Summary

This report provides an update of key information in relation to the schools within the Alness Academy School Associated School Group (ASG), and provides useful updated links to further information in relation to these schools.

1.0 ASG PROFILE

The primary schools in this area serve over 670 pupils, with the secondary school serving 469 young people.
