Setting, Curriculum and Learning through Play at Caol Nursery

Caol Nursery is situated in its own wing on the ground floor of Caol Primary School near to our Primary 1 classroom. It has its own entrance, a private outdoor play area and secure garden area. We have two nursery playrooms, both with easy access to the outdoor play area. We have the capacity for 60 children within our setting at any one time. Our staff ratio is 1 Early Years Practitioner to 8 pupils.

Curriculum - What do children learn in Nursery?

We aim to:

“Provide learning and teaching opportunities that follow the 3 to 18 national guidelines through the principles of Curriculum for Excellence; where your child can learn through meaningful and constructive play in the nursery, and ensure breadth, balance, continuity and progression for all levels of ability in the school in order to meet pupil's needs.” *Curriculum for Excellence, Building the Curriculum*



In Nursery, our children learn predominantly through play. This provides a developmentally appropriate means of learning about the world around them by

- Using their senses to explore and discover
- Relating new experiences to previous learning
- Sharing their experiences with others



Our staff are trained to develop and broaden the range of children's learning experiences to leave them confident, eager and enthusiastic learners looking forward to starting school. We aim to produce well-rounded, articulate children by providing a balanced curriculum covering all aspects of their development - social, emotional, physical and intellectual.

This encompasses the four capacities of Curriculum for Excellence:

- Successful Learners
- Effective Contributors
- Confident Individuals
- Responsible Citizens



Our curriculum includes 8 key areas:

- Literacy and English
- Numeracy and Mathematics
- Health and Wellbeing
- Expressive Arts
- Religious and Moral Education
- Sciences
- Social Studies
- Technologies

Listed below is a selection of the wide range of resources/experiences on offer to the children:

- Sand, water and messy play with a range of materials
- Imaginative play and role play opportunities
- Baking, cooking and experiencing different tastes to promote healthy eating
- Painting and modelling with junk, playdough, clay, etc.
- Cutting, gluing and mark-making
- Jigsaws and board games
- Construction toys e.g., indoor and outdoor blocks, Lego, Duplo, etc.
- Computer activities and programmable toys e.g., BeeBot, remote control gadgets
- Outdoor experiences in the school grounds e.g., investigating and exploring in the nursery garden
- A wide selection of loose parts- both inside and outside

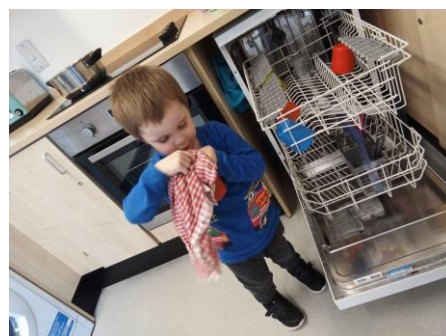


Children will also be given regular opportunities to: -

- Sing and participate in musical experiences
- Listen to stories, rhymes and poems
- Visit their local environment including the shore, wider school playgrounds, shops, library, etc.
- Care for plants and animals



- Enjoy energetic play in the school gym, assembly room and outdoors
- Meet visitors to the school e.g. Oral Hygienist, Health Visitor, Policemen, Entertainers, Countryside Ranger, etc.
- Make choices and decisions and lead their own learning
- Learn through real life contexts and develop life skills and independence
- Reflect on their own learning
- Learn to 'manage risks' in their play.



Outdoor Play

"There is a growing body of research that shows that young children's access to nature and outdoor play is positively associated with improved self-esteem, physical health, development of language skills and disposition to learning."
(*My World Outdoors – Care Inspectorate 2016*)

In Caol Nursery, we provide opportunities for the children to have regular access to play experiences outdoors. Our nursery outdoor space includes a mud kitchen, a loose parts area, a climbing area, wheeled toys, spaces for planting, an outdoor



stage, etc. The children have opportunities to be creative, use their imagination, problem solve, manage risk, negotiate, cooperate and communicate.



