Struan Primary School

Struan Primary School is situated in the middle of its catchment area between Meadle and Caroy, and currently has a roll of 3 pupils. Our Nursery is currently inactive and looking forward to welcoming young children.

The main building dates from the 1890s but has had many alterations internally, over the years, and an extension opened in 1998, which provides modern, spacious and comfortable accommodation. The school is well resourced and enjoys the use of a spacious detached Demountable Unit and a modern Multi-use Games Pitch both of which are closely adjacent to the school.

P1-7 pupils can be catered for and, at present, there is a Class Teacher, supported by visiting teachers. The Head Teacher oversees both Struan and Carbost Primary Schools and is non-teaching so divides her time between the two schools.

Pupils travel on a weekly basis to Carbost Primary School for P.E, health and well-being, outdoor learning and weekly Assemblies. Both schools engage in a variety of other activities such as Ocean School, Christmas Plays, performances, parties, visiting workshops and special events. These visits provide the children with the opportunity to work collaboratively within a larger group and to develop social skills with children of all ages.

At Struan School we have close liaison with our Active Schools Coordinator and the Youth Music Initiative. We have an innovative curriculum, which includes Ocean School. The shoreline becomes our classroom and we learn all about the importance of the ocean in protecting our planet. We work in partnership with community members and local environmental groups to carry out our marine research. We are active in our community and enjoy opportunities for collaboration. We are keen gardeners and growers and cultivate many nutritious foods in our large poly tunnel.

Enrolments

Parents will be advised of dates for enrolling children by press advertisement or school newsletter. These take place at the end of January or early in February. Parents will be given details of further visits at the enrolment meeting.

Placing Requests: Parental Choice

Each school serves its own particular catchment area. Pupils whose homes are located in that area will have priority in being allocated a place in the school. However, parents have the right to specify the school in which they wish to place their child. Applications must be made to the Area Education Manager, Mrs Norma Young. School Uniform

School Meals

Currently, school meals are available free of charge for P1, P2 and P3 pupils.

For P4 -P7 pupils, school meals are provided at a cost of £2.30 a day. Payment should be sent in every Monday.

Children may bring a packed lunch, to consume in the school canteen but these may not consist of hot

items, fizzy drinks or be brought in glass containers, in the interests of safety and for insurance purposes.

School meals are cooked in Dunvegan Primary School kitchen and transported each day to Struan.

Children are asked to bring a healthy snack each day for their morning break. On days that children travel

to Carbost, they may wish to purchase snack items from the tuck shop and can take a small amount of

spending money for this.

Emergency Contacts

Parents are asked to provide details of two emergency contacts with whom we can get in contact if parents are not at home in the case of emergencies, illness or in bad weather. Please make the people you nominate as Emergency Contacts aware of your decision to nominate them.

Attendance/Absence

Good attendance is vital if pupils are to achieve their full potential, but if a pupil is absent from school, a parent or guardian should phone the school on the first day of absence, on the school number: 01470 572272.

Please call the school office or send a note if your child needs to leave during the school day for an appointment etc. Where at all possible, medical and dental appointments should be made out-with school hours.

If pupils fall ill during the day, parents are contacted to collect their child, therefore it is essential that we have up to date day time contact numbers and emergency contact numbers for all pupils. Schools are required to keep an attendance register by law. We have a responsibility for the care and welfare of all pupils during the school day therefore need to know the whereabouts of absent pupils. Examples of **authorised** absences include:

- bereavement
- education in another establishment
- judicial purposes attendance at Child in Care review, a Children's Hearing
- sickness/ill health (including visits to doctor, dentist, optician, therapist, etc)
- sporting events
- school visits

Unauthorised absence

Family holidays taken during term time are recorded as unauthorised absence and parents should inform the Head Teacher in writing beforehand.

School Transport

Parents who feel their child may be eligible for school transport will be provided with the appropriate form to complete to send to the Highland Council. A supply of these forms is kept in the school. The following information may be of some help:

Statutory Walking Distance

Under 8 years : 2 Miles

8 years & over : 3 Miles

If official transport passes your home on the way to school and you are very close to the legal distance, your child may be eligible for concessionary transport – this is at the discretion of the council and can vary from year to year.

Communication between home and school.

Good communications between home and school are vital in a child's education. Open Afternoons are held each term and Parents Meetings held following the distribution of written progress reports in May. These reports will inform you of your child's strengths and development needs in the main curricular areas. Newsletters are issued termly, keeping parents informed of the day to day life in school along with any official notes that may need to be distributed. The school website and facebook group is updated regularly to share learners experiences and home school diaries are used on a daily basis. Pupils share their learning on a daily basis via an online learning journal, Seesaw. Parents can download the app and provide timely feedback on their children's work as it is uploaded. Parents are able to view their child's progress and communicate with the class teacher.

