More to River Ness Flood Alleviation Project than meets the eye...

As Summer turns into Autumn, works continues to build momentum on the River Ness Flood Alleviation project. Before construction of the flood wall can commence, Morgan Sindall must first ensure the area is protected both ecologically and environmentally. To do this, a team of local specialists have been engaged to carry out extensive research. In this months' newsletter read about a few of those experts.

Arboriculturalist Callum McCutcheon (pictured top right) has been employed by Morgan Sindall for Phase 1 of the River Ness Flood Alleviation Scheme.. On a daily basis Callum is on site to ensure the safety and protection of trees during construction work. There are over 30 trees between Ness Bridge and Friars Bridge, predominantly Lime trees.

Ecological Experts Highland Birchwood recently carried out an extensive survey on the habitation of species in the River Ness works area. In particular, to find out if red squirrels, bats and otters were visible in the locale. The report concluded there was no sign of habitation of those species at this time within the area of works. Local Archaeologists Lynn Fraser and Mary Peteranna from RoCAS (Ross & Cromarty Archaeological Services) were employed during the enabling works earlier this year. In Phase 1 they anticipate the possibility of finding remains of earlier building and other archaeological deposits surviving below the build up of the river bank. The image below illustrates two pottery fragments from the neck of a 16th-17th century stoneware jug with a distinctive "Wild Man" face (see below). These were recovered by Morgan Sindall worker Gavin Thomson during test pit excavation at the junction of Bank Street and Douglas Row.