Nursery and Primary 1 share the same experiences and outcomes from the early level of Curriculum for Excellence, albeit differentiated to meet, challenge and extend children as appropriate.

Arrival

A typical day at Caol Nursery

On arrival, you will be met and welcomed by a member of our nursery team at the main entrance. Each child has their own coat peg in the nursery corridor, identified by their name/picture and outdoor jackets can be hung up there. There is also a storage area where your child's indoor shoes can be kept. It is helpful to have a complete change of clothing kept in a bag on your child's peg in case of accidents. **It is expected that a responsible adult will bring and collect your child. Nursery staff must be informed if someone else is bringing your child to Nursery, or collecting your child at the end of the session.** Nursery staff are available to parents/carers if you want to share any concerns or information.

Soft Start

On entry to the playroom, your child will be welcomed by our staff, then self-register and choose their own lunch. You will be asked to pre-select your child's lunch choices for each week, in advance, just in case, but we also like to encourage independence by allowing them to make a choice. The children can then choose where to play while other children arrive. At this time children stay in their own play room. Parents usually say their goodbyes at the door but we may invite you in to help your child settle, if necessary.



Circle Time

Once all the children are in, we have a short Circle Time to welcome everyone and discuss our topic, any news or events and the session's choice of free-play activities.



Learning through Play

For most of the day, the children have the freedom to choose from a wide range of play experiences in either of our two playrooms and outdoors. During free flow times, pupils go where they wish, we use the outdoor space or corridor to flow between rooms.



The following experiences are regularly on offer:

- Sand/water play
- Outdoor play
- Craft, Painting, art
- Music and musical toys

- Sensory play
- Messy play
- Drawing/mark making
- Book corner
- Role play area and dressing up
- Construction toys
- Small world toys
- Smartboard/computer
- Technology toys
- Jigsaws and puzzles

Snack Time



Snack time is an excellent opportunity for the children to learn good social skills and behaviours associated with eating and drinking e.g., chatting to other children and adults, developing good table manners, learning to use cutlery, offering and sharing food, learning to respect others and tasting and trying foods from different cultures.

Children are encouraged to sample a wide range of foods, with fresh fruit and milk or water offered daily. Children are encouraged to be as independent as possible, e.g., by serving, pouring, spreading, cutting, sharing and tidying away. The menu is shared with parents on the Parents' Noticeboard and on Google Classroom, and a copy of our Healthy Eating Policy is readily available in our Policies Folder. We also ensure the children have the opportunity to regularly prepare and cook food.

There is no charge for Nursery and Snack.

However, we do involve the children in a fundraising event and we may use some of the proceeds to buy foods, snacks and items for baking etc.



Lunch time

Our nursery children eat lunch at 11:30am-12:30pm in our school canteen. All of our pupils are entitled to a free lunch in the school canteen. Families may also opt to provide a packed lunch for their child, but we will still offer them a school meal too. Again, we encourage pupils to make decisions and be as independent as possible at lunchtime. More information about our nursery lunches will be shared with families after enrolment and menus are shared with parents as they are updated, usually one a term.



Tooth brushing Routine

As we are a Health Promoting Nursery, the children sometimes participate in tooth brushing after snack. Our staff team liaise with our local ChildSmile team to facilitate toothbrushing. Toothbrushing usually begins later in the academic year after parents have received information about the scheme.

Physical Play

We provide opportunities for daily physical play indoors and outdoors. This can take place in our school gym hall, assembly room, in the nursery outdoor area, the school playground or at the school MUGA. We also go for walks regularly in our local community.



Group Activity

The children have the opportunity to participate in a group activity which can include story time, drama, active games, music and movement, rhymes and singing.



End of the Play Session

The children are encouraged to tidy away the toys and games in preparation for going home. This is a very important skill and develops independence and organisation skills. The children gather together to share their learning, successes and ideas for the following day's session.

As the children become more familiar with the nursery routine, we encourage them to be increasingly independent with changing jackets, shoes and self-registration.



