## Application for the grant of a Premises Licence under the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005

## Report by the Clerk to the Licensing Board

**Summary** 

Ref: HC/RSL/1691

This Report relates to an application for the grant of a Premises Licence for:

Premises: Torridon Youth Hostel, Fassaig, Achnasheen, IV22 2EZ

Applicant: SYHA (Trading) Ltd, per Lindsays, Glasgow

## 1.0 Background

- 1.1 This is an application for a premises licence in respect of a youth hostel which offers accommodation to travellers and tourists. The Hostel is situated at the head of upper Loch Torridon.
- 1.2 On 9 January 2014 the Licensing Board received an application for the grant of a Premises Licence from the applicant's agent, Lindsays, 1 Royal Bank Place, Buchanan Street, Glasgow G1 3AA.
  - The application was accompanied by the necessary Section 50 Certification in terms of Planning, Building Standards and Food Hygiene, and the statutory fee.
- 1.3 The Board has advertised the application on the Council's website for a period of 21 days and the applicant has to display the Notice on site for the same period (23 January 2014 to 13 February 2014). Confirmation of site note has been received.
- 1.4 In accordance with standard procedure, Police Scotland, Highlands and Islands Fire and Rescue Service, The Council's TEC Services (Environmental Health), Planning and Building Standards were consulted on the application.
  - Notification and a copy of the application have been sent to NHS Highland and to the Local Community Council.
  - A notice of the application has been sent to and all the people listed under S21(1) of the Act
- 1.5 Four objections have been received in respect of the application as detailed in Appendix 1.

## 2.0 Legislation

2.1 The Licensing Board must in considering and determining the application, consider whether any grounds of refusal apply and if none of them applies, the Board must grant the application.

Relevant ground of refusal may be -

- The premises are excluded premises;
- 2. The grant of the application will be inconsistent with one or more of the licensing objectives, having regard to;
  - (i) the nature of the activities proposed to be carried on in the subject premises, (ii) the location, character and condition of the premises, and (iii) the persons likely to frequent the premises, if the Board considers the premises are unsuitable for the sale of alcohol.
- 3. Having regard to the number and capacity of licenced premises of the same or similar description in the locality, the Board considers that if the application were to be granted, there would, as a result be overprovision of licensed premises of that description in the locality.
- 2.2 The Board has power where, if they would refuse the application as made, but if a modification is proposed by them and accepted by the applicant, the application can be granted.

## 5.0 Licensing Standards Officer's Comments:

The Scottish Youth Hostel Association have operated a successful youth hostel in Torridon for many years and now apply for a licence to sell alcohol by on and off-sales to the residents and other persons making use of the facilities and services.

The premises are situated in their own grounds on the south-eastern outskirts of Torridon.

There is no bar counter on the premises and on and off-sales of alcohol, which will be in sealed containers, will be made from the shop which is operated from a service hatch at reception.

No capacity of alcohol for off-sales has been given as there will be no display. Alcohol will be stored in a fridge which is set below the counter behind the reception desk/counter and the contents will not be seen from a public area. A price list will be on display.

The sale of alcohol by off-sales is not in conflict with the Board's over-provision policy.

The application is for licensed hours within policy and the activities, services and seasonal variation referred to in the operating plan are appropriate for this type of operation.

There are no nearby residential properties and a condition restricting the use of the outdoor drinking area is not considered necessary.

#### 6.00 Suggested Conditions

#### 6.1 Local Conditions

q) The licence holder shall submit to the Board and to Police Scotland, prior to 1 December each year, notice of the dates within the festive period on which it is intended that the premises remain open until the festive period terminal hour stated for that category of premises in the Board's Policy Statement. The Premises may remain open until the festive period terminal hour only on those dates for which notice has been given by the licence holder to the Board and to Police Scotland in accordance with this condition.

## 6.2 Late Opening Premises Conditions

The following shall apply on any occasion that the premises are open after 0100 hrs.

- A person trained to the satisfaction of the Licensing Board in administering first aid must be present on the premises from 0100 hrs (on any day when the premises are open at that time) until whichever is the earlier of:-
- a) the time at which the premises next close; and
- b) 0500 hrs.
- 2) A designated person who is the holder of a personal licence must be present on the premises from 0100 hrs (on any day on which the premises are open at that time) until whichever is the earlier of:
  - a) The time at which the premises next close; and
  - b) 0500 hrs.

## 7.0 Summary

I have no cause to object to the grant of the application.


Dear Sir,

Further to my phone call I am very concerned that the granting of this licence will have an adverse effect on the local Shop and Cafe. The shop was reopened in 2010 after being closed for several years. With the addition of a Cafe it has become a significant part of the community offering good service, quality, and value for money. However, margins are relatively small and alcohol sales add significantly to the viability of the business. I feel that the loss of significant sales could be serious for the shop's existence and both myself and my wife would hate to lose what has become a focal point in the village.
