# Gairloch High School Associated School Group Overview

#### Report by Director of Education, Culture and Sport Service

#### Summary

This report provides an update of key information in relation to the schools within the Gairloch High School Associated School Group (ASG), and provides useful updated links to further information in relation to these schools.

#### 1.0 ASG PROFILE

Gairloch Primary and Poolewe Primary Schools have a Cluster Head Teacher. Bualnaluib, Kinlochewe and Shieldaig Primary Schools have a Head Teacher in each school. Head Teachers are in receipt of support through the Quality Improvement Officer and the Area Office. The primary schools in this area serve over 150 pupils, with the secondary school serving 152 young people.

Points to note

- Measures refer to a small number of pupils in some cases and thus each pupil can represent several %. The school has reported that several higher achieving pupils have left before end of S6, which in some cases has impacted on these results.
- The % of pupils gaining 5+ level 3 awards has remained the same for the past 2 *three year averages*, performing around average nationally
- The % of pupils gaining 5+ level 4 has been broadly similar for the past 3 *three year* averages, remaining in 3<sup>rd</sup> decile
- The % of pupils gaining 5+ level 5 shows a slight increase from the previous *three year average* and is now second decile
- The % of pupils gaining 1+, 3+ or 5+ Highers has remained around average nationally over the past 2 years, with a slight increase in 2013 in 1+ and 5+ Highers, but otherwise it shows decline over the 5 three year averages.

Points to note

- All pupils gained English and almost all gained Mathematics at level 3 or above over the past 2 years.
- The number of pupils gaining 5+ level 3 was broadly similar to 2012 but has now moved up from decile 7 to 5
- The % of pupils gaining 5+ level 4 in 2013 is the highest for the five year period, and now at decile 1.
- 5+ level 5 results remained high nationally, at decile 2 for the second year running.

- 1+ and 3+ level 6 awards have the highest number for 5 years and are now at the highest decile nationally
- The school also reports on its success with numbers of pupils gaining 4 Highers, which in 2013 was achieved by 4 pupils, their highest result in the past 5 years.
- The numbers of pupils gaining 5+ level 6 was broadly similar to last year and around national average range. [Four pupils in S5 gained 5 Highers].
- 10 pupils gained appeals in S5.

- The number of pupils gaining 3+ Highers is now around average nationally and highest in 3 years
- 5+ Higher results are improving and now in 3<sup>rd</sup> decile, with the 2013 having best results for 4 years.
- Whilst the numbers gaining level 7 awards are very small and results therefore not a required reporting measure, it is recognised that the school has continued to provide a range of Advanced Higher successes and 2013 shows results comparing well with the national picture.

#### Summary

• Pupil attainment in Gairloch High has shown some decline when considering the three year rolling averages, but there have been some notable successes in 2013.

# 1.1.2 Wider Achievement & Notable Successes

#### Secondary – Gairloch High School – link to school webpage

<u>Malawi Adventure</u> - On the 2<sup>nd</sup> October ten pupils and four staff from Gairloch High School flew from Edinburgh Aiport to visit friends and learning partners in Mlozi School in Malawi. The partnership began several years ago when Dr Caley became a Global Teacher and visited Mlozi. Previously successful staff exchanges have taken place with support from Link Community Development and the Global Council.

<u>Young Ambassador Programme</u> - Two pupils in S5 were chosen to attend the Young Ambassadors conference in September, which was run by the Youth Sport Trust in partnership with **sport**scotland. This training qualified them as Young Sports Ambassadors for Gairloch High School,

<u>Archaeolgical Dig</u> – On Thursday 25<sup>th</sup> October Mr Port and five pupils helped at the roundhouse dig above Achtercairn. Although wet and windy for part of the morning the pupils assisted with excavation and mapping. During the time at the site, the pupils were involved in uncovering two potentially important finds.

**Pupil Success in Highland Dance** – A pupil has become a Premier Dancer. On 1<sup>st</sup> June she passed, Highly Commended, the British Association of Teachers of Dance Blue Riband exam in Highland Dance. She received a Highly Commended in the Sailors Hornpipe as well and is on her way to qualifying as a teacher of Highland Dance.

**Pupil Success in Gaelic Speaking Competition** - Four pupils have done very well in an annual Gaelic speaking competition. The competition organised by the Gaelic Society of London involves pupils from all over Scotland. Winners were noted in the Senior Fluent Speakers' and the Senior Learners' competitions.

**Pupil Success in Open University Course** - An S6 pupil has passed her OU *Introduction to Law in Contemporary Scotland* course. She has also completed, as part of her S6 studies, a TEFL (Teaching English as a Foreign Language) qualification. In addition she trained as an adviser with Citizen's Advice Bureau and has spent time with the Alness based CAB Housing Project where she has an opportunity for further work experience.

**Indoor Rowing** - On Sunday 20th January, pupils travelled to Heriot Watt University in Edinburgh to participate in the 2013 Scottish Indoor Rowing Championships. All three pupils rowed personal best distances in their respective races. A pupil competed in the tough J15, 5 minute race: and rowed 1158m which placed her 22nd out of 33. A second pupil had to row for 4 minutes in the J14 age group: 944m placed her 9<sup>th</sup> out of 23 girls. The remaining pupil rowed a distance of 493m in 2 minutes put her in 1st place, 11m ahead of the competition. This earned her a gold medal and the title of J12 Scottish Champion. Gairloch High School was the only Local Authority School represented at the event. All the other competitors were from large private schools and Scottish rowing clubs. Congratulations to all three girls for their effort and determination.

#### **Bualnaluib**

In September the school had a lot of success at the Wester Ross Mod in Poolewe – pupils won 1st in poetry and Bible reading, 2<sup>nd</sup> in Poetry, and 2 3rds in Poetry. In art pupils were particularly successful and won 2 firsts and 2 thirds.

Last term the school entered a selection of art work into the annual Tesco Bank Art competition for Schools competition. 5,836 entries were received and 10 winners were selected. One of the pupil's pieces along with another 13 were selected as a further 14 winners. A P6 pupil was selected as inspiration for Scottish Ballet's production of Hansel and Gretel which was performed in Eden court in Jan 2014. The school has received a copy of the programme and the pupil's picture certainly has influenced the art work on the cover ( a shadowy night scene with a huge bright moon) and a scary wild pig from the Picture, is featured inside. The pupil and his family won tickets for the ballet in January.

In November, pupil's won 4 medals (Boys 2<sup>nd</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> and Girls 2<sup>nd</sup>) in the ASG Inter-School Primary Cross Country Competition.

In November the school raised £40 for Children in Need.

In December the school raised over £687 for School funds by putting on a community Ceilidh which was very well attended by the wider community. The Ceilidh featured Gaelic & English, Scot's songs and tin whistles, which showcased the input received from Feis Rois. It also featured 3 pipers and an accordionist.

A P7 won a regional Art Competition run by an Inverness Hair Salon. The task was to design a logo for the new salon and the pupil won an iPod and £100 for School fund.

Core staffing is calculated using the Highland Staffing Model, which takes account of national agreements for P1 to P3 class sizes. As a result, all primaries in this ASG are staffed according to the model.
