

Background

Charrette Process

A new vision for Wick & Thurso

Planning Context

The Wick and Thurso Charrettes were held to give the local community the opportunity to participate in creating new visions for their towns. This is a new approach to development planning, aimed at involving people at the start of the process and helping The Highland Council prepare the next Local Development Plan for Caithness and Sutherland (CaS Plan).

The Charrette were informed by a number of background documents, for example the existing Caithness Local Plan, produced in 2002, the Highland Local Transport Strategy and Greenspace Audit, both prepared in 2010.






Moving forward, the Highland-wide Local Development Plan, adopted on 5 April 2012, sets out an overarching vision and spatial strategy for Caithness and Sutherland that seeks to achieve the following objectives:

- Be a regenerating place with a network of strong communities
- Be a competitive place connected to the global economy
- Be a connected and accessible place
- Be a place of outstanding heritage: safe in the custody of local people
- Be a centre of excellence for energy and engineering
- Have become an international centre of excellence for marine renewables
- Have a high quality tourist industry
- Have a more diverse economy

Many of these overarching objectives were raised during the Charrettes and provide a strong basis to develop the Caithness and Sutherland Local Development Plan.

The Launch

Key stakeholders in the future of Thurso and/or Wick, were invited to join for a briefing at the Launch events for the forthcoming Town Charrettes.

The Thurso Charrette was launched on 23 January 2013 while the Wick Charrette was launched on the 24 January 2013, both with an introduction by The Highland Council and with the Project Team in attendance.

Publicity
