# **Dornoch Academy Associated School Group Overview**

# Report by Director of Education, Culture and Sport Service

### Summary

This report provides an update of key information in relation to the schools within the Dornoch Academy School Associated School Group (ASG), and provides useful updated links to further information in relation to these schools.

#### 1.0 ASG PROFILE

The primary schools in this area serve over 200 pupils, with the secondary school serving 274 young people. (Appendix 1 provides the primary school rolls breakdown).

#### 1.1 Attainment and Achievement

#### 1.1.1 Dornoch Academy

# **Attainment – Performance Summary**

Level 7 = Advanced Higher

Level 6 = Higher

Level 5 = Standard Grade Credit Award

Level 3 - Standard Grade Foundation Award

#### **Attainment in S4**

Attainment in S4 last session was strong in all key measures [L3, L4 and L5] with pupils performing better than previous S4 cohorts in all three measures.

By the end of S4, almost all students achieved qualifications in basic literacy and numeracy. The school has continued its policy of presenting students at Access 3 in English in S3 to ensure that every pupil leaves school with a basic qualification.

#### 5+ Level 3 and 4

100% of the S4 cohort were successful in the measure 5 + L3, this being the highest attainment in this measure in the last three years. Attainment was above national [95%] and authority [94%] averages. The school performed better than almost all of its comparators last year but over a three year period is considered to be performing less well than schools with similar characteristics. There was a significant improvement in attainment in the 5+ L4 measure this year with 98% of pupils achieving at this level. The school performed much better than authority [85%] and national [82%] averages. As in the 5 + L3 measure, the school performed better at 5+ L4 than almost all of its

comparators last year. In addition, over a three year period, the school is considered to be performing better than schools with similar characteristics.

#### 5+ Level 5

69% of pupils achieved 5 + credits which is the best attainment in this measure for several years. This strong performance ensured the school performed better than any of its comparators and in the top 10% of schools nationally. It also performed well above national [38%] and authority [41%] averages in this measure. Over a three year period, the school is considered to be doing much better than schools with similar characteristics. Approximately 30% of this cohort is now predicted to achieve 5 + Highers this session.

#### Attainment in S5

#### 3+ and 5 + Level 6

Attainment in S5 showed a slight improvement in both key measures [3 and 5 + Level 6] which is encouraging. This helped the school to continue to perform much better than comparator schools over a three year period. Within the 3+L6 measure, at 32%, the school continues to perform above local and national averages [28%] and better than schools with similar characteristics. The school is operating within the top 30% nationally in this measure. It is also operating just above authority averages [28%]. Girls performed significantly better than boys this year [44% compared with 20%].

The school continued to perform strongly in the 5 + L6 measure with 16% of students achieving at this level. Attainment is just above authority and national averages [12% and 13%] and places the school in the top 30% of schools nationally. Over a three year period, the school is considered to be performing much better than those with similar characteristics.

# Attainment in S6

#### 1+ Level 7

Whilst performance at Advanced Higher was down on the previous year at 16%, this reflects the ability level of the cohort. Attainment in this measure was only just below authority averages [17%].

#### 3+ and 5+ Level 6

Attainment in S6 was less strong than in previous cohorts at Higher but this reflected the ability level of this cohort [as demonstrated in S5]. Within the 3 + L6 measure [34%], the school performed slightly below national [38%] and authority [39%] averages. This performance resulted in the school dropping in the ratings when compared with schools of similar characteristics but, due to strong performance in the previous two years, the school is still considered to be doing much better than its comparators. Attainment in the 5 + L6 measure was significantly lower than the previous year at 20%. The school is now operating in the bottom 30% nationally and below authority [27%] averages.

#### Whole school issues

As in previous years, pupils were presented across a broad range of levels and courses. Performance in Art and Design was strong at both Int. 1 and 2 with 80% of students achieving grade As. Presentation rates were, however, low. This department is fairly selective in which students are presented for national qualifications and therefore secures better results than those departments which have a more inclusive policy on presentation.

The level of presentation at SG Biology was the best of the last five years and 96% of students achieved credit passes.

57% of students sitting Int. 2 English in S4 achieved grades A or B. Levels of presentation have increased from previous years. In Drama at Int. 2 level, all pupils achieved grades A or B which was a particularly strong performance. A significant number of pupils did better in drama than in

other subjects. Presentation in this subject is also slowly rising showing that it is increasingly popular with students.

A strong entry of 30 S4 pupils at Int. 2 French resulted in 80% achieving grades A or B. 17 out of 18 pupils also secured A or B passes in Int. 1 at S4 underlining that the presentation policy within this department is working well. 79% of pupils also achieved grade A or B in German at Int. 2 in S4.

78% of pupils sitting Standard Grade Geography gained credit passes despite a lack of continuity in staffing within this department last session. Performance in Higher History was encouraging with 10 out of 17 pupils gaining A or B grades. The number of pupils [14 out of 29] gaining a credit 1 award at SG was also the best out of the last five years. Presentation at SG has risen steadily in the last five years.

The continued partnership between the school and Northern College for Hospitality [Practical Cookery] has resulted in 4 out of 5 students gaining a grade A at Int. 2.

76% of students sitting Int. 2 Maths gained A or B awards and 61% gained the same in Int. 1. Performance was better than in previous years in these measures. This was not replicated across other measures, however.

All students presented for Int. 1 in S4 - 6 at Rural Skills gained an award.

The link Quality Improvement Officer expressed some concern about the number of students who attained grade D or received no award in a range of measures including Maths and Biology Highers. The HT underlined the very inclusive policy which operates in many departments across the school and that students are not prevented from entering courses despite prior learning indicating potential lack of success. For example, several pupils who did not perform particularly strongly in S4 in Maths were presented for Higher in S5. 50% of students presented then failed to gain an award. In Biology, 7 / 10 pupils failed to gain a credible award at Higher. The school recognises the need to consider its presentation policy and the guidance provided to pupils at subject level to ensure they secure awards which are relevant to their ability level / prior learning. Progression pathways for students need to be well-defined from S3 onwards to ensure that each year of coursework adds value to prior learning.

Achievement in English at Higher was disappointing [10 grades A / B but 9 grade Ds or no awards] and performance at Advanced Higher also gave cause for concern with 3 out of 4 students not gaining a credible award after a year of coursework. Attainment in the Geography department was also less strong at Standard Grade and Higher with 6 out of 11 pupils failing to gain a credible award in the latter measure. The Music department also fared less well last session at Int. 2 [S4] and Higher when compared with comparator schools. Presentation levels within P.E. also give some cause for concern as there was no presentation at Higher this year.
