

- Arrange appropriate professional development and training for all staff.



# Why Play?



- Through activity based learning the brain and body are stimulated and active.
- It provides pleasure and enjoyment which in turn will motivate children to further their learning by persevering, overcoming difficulties and concentrating for longer periods of time.
- It helps to build confidence in themselves and their abilities.
- It allows the child to tackle new experiences in a non-threatening situation.
- It can provide an escape, relieve boredom, allow for relaxation and the opportunity for solitude.
- It helps the child to judge the many variables within social interactions and develop perceptions about other people.
- Skills can be practised and repeated as many times as is necessary for confidence and mastery.
- Opportunities for sensory experiences which are the foundation of intellectual development are provided.
- It provides reasons children can understand for acquiring the skills and knowledge adults value.
- Play created context for language development

#### Children are given a wide range of opportunities including to:



Sing and take part in a range of musical activities

Draw and write

Visit and explore their local environment

Investigate the properties of sand and water

Bake.

Model with play dough and clay

Paint

Create pictures, collages and junk models

Play board games

Build with construction toys eq. Duplo, Lego, Bricks etc.

Engage in a variety of role play activities eg. home corner,

hospital, shop etc.

Take part in physical play and games

# Nursery Hours


We are be offering 1140 hours of nursery, Monday to Friday from 9am - 3pm. Parents can choose how they use our nursery within those hours.

# Attendance and Illness

It can be a difficult decision to keep your child off nursery due to ill health especially when many children feel they want to come anyway. However, it is important that children do not come if they are unwell so that infections do not spread to other children or the staff. If your child has been vomiting or had diarrhoea, please be aware that they must be clear of these symptoms for 48 hours before coming back to nursery. It is important on occasions that children will not be in nursery, for whatever reason, that you contact the school office to let us know. This ensures the safety of the children. If your child becomes ill, or has an accident while attending the nursery, we will contact you by telephone. If there is no reply we will ring your emergency contact number. Please ensure these are always up-to-date e.g. if mobile numbers change during the year.

# Early Closure / Adverse Weather

Should the nursery need to close earlier than normal you will be contacted by telephone if prior warning has not been given out. Please ensure your details are always up to date and any changes are given to the Office. In the morning, if there is extreme weather parents should contact the Schools Information Line on 0800 564 2272 + the school's PIN 04 2940 where they will then hear a recorded message informing them of any closures. # What to Bring?



# Clothing.

The children should come to nursery in comfortable play clothes and bring a suitable pair of indoor shoes. Please make sure that all the children's shoes and clothes are labelled clearly with the child's name. As learning opportunities outside are given daily, we ask that the children always come prepared for the weather e.g. warm waterproof jacket, sunscreen on. Highland weather means that the school grounds are often wet. A pair of wellies for outdoor play each day is a great idea! We now have waterproof suits for every child.

## Toileting.

We understand that in some cases young children are not quite independent when it comes to toileting or may still be in nappies/ training pants. Please, let us know as soon as possible if this is the case so that we can discuss the best way of supporting your child with this. At all times, the child's dignity and privacy will be ensured and consent for personal care is sought. As far as possible we ask you help by keeping fastenings on clothes very simple and to the minimum. If children have zips or buttons on trousers, please practise with them so that they can tie these unaided. In this way, we can help the children to become independent. Children of this age often have little accidents. Please provide a labelled bag full of spare clothes to be kept on your child's peg in case they need to be changed.

## Snack and Lunch

A healthy snack is provided free of charge every day and usually consists of milk/water to drink and fruit, toast or crackers. Children will be given the opportunity to help with the preparation of snacks. This time is also used to encourage independence, social skills, healthy eating and cultural awareness. Baking is also regularly completed with the children. If your child has any allergies please be sure to let the nursery staff know.

As of 2022 Nursery Children will be entitled to have a free school meal. The children sit to have their lunch with the school children. This is a nice social opportunity for the children.

# Cluster Arrangements.

Shieldaig Primary is currently part of cluster arrangement with Kinlochewe Primary School. This means that the school 'shares' a non-class committed Head Teacher whose time is divided between the two schools. This arrangement has allowed the school to have dedicated teaching staff that are fully focused on providing high quality education to the children in the school. The two schools work closely together to the benefit of staff, children and the community.