Letters are also distributed when parental permission is being sought for outings, extra curricular activities, etc. Please note it is essential that permission slips are returned on time, if the school does not receive a completed permission slip, then we are unable to take your child on the trip/ outing. Letters not requiring a return slip are distributed by email, where possible.

Parent Council

The school has a Parent Council which is vital to the running of our school. All parents are invited to the meetings, but only those on the council are eligible to take part in discussions and vote. Any decisions taken by the Parent Council are made known to other interested parties through the minutes.

These relationships must be nurtured by a healthy exchange of information between teachers and pupils, between home and school. We always welcome parental interest in the welfare of our pupils. The support of parents in their children's education is key to the success of young people. Taking time with them, discussing work, practicing language, helping them manage their homework and encouraging responsibility are important ways of supporting children's learning.

The school always seeks to involve parents in any key decisions about their child's education and keep parents informed about progress.

Our Curriculum

The school structures its learning and teaching on the Curriculum for Excellence, using the outcomes and experiences for planning the learning experiences of the children. The coverage of the Experiences and Outcomes are tracked on a 3 year cycle, ensuring a broad general education. We aim to provide challenging, engaging and enjoyable learning activities to stimulate and motivate the children so that they become successful learners, confident individuals, responsible citizens and effective contributors. The main areas of the curriculum are Languages, Mathematics, Health and Well Being, Social Studies, Sciences, Technology, Religious and Moral Education and the Expressive Arts. Children are involved in the planning

of their work giving opportunities for pupils' choice. The outdoor environment plays a vital part in our learning – utilising the unique and enriching surroundings of the school. Struan Primary Ocean School is an opportunity for our learners to become researchers, explorers, creators and protectors. Our learners have opportunities to apply the core skills developed in class in relevant and exciting contexts. Our Ocean School is generously funded by the Struan Community Trust and other environmental organisations.

Literacy and Language

This covers listening, talking, reading and writing. Our aim is to encourage each child to develop skills to allow him / her to communicate fluently and confidently.

Basic skills are developed in core literacy lessons and further developed through literacy and language opportunities within other areas of the curriculum.

Children are encouraged to enjoy reading. Basic skills are acquired by learning phonics and key words in the Early Stages. These are further developed as the child progresses. The school uses a variety of reading material which is engaging and progressive.

The school follows the Highland Literacy approach to the teaching of literacy. The approach aims to equip pupils of all abilities with the skills and motivation necessary to progress and become enthusiastic readers, writers and communicators.

In the younger stages, children develop their literacy skills through a blend of play-based approaches and structured skill development. Learners at all stages are encouraged to create their own pathways to success.

Numeracy and Mathematics

Mathematics plays an important role in our lives. It is used in everyday activities, such as buying food, keeping time and playing games.

Mathematics includes basic numeracy, money, measure, information handling, shape, position and movement. Children are encouraged to learn actively through practical experience, using concrete materials. Children acquire mathematical concepts and learn number facts.

Mental calculation is strongly emphasised. Methods of mental calculation are important in helping children to understand number and use it effectively. Regular oral and mental work develops children's calculation strategies and recall skills.

Skills in problem solving are developed using different learning contexts. Our pupils are encouraged to explore mathematical enquiry, developing a range of strategies that can be used in various contexts. Our pupils learn about number processes using Numicon as a visual representation. Pupils are encouraged to explain their thinking and thought processes.

Science

Science and the application of science are central to our economic future and to our health and wellbeing as individuals and as a society. Through learning in science, children develop their interest in, and understanding of, the living, material and physical world. The children engage in collaborative tasks to develop the relevant skills for the future. The science curriculum covers Planet Earth, Forces, Electricity & Waves and Biological systems.

Social Studies

Our Social Studies curriculum focuses on learning experiences for people, past events and societies; people, place and environment; people in society, economy and business. In Struan Primary School, an inter-disciplinary, thematic approach is used where possible, which encourages learning through practical experiences.

Technologies

The technology curriculum develops children's technological skills, knowledge, understanding and attributes through creative, practical and work related activities. The curriculum covers technological developments in society, ICT to enhance learning and different contexts to develop skills and knowledge such as business, food, textiles, craft and design. The school is equipped with PCs and a Smart board, linked to the Internet. ICT is an integral part of our teaching and learning process and is used to improve pupils' knowledge, understanding and skills in a range of curriculum areas and subjects.

Health and wellbeing

Learning in health and wellbeing ensures that the children develop the knowledge, understanding, skills, capabilities and attributes which they need for mental, emotional, social and physical wellbeing now and in the future. The curriculum includes learning about mental, emotional, social and physical wellbeing; planning for choices and changes; physical education and sport; food and health; substance misuse; relationships, sexual health and parenthood.

Pupils are encouraged to make informed choices and take appropriate decisions that help to ensure a healthy lifestyle. The school aims to foster links between school, home and community so that all are involved in a collective responsibility for promoting good health.

Expressive Arts

The Expressive Arts is a term which is used to describe the teaching of Art and Design, Dance, Music, and Drama. All of these areas encourage the child's creativity, self-expression, the development of their imagination and an appreciation of the expression of others - e.g. composers, artists, etc. The curriculum provides opportunities for children to experience and enjoy the excitement of performing and presenting for different audiences and being part of an audience for others.

Strings and chanter instruction is also available to those who wish to take part.

Religious and Moral Education

Scotland is a nation whose people hold a wide range of beliefs. Our curriculum enables the children to explore Christianity and other major world religions whilst developing a respect for others and an understanding of beliefs and practices which are different from their own. This encourages children to show tolerance towards others of different beliefs and cultures.

We have contact with our local parish church, and the Minister is invited to talk to the children at assemblies.

Parents have the right to withdraw their child from Religious Education. If so, they should consult the Head Teacher.

1+2 Languages

As part of a national initiative, each child has been introduced to a second language in Primary 1 and a third language no later than Primary 5. At Struan Primary, our second language is French and our third language is Gaelic.

Interdisciplinary Learning

Whenever possible links are made across the curriculum between different subjects. This enables children to make connections and see the relevance in learning. Purposeful learning within different contexts makes learning lively, motivating and enjoyable. Interdisciplinary learning provides rich assessment information which includes, engagement, cooperation and resilience.

Citizenship

All the children in the school take part in Citizenship activities each term. The children work on planning and undertaking many activities to develop their skills and awareness of community responsibility, helping others and organising projects for improvement. In the past this has included activities such as organising charity fundraising events, community entertainment, school garden development and newsletters. At the end of the school session, each child is nominated by their peers for a Citizenship Award, to recognise areas of citizenship where they have demonstrated achievement. These awards are presented at our annual prize giving.

Homework

Our homework policy was devised in consultation with pupils, staff and parents. Homework is not mandatory but is available upon request.

Assessment

As a school, we seek to provide information to pupils, parents and staff to assist in the effectiveness of learning and teaching process and in raising attainment.

Teachers will use the assessment process as an evaluative, diagnostic and formative tool to provide evidence of pupil attainment and progress and to inform learning and teaching approaches and pupil targets.

Children in Primary 1, 4 and 7 take part in the Scottish National Standardised Assessments, a computer based assessment, which covers some aspects of reading, writing and numeracy. These are age and stage appropriate. These assessments provide evidence for teachers to use when assessing children's progress. Pupils should view the assessment process as a motivating experience, which takes place within the overall context of a supportive school. Pupils should make use of feedback, in all its forms to inform next steps for the improvement of their own learning.

Parents will receive feedback on their son or daughter's progress through pupil reports, open afternoons, parents' evenings and target setting information. Pupils will reflect on their progress, achievement through frequent Learning Conversations and profiles developed through Seesaw platform. In addition, P7 pupils work on a transition Profile which will go with them to Portree High School.

Additional Support Needs

On a consultancy basis, our additional learning support teacher monitors the progress of pupils formally recognised as having special educational needs. The needs of such pupils are generally catered for within the normal pattern of courses but with specialist advice and support as required via Tutorials and if required, a child's plan may be put in place to outline an action plan to help organise, monitor and regularly review a child's progress. Parents and pupils will be involved in these procedures and in reviews. Parents/carers will always be involved in discussions about any additional support being suggested for their child and any need that may be identified within the school.

Highland Council would seek to work in partnership with parents at all times, but sometimes you will have a concern that you don't feel is being addressed, or will want to talk to someone out-with the school. Should you have any concerns that your child's Additional needs are not being met, you should contact your child's named person, the Head Teacher, Miss Muir if your concerns continue, there are a number of means of resolving difficulties and disputes and information on this can be found at: http://www.highland.gov.uk/info/886/schools - additional support needs/1/support for learners

Child Protection

The designated Child Protection Officer is the Head Teacher.