What to wear and Bring to Nursery



Clothing

Please ensure your child is dressed in comfortable, easy fitting clothes which do not hinder their ability to go to the toilet. Often children can become upset if they are unable to undo buttons or belts at the waist, so we encourage you to practise this at home with your child. It's best to avoid jeans, all-in-one suits and dungarees until your child can manage them independently. There are school sweatshirts available to buy from our school office if parents wish.



We encourage the children to be as independent as possible, but understand that accidents can happen. Therefore, we encourage parents to provide a change of clothes which can be left in a bag on your child's coat peg.

Please ensure all jackets, shoes, wellies, etc. are labelled with your child's name.



Footwear

For hygiene, we change out of our outdoor shoes and change into indoor shoes while in the playroom. We recommend slip on or Velcro fastening plimsolls. Flip-flops, slippers and heavy trainers are not suitable.



Both indoor and outdoor shoes should be clearly labelled.



Outdoor Play

Outdoor Play is a regular and vital feature of your child's experiences at nursery. Therefore, your child will need a suitable outdoor jacket for the weather (e.g. waterproof, warm) and appropriate footwear. The Nursery also has outdoor playsuits and boots provided by the council. In winter, the children will need a hat, scarf and gloves to keep warm.





In summer, on our rare sunny days, the children will need a sun hat and sun cream.

To summarise, your child will need:

- Comfortable, easy fitting clothes
- Indoor shoes
- Jacket and outdoor footwear appropriate for the weather
- A change of clothes which can be left on his/her coat peg
- All clothing and footwear labelled

Planning and Assessment

Children vary so much in maturity levels that assessment is very individual to each child. Staff will observe children's progress and development needs during their play. Experiences are planned around these findings to support and extend the learning for the child. We plan using Floor Books, Responsive Planning Sheets and the Early Level Literacy and Numeracy progressions. We record progress against Early Level Es and Os.

Integral to daily practice is the celebration of children's individual achievements. This is done in many ways – through regular praise, taking photographs, Google Classroom posts, recording children's thoughts, ideas and key learning observations in our Learning Profiles. Evidence is built up over the year with the child through the child's 'Learning Profile' document which is very much 'owned' by the child in partnership with the Parent/Carer. The child's 'Key Worker' will support the child in his 'Learning Profile' and share this with parents digitally each term.

Your child's Learning Profile will be passed on to the Primary 1 teacher at the end of the school year. This will aid the transition process from Nursery to Primary 1.

There will be on-going opportunities for parents to share in their child's 'Learning Profile'. Early in the session, parents are invited to an information session at the nursery when the operational details of our planning and assessment are outlined and discussed. Alongside daily contacts, there are also two formal 'Reporting to Parents' at the nursery in November and May. At the end of the academic year, you will also receive a written report about



your child's development in Literacy and English, Numeracy and Health and Wellbeing.

A copy of the Highland Council's Planning and Assessment Guidance is available on request. It is used as an aid in taking forward the children's interests to extend their development and learning. Staff will display a copy of the weekly plan on the notice board in the corridor, and we welcome parental input at any time. (We have a suggestion box with paper and pens for this purpose).

We also run Stay and Play sessions where parents are invited in for part of a session to play with their child within the nursery setting.

Attendance and Absence

We strongly encourage parents to ensure that their child attends Nursery on a daily basis. This ensures that the child settles into a regular school routine and enjoys a continuity of experience. In line with Highland Council recommendations, it is important that you let us know if your child is likely to be absent from Nursery. Please telephone the school absence line and leave us a message to let us know the reason for your child's absence.

Child Protection

Caol Nursery follows the national strategy known as "Getting It Right for Every Child" (GIRFEC). Getting It Right places children's and young people's needs first, and provides coordinated help where this is required.

Services involved include Social Work, Health and Police.

The Named Person with overall responsibility is the Head Teacher, but all staff have had training in GIRFEC and are fully aware of their role in supporting children.

