Late Hours Catering Licence Application – Mohammed Afif, Zoom Takeaway, 23 Baron Taylor Street, Inverness (Ward 15 – Inverness Central)

# **Report by the Legal Manager**

## **Summary**

This Report relates to an application for a late hours catering licence in relation to Zoom takeaway, 23 Baron Taylor Street, Inverness.

This item is subject to a formal hearing procedure.

# 1.0 Background

1.1 The Highland Council has resolved that in terms of the Civic Government (Scotland) Act 1982 a licence will be required for the operation of a late hours catering premises. A licence is required where the premises are selling meals or refreshments during any of the hours between 11.00pm and 5.00am.

## 2.0 Current Licence

- 2.1 Mr Mohamed Afif currently holds a licence for the premises at Zoom Takeaway, 23 Baron Taylor Street, Inverness. The current licence expires on 27 July 2014.
- **2.2** The premises are currently licenced for the following hours:

Monday to Wednesday – to 12 midnight Thursday to Saturday – to 3.00am Sunday – to 1.00am

2.3 The current Late Hours Catering Policy Hours (in relation to all settlements which have late opening liquor licences) which were agreed by the Highland Licensing Committee on 5<sup>th</sup> February 2013 are:

Wednesday to Sunday - to 3.00am Monday and Tuesday - to 12 midnight

#### 3.0 Application

- 3.1 On 2 April 2013 a further application was submitted by Mr Afif for a late hours catering licence for hours which are outwith the current policy. The hours applied for are:
- 3.2 Monday and Tuesday to 12 midnight
  Wednesday, Thursday and Sunday to 3.00am
  Friday and Saturday to 4.00am
- **3.3** Appendix 1 contains a location plan of the premises for Members information.

#### 4.0 Process

- **4.1** Following receipt of the application a copy of the same was circulated to the following Agencies/Services for consultation:
  - Police Scotland
  - Scottish Fire & Rescue Service
  - TEC Services (Environmental Health)
  - Planning and Building Standards Service

# 5.0 Objection

- **5.1** A letter of objection was received on 7 June 2013 from Police Scotland in relation to the application.
- 5.2 In terms of Schedule 1 Paragraph 3(e) (iii) of the Civic Government (Scotland) Act 1982 any objections to an application for licence should be submitted within 28 days of the application being received.
- 5.3 The letter from Police Scotland was received outwith the period detailed above in 5.2.
- **5.4** However Schedule 1 Paragraph 3(2) of the Act states that:

'Notwithstanding sub-paragraph (1)(e) above, it shall be competent for a Licensing Authority to entertain an objection or representation received by them before they take a final decision upon the application to which it relates if they are satisfied that there is sufficient reason why it was not made in the time required under that sub-paragraph'.

If the Committee are minded to accept the late objection it will be circulated to Members at the meeting and can be taken into account when determining the application. If the Committee do not accept the reasons for the late submission the application will be determined in its absence.
