

Throughout the year we continuously evaluate what we do and how it makes a difference to our learners. We want to know what is working well for our school community and what needs further improvement.

Our children and young people are actively consulted and involved in this process. We also give staff, parents/carers, and other partners the opportunity to participate in discussions and activities in order to shape our improvement journey.

When we develop our improvement projects we use key questions at planned review times throughout the session in order to know how well we progressing towards achieving these positive outcomes and changes.

#### **Our School**

Ardross Primary is a non-denominational school which serves the rural community of Ardross. We have a current role of 27 pupils with 47% being placement requests from the Alness and Evanton area. This session we have a new permanent Head Teacher who is a cluster head, splitting her time equally between both schools. She is supported by the Principal Teacher. We have two experienced permanent members of teaching staff. The class composition is currently P1-4 and P5-7.

We provide a very nurturing and inclusive and supporting environment for both the pupils and parents. Staff know the school community very well which aids a positive learning experience for everyone. # Our school ethos promotes equality and inclusion at every turn. Our pupils have a strong sense of identity. We have a set of school rules which is heavily enforced by the pupils themselves and the adults in the setting. We encourage our pupils to contribute to the life and work of the school. We encourage pupils to celebrate all their successes in and out of school.

Parents are kept fully informed of school life through our use of an online learning profile. This has resulted in high levels parental engagement.

The school has an active Parent Council, and families support the school in many positive ways.

Improvement Project 1:
Primary focus: Curriculum and assessment
Year of Project: 2
Purpose: Recovery from Covid-19 impact: Health and Wellbeing
Progress and impact:
<ul> <li>Content</li> <li>As a school we place HWB at the centre of our work and have made good progress in this area with the introduction of a 3 year HWB progressive programme across the cluster to ensure coverage within multi-composite classes, that we continually review and monitor.</li> <li>All children feel safe and secure and are able to tell us ways in which we do this in school – termly well-being assessments allow staff to track this and implement interventions quickly.</li> <li>We have a nurturing and caring ethos. Teacher's termly planning make use of outdoor spaces and learning opportunities are used daily to build relationships and improve wellbeing. This is shown in the termly well-being assessments.</li> <li>All children are include in every aspect of school life. There are opportunities for all children to be involved in clubs, pupil council, JRSO and other working groups.</li> <li>Children's next steps are evaluated and monitored to show improved outcomes for children.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>Next steps:</li> <li>Embed the well-being indicator termly assessments</li> <li>Embed 3 year HWB progression (Coram/HC)</li> <li>Right's Respecting School (Bronze Award)- To ensure better understanding of placing the human rights and needs of every child and young person at the centre of education</li> <li>Undertake SHANARRI school survey – for pupil voice</li> </ul>
Improvement Project 2:
Primary focus: Curriculum and assessment
Year of Project: 2
Purpose: Recovery of learning, teaching and assessment
Progress and impact: Content
<ul> <li>Good progress was made across this area despite interruptions in learning. All staff know their children well, what they need to succeed and any factors which might impact learning. The use of digital technology supported children's learning and children made progress across the curriculum.</li> <li>Moderation takes place across the school, cluster and ASG to ensure teachers are confident in their expectations and judgements of assessments and have a shared understanding of criteria of a level.</li> </ul>
• Literacy and Numeracy is a central focus for development in the school where staff are undertaking CPD events. PM Writing has had a significant impact on the learning and teaching of writing. The specific structure to the genres has supported the pupils in producing better quality pieces of work. This is beginning to impact positively on their writing attainment.

- Staff are more confident with data analysis and use trackers to evidence and identify priorities for raising attainment and to identify where children are within their learning and identify next steps.
- HT has termly attainment meetings with all teaching staff to discuss all pupils, where children are identified as not working at age/stage, interventions are put in place to target these children.
- Profiling helps the children to be confident about where they are within their learning and allows parents further opportunities to become involved and engaged in their child's leaning during a disruptive year.

#### Next steps:

- Termly attainment meetings and QA calendar
- Moderation and Assessment Calendar to be implemented across cluster/ASG
- Quality Assessment training and tasks to be undertaken termly (School/cluster/ASG)

#### **Improvement Project 3**:

Primary focus: Curriculum and assessment

#### Year of Project: 1

Purpose: Attainment in 21/22 – Focus on identifying gaps caused by Covid-19

#### Progress and impact:

Content:

- Very good positive relationships within the school, and families, allow staff to plan learning experiences which encourage independence, creativity and meet the needs of all learners.
- We engage all learners in all aspects of school life though pupil council, assemblies, class votes/discussions and more formal audits. Children know their views are valued and they are committed to their learning.
- Pupil Support Assistants are used effectively to challenge and support targeted pupils in both classes as well as across the school. Interventions are measured and almost all pupils have moved on in their learning because of this. Baseline assessments are used to find where the children are in their learning, identify gaps and then remeasure.
- In their Pupil Profiles children can more confidently discuss where they are in their learning and what they need to do to improve.

#### Next steps:

- Termly attainment meetings calendar agreed
- Assessment Calendar to be implemented across cluster
- Teachers to continually raise attainment through quality professional learning eg: PM Writing, Wraparound Spelling
