Dornoch Academy Associated School Group Overview

Report by Director of Education, Culture and Sport Service

Summary

This report provides an update of key information in relation to the schools within the Dornoch Academy Associated School Group (ASG), and provides useful links to further information in relation to these schools.

1.0 ASG PROFILE

The primary schools in this area serve approximately 200 pupils, with the secondary school serving 287 young people.

In respect of Dornoch Academy, this has shown a steady increase up to last session, but indications are that there will be a reduction over the next 5-6 years before a projected increase again. The primary schools remain relatively steady.

There is a recruitment process underway for the appointment of a Depute Rector at Dornoch Academy.

1.1 ATTAINMENT AND ACHIEVEMENT

1.1.1 Dornoch Academy

Level 7 = Advanced Higher

Level 6 = Higher

Level 5 = Standard Grade Credit Award

Level 4 = Standard Grade General Award

Level 3 = Standard Grade Foundation Award

Attainment in S4

5+ Level 5

At 50%, pupils performed better in this measure than the previous S4 cohort. Dornoch attainment is above authority and national [37%] averages in this measure. The school is

considered to be performing much better than schools with similar characteristics in this measure over a three year period. They are also performing very well against comparator schools in Scotland [2 / 21 comparators] this year. Girls performed significantly better than boys [68% v 32%]. However, this cohort of boys performed in line with Cognitive Ability Test predictions [undertaken in S1]. Their attainment does not reflect an overall trend in terms of boys' attainment across the school.

5+ Level 3 and 4

Data shows that the school is performing significantly below other national comparators this year [86% achieving at 5+ L3 and 80% at 5+ L4]. English at level 3 has shown a slight improvement overall compared to last year [96%] but Mathematics [80%] shows a declining picture over a three year period. However, the data does not include Standard Grades as well as Intermediate 1 and 2 awards sat by pupils in S3 and therefore appears to be significantly worse than reality.

Attainment in S5

3+ and 5 + Level 6

Attainment in S5 was not as strong as previous cohorts with this year's attainment being the lowest of the last five years [3+ L6 - 30% and 12% at 5+ L6]. However, attainment in the 3+ measure is still above authority and national averages [27%] and the school is considered to be performing much better than schools with similar characteristics in this measure over a three year period. Attainment at 5+ L6 nearly matched authority averages [13%] and the school is considered to be performing much better than schools with similar characteristics in this measure over a three year period. Cognitive Ability Tests taken at S1 predicted that this cohort would attain less well at Higher level than previous cohorts. Pupils within this S5 cohort were less able to learn independently and required significant input from teachers to ensure success.

Attainment in S6

1+ Level 7

Attainment in S6 was very strong with 33% of pupils achieving 1+ Advanced Highers. This is a huge improvement on the previous year [15%] which reflects the very able cohort within session 2011 – 12's S6. This cohort's attainment was significantly above the national average of 1+ Advanced Highers [16%]. At this measure, the school is considered to be performing much better than schools with similar characteristics over a three year period. They also were top of the comparator list in this measure.

Whole school issues - strengths

The school offers a broad range of awards at a variety of levels e.g. from International Baccalaureate in Modern Languages [in which the student gained Distinction] to Rural Skills.

Pupils studying Chemistry generally performed well in all measures. In particular, at Higher, 60% pupils achieved grades A / B. Pupils performed better in this subject than in others. Pupils also performed very well in all measures from Intermediate 1 to Advanced Higher in French. Both the Biology and Geography departments performed well at Standard Grade [70 and 65% credit passes respectively] as did Drama with 100% A / B passes at Intermediate 2 in S4. Hospitality also continued to produce good results at

Intermediate 2 with 100% grade As. Higher Religious and Moral Philosophy is also worthy of mention as 69% of students gained A / B passes as is Rural Skills where all students gained an Intermediate 1 award.

Whole school issues - areas for development

As in previous years, the Mathematics department fared less well than other departments within the school and also less well when compared with ten most similar cohorts from other schools around Scotland. This department needs to ensure that pupils' progress is tracked and monitored on a regular basis and that staff access CPD on core learning and teaching issues.

Achievement in English was variable with underperformance at both Intermediate 1 and Intermediate 2. Performance in Access 3 and Higher was more encouraging. As in Maths, this department needs to ensure that pupils' progress is tracked and monitored on a regular basis.

Attainment in the Religious and Moral Philosophy department is variable with real successes at Higher but significantly poorer performance than other departments in Intermediate 1 and Intermediate 2. It has been recommended that the school's policy to award at these levels should be revisited.

The Business Management department also fared less well last session in several measures [Intermediate 2 / Higher / Advanced Higher]. It is widely acknowledged that this department caters for some less able pupils. However, consideration should be given to the department's presentation policy [several pupils moved from Intermediate 2 to Intermediate 1 very late in the session and gained mixed success].

1.1.2 Wider Achievement and Notable Successes

It is clear from this report that Dornoch ASG demonstrates strengths in developing citizenship opportunities for all pupils.

Highland Council Nurseries and Partner centres are to be supported by a Principal Teacher (Early Years) based in Drummuie. This ASG has an entitlement to 0.5 TFE Principal Teacher posts, and this position is currently filled, and shares a full-time Principal Teacher with Golspie ASG.

Core staffing is calculated using the Highland Staffing Model, which takes account of national agreements for P1 to P3 class sizes. As a result, all primaries in this ASG are staffed according to the model.

It is important to note that, in addition to core staffing for each school, a model will be used to provide an appropriate level of ASN cover to each school within the ASG. This model was approved at Adult and Children's Services Committee, 26th September 2012. Report ACS-33-12.

- 2.25 FTE ASN teachers
- 12.29 FTE PSA staff (assuming FTE = 27.5 hrs)

Examples of the youth work presently undertaken within the Dornoch ASG:

Between April 2012 and March 2013 there were almost 3000 contacts with young people. A youth club is run by HLH in Dornoch every Tuesday over the autumn and winter months regularly attracting 20 – 30 youngsters. FUSION is an HLH brand for diversionary activities run at weekends throughout the school year – centre based activities and trips, football for girls and boys at TRACC (for which transport is provided) and music jamming sessions and performances have all been taken up by youngsters across the ASG area.

The Youth Development Officer (YDO) and sessional staff support the Kyle of Sutherland Youth Development Group to run weekly clubs and other provision in Bonar Bridge and Ardgay. Achievement is high on the agenda and includes: Duke of Edinburgh Awards (12 gold completions and 26 bronze groups); 24 John Muir Awards; and 33 youngsters have nearly completed the new Saltire Awards. There is close working between the YDO, the high school, Skills Development Scotland and the community. Examples include an Intergenerational Project on Tuesdays (craft and model flying sessions) and a vocational group working on Mondays with 5 at risk young people who have been undertaking community based projects. The YDO enabled youngsters to participate in the Sutherland Youth Conference in November 2012 and at Sutherland Youth Forum meetings (about every 3 months) and at Highland Youth Voice (twice a year).
