Learning through history

Most may remember but, for the younger generation, in 1989 the Ness Viaduct (pictured above), the only rail connection to the North of Scotland, collapsed thus demonstrating the power of nature. Luckily it was reported that all locomotives were in the Inverness depot at the time of the incident so no one was harmed.

We can also look to more recent events such as the severe flooding in the South of England where over 1700 homes were flooded and residents had to be evacuated by boat (pictured top right)

One great use of history is that we can learn from it. It has already been highlighted the dangers the river holds as there have been occasions of high tides and surges on the River Ness recently, but thanks to quick thinking, fast acting and team work, damage was kept to a minimum.

Kessock Bridge works will start on the 10 February and run until 31 July 2014. **Bank Street** will remain closed until further notice and access will only be available to authorised vehicles during this time.

Huntly Street will remain closed between Young Street and Greig Street and also between Celt Street and Balnain Street due to Flood Wall construction.

Douglas Row will remain closed until further notice due to drainage works.
