Portree High School Associated School Group Overview

Report by Director of Education, Culture and Sport Service

Summary

This report provides an update of key information in relation to the schools within the Portree High School Associated School Group (ASG), and provides useful updated links to further information in relation to these schools.

1.0 ASG PROFILE

The Portree Associated School Group (ASG) consists of Portree High School and the following primary schools: Broadford, Carbost, Dunvegan, Edinbane, Elgol, Kilmuir, Knockbreck, Macdiarmid, Portree, Raasay, Sleat, Staffin and Struan. The primary schools in this area serve over 680 pupils, with the secondary school serving 576 young people.

There is an Acting Head Teacher in Raasay Primary and Cluster Head Teachers serving Staffin & Kilmuir; MacDiarmid & Knockbreck; Dunvegan & Edinbane; Struan & Carbost Primary Schools.

Head Teachers are in receipt of support through the Quality Improvement Officer, Additional Support Needs Officer and the Early Years Officer, along with staff at the Area Education Office.

S4 Modern Studies pupils made history by taking the first Gaelic tour of the Scottish Parliament building.

S1 recently enjoyed a 'European' football tournament organised by the French department, whereby they represented different countries. The Czech Republic defeated Scotland in the final!! A great effort from all who took part - well done.

Pupils represented the school at the Inspire Aspire Awards ceremony in the City Chambers, Glasgow Inspire> **ASPIRE** is a unique programme for schools to help make

the most of the teaching and learning opportunities arising from the London 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games. Using a special poster template, young people developed a personal plan of action inspired by the Olympic values and the character qualities demonstrated by Olympians and Paralympians.

Students for the UK Mathematical Trust Maths challenge saw 30 students for the Junior Challenge, 30 students for the Intermediate Challenge and 30 students for the Senior Challenge. This challenge is administered by the UKMT which is based in the University of Leeds.
