



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Three sizes of playparks

We are going to separate playparks into 3 sizes so you can play close to home AND also have occasional bigger parks (you may have to travel to them though).



One in each region, depending on what money is available.



One in each town, large village and large suburb.



Those will be smaller parks, where you can hopefully walk or wheel to.
