MAIN STREET, C1045, LYBSTER BUILD OUT/UNCONTROLLED PEDESTRIAN CROSSING POINT - SCHEDULE

The Highland Council, in terms of the powers contained in section 39A of the **Roads (Scotland) Act 1984** as amended and of all other powers enabling them in that behalf **propose to construct** a build out (uncontrolled pedestrian crossing) on Main Street, C1045, Lybster as follows:

• 21 metres or thereby south of the Young Crescent, C1045 Main Street junction, Lybster.

The road narrowing is on both sides of the road at the same position along the carriageway by constructing a build out 1.8 metres wide flushed to the footpath at the west side of the carriageway and a build out on the east side of 0.5 metres flushed to the footpath. The build out has an upstand to math existing kerb levels and is 6.9 metres in length reducing the carriageway width to 3.5 metres kerb to kerb. Road signs and road markings will be installed as per the Traffic Signs Regulations and General Directions 2016. The priority is given to vehicles traveling in a southerly direction.

Additional footpath improvement works not covered by the **Roads (Scotland) Act 1984** on Main Street. C1045, Lybster as follows:

- A 2.1 metre wide footway along the gable end of the Lybster Community Centre with a 2.5 metre footpath continuation in a southerly direction to provide additional protection for the crossing point
- A 12 metre long continuation of the footpath on the east side of Main Street in a northerly direction opposite the Community Centre

THE HIGHLAND COUNCIL PROPOSE TO CONSTRUCT BUILD OUTS ON MAIN STREET, C1045, LYBSTER

Statement of Reasons

In the interests of road safety/vehicle speed reduction and to improve road safety for those walking and wheeling in the community, in particular children walking and cycling to and from Lybster Primary School, it is proposed to introduce a build out forming an uncontrolled pedestrian crossing on Main Street, C1045, Lybster. It is also proposed to carry out footpath improvements works around the Lybster Community Centre on Main Street.
