#### 1 Background

The UK Government has made a commitment towards levelling up across the UK. The focus is stated as levelling up opportunities and prosperity as well as overcoming deep-seated geographic inequalities. The Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF) is one part of this Levelling Up agenda.

Within the Investment Plan prepared by Highland Council and approved by the UK Government is a ring-fenced financial allocation to address adult numeracy called 'Multiply'. This programme seeks to improve the functional numeracy skills of adults (age 19+) through personal tutoring, digital training, and flexible courses.

The UK Government has identified the following success measures for the programme at a national level:

- More adults achieving maths qualifications / participating in numeracy courses (up to and including SCQF Level 5),
- **Improved labour market outcomes** e.g. fewer numeracy skills gaps reported by employers, and an increase in the proportion of adults that progress into sustained employment and / or education; and
- Increased adult numeracy across the population.

#### 2 Multiply in Highland

Our goal in Highland is to use this funding to establish and consolidate a 'numeracy pathway' within Adult Learning which ensures we have a range of support on offer, from confidence building through to gaining numeracy related qualifications relevant to work. At the same time there is a desire to build on existing networks and over the period of the plan seek to ensure sustainable solutions.

With that in mind, we intend to run a Highland Multiply Challenge fund open to :-

- Third sector organisations, including community groups, voluntary organisations, and social enterprises. National third sector organisations wanting to apply should have an existing operational base within Highland.
- Public Sector Organisations.

The aim of the Challenge Fund is to help people aged 19+ to improve their numeracy skills as part of their day-to-day lives, to help them secure employment or to help with career progression.

The Highland Multiply Challenge Fund will support projects linked to these key intervention aims.

- S42: Courses designed to increase confidence with numbers for those needing the first steps towards formal qualifications
- S43: Courses for parents wanting to increase numeracy skills in order to help their children and help with their own progression
- S44: Courses for prisoners, those recently released or on a temporary licence





- S45: Courses aimed at people who can't apply for certain jobs because of lack of numeracy skills and/or to encourage people to upskill in order to access a certain job/career.
- S47: Innovative programmes delivered together with employers -including courses designed to cover specific numeracy skills required in the workplace.
- S49: Courses designed to help people use numeracy to manage their money

In your application you will be asked to identify the lead intervention(s) from the list above, for which you are applying. A critical element that will be considered in awarding funding will be linking with other provision and ensuring correct support is delivered for and to the target groups.

#### 3 Multiply Outputs and Outcomes

Included in Table A, page 6 are the outputs and outcomes as laid out by the UK SPF Multiply Programme. It is important that you read these before applying. In the application, you will be asked to estimate the number of beneficiaries you intend to work with in relation to the appropriate Multiply intervention, including if applicable, whether any of the beneficiaries will gain a maths qualification at or leading to Level 5 certification. At this stage, you are not asked to estimate the number of outcomes. It is important that you estimate as realistically as possible the numbers involved as this will be closely monitored and determine whether funding support is provided/continued.

#### 4 Funding Package

The grant conditions linked to the UKSPF and ability of the Council to successfully pulldown all of the allocated funding over each of the financial years, is dependent on the progress achieved in relation to the outputs and outcomes in Table A. If progress is slow, then there is a high likelihood that funding will be removed and the Multiply Programme reduced in scale as we proceed into 2024.

Highland Council therefore need Challenge Fund applicants/recipients to work closely with us from the outset to demonstrate to UK Government that Highland is making best use of the funds provided.

The Highland Multiply Challenge Fund will be allocating funding towards projects for delivery over 2 periods.

Applicants will in the first Round have the option to apply for either:

| А | A short, discrete project to be fully completed by 31 <sup>st</sup> December – up to 9 months (however can be shorter). Grant funding available per project is within the range £5000 to £50,000   |

The intension, subject to available funding, is to have a second Challenge Fund Round late in 2023/early 2024 for another series of short, discreet projects than will need to be completed at latest in January/February 2025.

We are particularly interested in supporting smaller local groups in helping communities and residents achieve improved numeracy skills.

It is anticipated that a proportion of project costs may relate to staffing to deliver training and support activities for beneficiaries. These could be for additional staff within your organisation or to extend hours for existing staff or staff who are redeployed /redirected to the work supported by this fund. The important point to note is that Multiply funding can only be used to support staff costs in relation to the delivery of the project.

The intention is that grant offer letters will be issued by the end of March 2023 and for activity/spend to immediately commence

Match funding is not essential however, if available and you plan to use it to add value to your project, we would appreciate you advising us, as it will allow us to collectively demonstrate to the UK Government how we are aligning and positively using the Funds to bring added value to existing resources and activity.

#### 5 Timeline

The timelines associated with the Challenge Fund are very tight as there is a requirement to allocate funds by the end of March 2023. Your understanding and co-operation is requested and appreciated.

Applications to the Highland Multiply Challenge Fund will be accepted until 10:00 on Monday 13<sup>th</sup> March 2023. Unfortunately, applications received after that date cannot be considered.

It is proposed that an on-line Q&A session to address specific questions will be held on 28<sup>th</sup> February 2023 at 10.00 am. Please email <a href="mailto:employability.finance@highland.gov.uk">employability.finance@highland.gov.uk</a> to indicate if you wish to participate and a Microsoft Teams link will be issued.

Following receipt of proposals and initial eligibility check on proposals, an Assessment Panel will meet to assess and recommend projects to be funded. Projects will be notified of decisions late March 2023.

#### 6 Reporting

Successful applicants will be required to complete a monitoring return on a monthly basis, confirming progress made towards the outputs and outcomes agreed and the spend that has been incurred. A template will be provided for this purpose and regular and accurate reporting against this will be a key measure of performance within the agreed funding.

Where applicable and, as agreed for projects, a monitoring meeting will take place after 3 months of delivery and prior to completion of the project. Evidence of spend will require to be presented at the monitoring visits and to justify any claims made.

A final report will be required on completion of the project.

#### 7 Payment of Multiply Grant

Payment of 40% of the grant awarded will be on receipt of the offer of grant acceptance letter. Payment of the balance will depend on actual and evidenced expenditure and satisfactory progress and completion of monitoring forms as set out above. If the initial payment of 40% is not fully expended, then the applicant will required to pay any unspent balances back to Highland Council.

#### **UK Shared Prosperity – Highland**

#### **Multiply Grants Fund 2022 - 2025**

A fair, open, and equitable process has been considered for assessment of submissions. The following seeks to clarify the process and intent for applicants which will be scored by the assessment panel for this Multiply Challenge Fund.

Each application will be given a score for each section Each section will be scored 0 to 4 as shown:

All elements are important, but each has a weighting (shown below), indicating the importance of the information in relation to the others.

- Finally, the score and the weighting for each section is multiplied together to give a total out of 60.
- Please note that every section of each application must achieve a score of at least 1 i.e. acceptable to have met the minimum standard.
- Applications will then be ranked highest to lowest within each geographic area with funding allocated in that order until funds are fully utilised.