# Links with other centres.

We currently have good, strong links with other centres and Kinlochewe nursery often visit. We also take part in events organised by the schools feeding into Gairloch High School. Recently this has included attendance at shows and workshops. We value these links as they provide opportunities for our small group of children to socialise with others.

## **Visits**

Visits are an important aspect of life in the nursery. The details of any visit will be given to you in writing and your written consent will be asked for. On all visits children will be accompanied by an adequate number of adults. We will also ask you to sign a consent form annually for times when your child leaves the school grounds for walks and visits to places of interest in the village.

We also like to invite people into the nursery to share their skills and knowledge with the children. This gives the children opportunities to broaden their horizons and interact with other adults. The children recently enjoyed a visit from the local mountain rescue team. The Oral Hygienist (Ailsa Gordon) and Health Visitor (Elizabeth MacDonald) are also regular visitors to nursery and nursery children join in Kodaly Music sessions with P2s.

# CET TO VIO

#### **INDUCTION**

You are more than welcome to come and have a look around the nursery and Shieldaig Primary School before your child starts to see the kind of activities your child will be involved with and the environment in which they will play and learn. Once you have made a decision and enrolled your child, you and your child will be offered play and stay sessions alongside others joining the nursery. These will give your child a chance to familiarise him/herself with the nursery, staff and the other children. You are welcome to stay for all or part of these sessions. Details about these sessions will be given or sent to you and are completely flexible to allow you and your child to build confidence and relationships.



#### TRANSITION TO SCHOOL

Children normally spend up to two years in nursery and will then transfer into school as a P1. Nursery work closely with school throughout the year taking part in activities alongside the older children e.g.: joining in at breaks, assembly, performances, World Book Day activities, the Big Bird Watch, Christmas play etc. In this way nursery children are made to feel part of Shieldaig Primary School from the very start. In the Summer Term before children transfer into school the teacher will spend time in the Nursery and the children will go through to the classroom too. The younger primary children will work alongside the nursery children on a shared learning topic. The children's "Profiles' are shared and discussed with the class teacher so that learning targets and other information about the children are clear.



#### **NURSERY PROFILES**

You are always very welcome to come in to nursery to see how your child is progressing. Each child has a file called their 'learning profile'. Examples of the children's work is contained within these files, including observations, comments and photographs. Every child also works towards personal targets. These will be discussed and shared with you on a regular basis.

#### **NEWSLETTERS**

Newsletters are sent home every 2 weeks. These contain lots of information about events and learning in school and nursery. Newsletters and information can also be found on the school and nursery notice boards and on the school facebook page.

#### PARENT MEETINGS

More formal opportunities to meet and discuss how your child is doing in nursery take place twice a year, in November and May. Lyndsay will be in touch to arrange a convenient time to meet. If ever you wish to speak with Lyndsay or with the Head Teacher please do not hesitate to get in touch. We operate an open door policy, and informal discussions take place before and after the nursery session on a daily basis.

#### HEALTH VISITOR

Elizabeth MacDonald is your child's Health Visitor and Named Person for your child until they enter school. If you want to get in touch with the Health Visitor please contact her on 01349 781573

#### CHILD PROTECTION

The school follows the national strategy known as 'Getting It Right For Every Child' (GIRFEC). Getting It Right places children's and young people's needs first and provides co-ordinated help where this is required. Services involved could be Social Work, Health and Police. The named person with overall responsibility is the Health Visitor, but all nursery staff have had training in GIRFEC and are aware of their role in supporting children. #### COMMENTS AND COMPLAINTS

We hope you will enjoy your child's time at our nursery and welcome comments or suggestions, which could help us to improve our service. However, we are aware that difficulties can occur from time to time and if you feel you have reason to complain, then please follow the procedure outlined below. Please use the open door policy and speak to the person in charge of the nursery, either at the beginning or end of a nursery session. If you prefer, an appointment can be made to speak to the Early Years Practitioner in private. It will then, in consultation with the parents/carers, be decided if the matter needs to be taken further, in which case, the Head Teacher will be informed and a meeting arranged. From here, if necessary, the matter will be brought to the attention of the Care and Learning Manager who will decide what the next steps should be. Parents will be kept fully informed at each stage and will be invited to attend any meetings being held. Should you feel unable to speak to the person in charge of the nursery, please make an appointment to speak directly with the Head Teacher.
