

# **Standards and Quality Report**

Cauldeen Primary School HIGHLAND COUNCIL | MACKAY ROAD, INVERNESS This report is provided to families and partners to identify our achievements this session. The next steps in our improvement journey are also outlined.

Throughout the year we continuously evaluate what we do and how it makes a difference to our learners. We want to know what is working well for our school community and what needs further improvement.

Our children and young people are actively consulted and involved in this process. We also give staff, parents/carers, and other partners the opportunity to participate in discussions and activities in order to shape our improvement journey.

When we develop our improvement projects we use key questions at planned review times throughout the session in order to know how well we progressing towards achieving these positive outcomes and changes.

#### **Our School**

The roll at Cauldeen Primary School currently consists of 214 pupils primary 1 to 7, a nursery of 70 places and specialist early level additional supports needs provision with 17 pupils with profound and complex needs. Cauldeen primary school is located in a housing estate in Inverness in an area of high social deprivation. We have a mixed roll of pupils from different backgrounds with different needs that need nurtured throughout their time with us.

Our school is very much within the local community, and children, parents and staff are all very proud of Cauldeen.

30% of our children are entitled to Free School Meals. We receive £ 75,000 PEF with £13,000 carried forward from last session.

We pride ourselves on the encouragement that we give to pupils and on the pleasure that our children have in coming to school. Our staff are caring and kind and put go the extra mile to support the children in our care. We work in close partnership with supporting agencies.

Like many others, we have been impacted by the effects of COVID 19 this session. We have had significant staff absences and have found it very difficult to secure supply. Whole classes too have had to isolate throughout the year and engage in learning online.

Children who have been ill with COVID have been unable to engage in learning and the stress on families, both those of pupils and those of staff has been notable. Our overall school attendance was 89% and we had 3 exclusions this session.

We are excited that we are now coming out of the pandemic, and we can resume business almost as normal. We had our first whole school gathering in two years this term and look forward to welcoming parents back into the building on Sports Day, to our Leavers' Assembly and to our Parent and Child Art and Craft Club.

## **Our School Vision, Values and Aims**

Our aim is to encourage pupils to respect four key rights: the right to learn and develop, the right to play, the right to be happy and the right to be safe.

Our vision, values and aims were updated in 2019 and the values are encompassed within the letters that make up Cauldeen: Care for others Always tries their best Uphold respect for others Listen well Delivers homework on time Enthuse in their learning Ensure everyone is included

#### Pupil Voice: what is working well in our school?

Our children and young people identified the following strengths for our school this session:

The majority of children are very positive about Happiness Day

The children were involved in raising fund for the new treehouse. This is a resource that is well used by the children over breaktimes.

P6 pupils have been trained in the playground leaders programme and regularly provide lunchtime activities for the younger children.

P1 pupils have P7 buddies and weekly organised sessions together. They are enjoying being able to do this face to face again.

Children have spoken positively about being able to play together again following the lifting of Covid restrictions.

#### Pupil Voice: what changes would you like to see made?

Our children and young people identified the following changes they would like to see and the difference these changes could make.

House captains have met and agreed increased responsibilities within their leadership role such as:

- Following the Cauldeen Rights
- Collecting and putting away playground equipment
- Wearing school uniform
- Wearing their badges

They also agreed that they need to be good role models and this is why they have been chosen for this position.





on the priorities identified. ELC staff have engaged local businesses to help develop the outdoor area.

We now have a literacy curriculum in place, which includes planning and tracking of learning in reading, writing, listening and talking. The impact of this has been that during transition all had this information which then enabled staff to have a very clear overview of where the children were in their learning.

Attainment has risen significantly in writing this year in P1, P4 & P7. Attainment has risen in reading too in P1. We are also making steady progress in raising attainment in P1, P4 and P7.

We can provide joined up and targeted support both to pupils and to families. We have appointed 2 positive relationships co-ordinators who have engaged with the local churches, supermarkets and charities. They have also delivered weekly craft sessions in school with parents and children, held uniform sales for parents, supported children with Relax Kids after school sessions as well as nurture sessions as part of the school day. The impact of this has been; increased parental engagement, high level of attendance at the parent craft sessions and parents having an increased awareness of the supports available.

#### Next steps:
