Martin MacDonald is a Project Manager in the Council's Transformation Team. Martin manages the Council's £12m Salix Recycling as part of his portfolio (of which includes the River Ness Hydro). Martin will resent on the River Ness Hydro project lifecycle and development.

The River Ness Hydro is a 92kW 'Archimedes Screw' hydroelectric scheme and interactive visitor experience on the River Ness, saving 142,000kg CO2e per annum, generating and supplying 50% of the electricity demand to Inverness Leisure Centre and providing a hub for STEM learning. Coming March 2022.

Energy Sparks is an online programme that supports schools to tackle the climate emergency by empowering pupils and informing staff to cut carbon emissions through energy efficiency measures. ## Arianne Burgess MSP

#### Highlands and Islands, Scottish Green Party

Before becoming an MSP, my work focused on regenerative and sustainable community development. As part of that work, I wrote a book called "Life Design for Women: Conscious Living as a Force for Positive Change," published in 2020. I wanted to encourage more women to engage in the changes we must make to see a thriving future. I turned to this work twenty years ago when I realised the impact human activity has on the climate and natural environment. In my previous career, I moved from Scotland to New York to work in the film and music industry which was good fun until I realised the ecological problems created by the industry. I've always been involved in politics and community activism. When I lived in New York, I took part in a range of campaigns, including standing up for immigrant workers, stopping the development of an incinerator in a community where people already suffered from high levels of asthma, and preventing the bulldozing of hundreds of community gardens where people were growing

their food. When I returned to Scotland, I joined the Scottish Green Party in was elected as Highlands and Islands Regional MSP in 2021. I want to use this position to support communities of place to start doing the urgent work of building their resilience and strengthening their ability to adapt and meet their fundamental needs more locally. And I want to work with national and local governments to do this too.

Professor in Geography and Sustainability at St Andrews University

William (Bill) Austin is a Professor in the School of Geography and Sustainable Development at the University of St Andrews. He



graduated from University College London in 1986 and holds a Masters in Micropalaeontology and Doctorate in Ocean Sciences. He has held research fellowships from the Royal Society of London, the Royal Society of Edinburgh and the UK Natural Environment Research Council. After a Lectureship at the University of Durham, Bill moved to St Andrews in 1999 as Reader; he was appointed Professor in 2015. He also holds a visiting chair appointment at the Scottish Association for Marine Sciences (near Oban) and chairs the Scottish Government's Blue Carbon Forum.

### **Steven Andrews**

#### World Heritage Project Manager

Dr Steven Andrews has come to World Heritage from a background in research and teaching (University of Aberdeen, CASP [Cambridge], University



of Exeter, University of the Highlands and Islands). Having spent extensive periods investigating the past environments of East Greenland and northern Scotland he developed an affinity with wild and beautiful landscapes and the need to preserve them for future generations. Growing up on the fringes of the Flow Country, the World Heritage project coordinator role, which he took up in February 2021, has provided a great opportunity to raise awareness and help protect one of the very special environments that Northern Scotland contains.

#### **Dr David Hetherington**

Woodland Advisor, Cairngorms National Park Authority

Dr David Hetherington is the Woodland Advisor for the Cairngorms National Park Authority (CNPA). He works with landowners, tenant farmers, crofters, forest agents, fishery boards and Scottish Forestry, to help deliver strategic woodland expansion across the national park. He also represents the CNPA on the project management group of Saving Wildcats, a new LIFE-funded project aimed at captive-breeding and releasing wildcats in the Cairngorms. Prior to working for the CNPA, he completed his PhD on the Eurasian lynx, and in 2018 published The Lynx and Us, a lavishly-illustrated book exploring the ecology of Europe's most enigmatic large carnivore and its relationship with people.

### Màiri McAllan MSP

Minister for Environment and Land Reform

Mairi McAllan MSP was appointed as the Minister for Environment and Land Reform in May 2021.



Ms McAllan is a former lawyer and Special Adviser to the First Minister in Environment, Biodiversity and Land Reform and was elected to the Scottish Parliament in 2021 to represent the constituency of Clydesdale.

She grew up and was educated in the town of Biggar in South Lanarkshire, before studying Scots Law at the University of Glasgow and European law at the University of Ghent, Belgium.

Ms McAllan attended Glasgow University to gain her Diploma in Professional Legal Practice and, after qualifying as a Scots lawyer, specialised in energy and natural resources in a Glasgow, commercial firm.

Ms McAllan also cofounded the human rights organisation 'Reblaw Scotland'.

Now focusing exclusively on Green Finance, he is currently working on establishing and scaling up the ever-growing nature based solution markets in Scotland by helping co-design market mechanisms and supporting structures/vehicles that would facilitate more private investment in support of natural capital restoration projects.

#### **Paul Chatterton**

Leader of Landscape Finance Lab, NatureScot Paul Chatterton is the founder and lead of the Landscape Finance Lab. During an extensive career with WWF, Paul has catalysed results including the first jurisdictional scale forest and climate (REDD+) programs on two continents, Europe's longest river protected area and the largest rainforest reserve in the Pacific. Paul is a co-author of the Little Sustainable Landscape Book and co-initiator of Landmapp, a mobile app to provide affordable land tenure to rural communities.

### **Graham Neville**

Area Manager for Northern Isles and North Highland, NatureScot

Graham is the Area Manager for Northern Isles and North Highland for NatureScot, the Scottish Government's Nature Agency. He leads the operational delivery of NatureScot's work across Shetland, Orkney, and the North Highlands, and represents NatureScot in the Highland Community Planning Partnership and on the Highland Adapts project. He is involved in a range of work across the area on how nature can help us tackle climate change and facilitate a green recovery.