From time to time incidents can occur within the school setting which cause concern and could indicate that a pupil is suffering some form of abuse. In terms of Highland Child Protection Committee Inter-agency Protection Guidelines, Education Service staff must report such incidents to Social Work Services which can lead to a joint Social Work / Police investigation.

All agencies involved in Child Protection are obliged to make the welfare of children their paramount consideration and this will be the priority for Education Service staff.

Sickness, accidents and healthcare

Parents can help teachers by impressing on the children that any accident must be reported to a member of staff.

The following procedures are adhered to in cases of sickness or accident:-

1. Contacting of Parents

When it is necessary for a child to return home, contact will be made with EITHER one of the pupil's parents OR, in the event of the parents being unavailable, with the Emergency Contact, who has been nominated by the parent, with a view to arranging collection of the sick child from school.

2. Medical Assistance

If medical assistance is required, every effort will be made to contact parents at the first opportunity.

A well-stocked First Aid Kit is kept in the school for minor injuries. The local doctor or district nurse is called for anything more serious. Parents will naturally be informed if the above occurs. It is most useful if the school knows of any relevant medical history of a pupil, which, for example, may necessitate special care or special provision being made, e.g. inhalers for asthma, creams for eczema. Required regular visits are made by the school nurse for the general examination of pupils. The nurse normally sends further information to parents when their presence is deemed necessary, or follow up required.

Unwell children in school

Children who complain that they are unwell should be observed for a short while in class. If they continue

to complain, they will be sent to the office and a First Aider will attend to the child while his/her parents

are phoned. Unwell children should not be sent to school except on the recommendation of a doctor.

Supervision of children unable to be outside at playtime is not practicable except under exceptional

circumstances, for example a child with their leg in plaster or where a parent has consulted the Head

Teacher.

In accordance with Highland Council's policy on 'Administration of Medicines in School', the following

procedures will be adhered to:

- A child may only take medication (including non-prescription) if the parent/guardian has given written permission by completing a school medicine administration form.
- Only medication supplied by the parent/guardian will be administered to a child.
- Parents should deliver the medication to the school office and complete the appropriate administration form.
- Medicines are stored in the office.
- Pupils should take the medication only when supervised by an adult.
- The medical needs of pupils will be discussed by staff and the Head Teacher in the first instance. It is also likely that it will be necessary to liaise with the school nurse, school doctor and the parents on specific issues.
- In an emergency situation, the emergency services are contacted immediately.

Head Lice

Children are usually most affected by head lice due to close head to head contact. The best detection method is wet combing. Once a week after shampooing, apply conditioner, and use a normal comb to untangle the hair. Then switch to a fine toothed plastic detection comb (your pharmacist can recommend a suitable one.) Thoroughly comb through the whole of the head, you should check all family members at the same time and then arrange treatment. Advice can be sought from the pharmacist or the Health Visitor.

School Policies

School Policies are available to view at the school or on the school website.

Adverse Weather Conditions

It is the responsibility of parents or carers to decide if a pupil should attempt to travel to school, by transport or on foot, in adverse weather conditions. The Education Authority encourages full attendance at school but in severe weather conditions the safety of pupils is much more important.

The school updates its procedures for adverse weather closure annually, therefore:-

- **parents** should advise schools of an alternative address, as close as possible to the school, which may be used by their children in emergencies.
- **The school** will establish a system of communication with parents and ensure that parents are fully informed of the arrangements. This includes an 0800 telephone information service.

When weather conditions are poor:-

• local radio stations issue news and weather bulletins on traffic conditions and school closures.

Transmissions may not cover all households and may be subject to re-scheduling but should be

helpful. Parents are advised to remain 'tuned in' to ongoing road, weather or school information updates.

School Fund

The bulk of the school fund is raised by fundraising, organised by the parents whose co-operation and help is much appreciated.

The main two events sponsored by these funds are the Christmas Party, a variety of sporting activities, the annual School Trip, and travel expenses.

Proper accounts are kept and audited once a year. A copy of the audit is sent to the Finance Department of

the Highland Council and is available to parents if requested.

Secondary School and Transition

When the pupils finish in Primary 7, they normally transfer to Portree High School. A programme of transition activities is usually arranged during Primary 7 for the children to have opportunities to meet their peers from the other cluster primaries. Children are given opportunities to visit Portree High School on the transition days in June and Secondary Staff visit and liaise regularly with the P7 teacher prior to the P7 transferring.