Emergency Closures and Adverse Weather Arrangements

In the event of severe weather conditions, parents should make the decision on whether or not, to send their child to nursery. You can access the Highland Council website to check for school closures on www.highland.gov.uk

You can also telephone the PIN number system 0800 564 2272 (SCHOOL PIN number 04 1650) which will be updated as soon as possible to let you know if the school is closed.

Local radio stations issue news and weather bulletins on traffic conditions and school closures. Transmissions may not cover all households and may be subject to re-scheduling but should be helpful. Parents are advised to remain “tuned in” to on-going road, weather, or school information updates.

Emergency Contacts

When you enrol your child you will be asked to provide us with the name, address and telephone number of a contact person in case of emergency. It is essential that this information is kept up to date, as we need to contact you should your child become ill while at nursery. Please let us know if you change any contact details, or if there is a change to your emergency contact's details

Excursions and Consent

Visits beyond the school grounds are an important aspect of a child's education and once the children are settled, we take children to local places of interest throughout the year e.g. shore, shops, library, etc. At the beginning of the session you will be asked to sign a consent form giving your permission to cover all local area visits. If the children are to be taken on an excursion outside our local area, you will be informed in advance by letter. Staff will also undertake a Risk Assessment prior to the visit in accordance with our Policy on School Outings.

Health Care and Illnesses

We work closely in partnership with Health Visitors to support children and families as and when necessary. It is important that you inform us of any medical conditions your child may have – asthma, allergies, food intolerances, etc. – and of any changes that might occur during the year in order that we can update records as appropriate.

In the event of illness occurring or an accident happening during nursery hours, parents will be informed as soon as possible.



*If your child has been ill (vomiting) and/or is suffering from diarrhoea, he/she should not attend Nursery until 48 hours after symptoms have ceased.

Administration of Medication

Some children may require medication in order that they can continue to attend nursery.

If your child needs to have medication during their time at nursery, please contact a member of our nursery team who will share our Administration of Medication Form and Policy with you. Any changes need to be communicated with us quickly so we can update their Personal Care Plan.

Liaison with Outside Agencies

The Nursery works in partnership with a range of support agencies as appropriate to meet the needs of children. We have visits from time to time from the Speech and Language Therapist, the Pre-School Home Visiting Teacher, the Oral Hygienist and the Health Visitor.

We will, of course, consult with parents and carers and seek permission before referring any child to an outside agency.

Parents who may have a concern about their child's development or learning can also ask for a referral to be made.

Minor Accidents and Upsets

You will be informed when you collect your child of any minor accidents in which he/she may have been involved. Such rare incidents are also recorded in our accident book.

Your child does not have to be toilet trained to enrol in nursery. If your child has difficulty with toileting, please inform us to save them becoming distressed or embarrassed. We encourage parents to provide a complete change of clothes, with nappies or pull ups and wipes if required. Your child's change of clothing can be left in a bag on their coat peg.

Parental Involvement

We respect, understand and value the contribution parents make towards their child's learning and we aim to keep parents up to date with nursery developments and share information regarding your child's progress.

Throughout the academic year, there are opportunities for parents to help out on nursery trips or come into the playroom to read a story. We are always looking for visitors to come along and share their expertise and knowledge with the children, so if you can help out in any way, please let us know.



Photographs

Our staff take photographs of various activities in the nursery. These photographs are displayed in the nursery displays, notice boards, nursery corridor, and provide evidence of children's achievements and interests in their Learning Profile folders. We post photos on our private Google Classroom and our staff will try to update you with photos of your child on a weekly basis. We ask for your permission to take and share photos in our 'Starting Nursery- Personal Planning Survey', which we update every six months.



Visitors to the Nursery

We encourage visitors to the Nursery to extend the children's interest and learning. This might include local health visitors, emergency service workers, the school dentist, the oral hygienist, musicians, countryside rangers, etc.

Parents are welcome to contribute their skills – please don't be shy. We invite families in for a 'Stay, Play and Learn' session each term and love to invite you in to share special events and occasions together too!
