average case duration for someone who is homeless in Highland was **43 weeks** (2019/20).



Our target is to reduce this to 35 weeks by March 2022.



In Highland, gross rent arrears as a percentage of total rent due was **4.6%** in 2019/20.




Our target is for this to remain below 5%.

Asset suitability



67.5% of Highland Council buildings were suitable for their current use in 2019/20.

The Scottish average was 82.5%.

For comparable councils (family group) it was 80.5%

Council staff sickness absence



Our sickness absence rate for staff (non-teachers) in 2019/20 was **9.7 days**.



Our target is to maintain this to less than 10.12 days.

The Scottish average was **11.9 days**. For comparable councils it was **11.4 days**.



We are ranked 2nd in Scotland.

96.3% of Council Tax owed in 2019/20 was collected by the Council.



Highland is ranked 16th in Scotland.



The Scottish average was **95.8%**. For comparable councils it was **96.5%**.

Our target is to remain higher than the national average.

47.3% of our procurement spend in 2019/20 was with local small and medium sized enterprises.



Highland is ranked 1st in Scotland. Our target is to remain in the top 8.

The Scottish average was **28.5%** and for comparable councils it was **35.9%**.

Planning application timescales




The average time taken to deliver a commercial planning application decision was **10.9 weeks** in 2019/20.



The Scottish average was **10.5 weeks** and for comparable councils it was **12.8 weeks**.



Highland is ranked **23rd** in Scotland. Our target is to be better than the national average by March 2022.



81% of properties in Highland had access to superfast broadband in 2019/20.



The Scottish average was 93% and for comparable councils it was 77%.



Our target is for 90% of properties in Highland to have access to superfast broadband by March 2022.
