Thurso High School Associated School Group Overview

Report by Director of Education, Culture and Sport Service

Summary

This report provides an update of key information in relation to the schools within the Thurso High School Associated School Group (ASG), and provides useful updated links to further information in relation to these schools.

1.0 ASG PROFILE

The primary schools in this area serve over 870 pupils, with the secondary school serving 802 young people.

There are currently three acting Head Teachers in the ASG, in receipt of support through the Quality Improvement Officer and the Area Office.

1.1 Attainment and Achievement

1.1.1 THURSO HIGH SCHOOL

Attainment – Performance Summary

Significant trends in S4 attainment

The attainment at level 3 is significantly down on last year taking the school to NCD 10 in English and 9 in Maths, with Boys 9% down for both subjects. There are twenty pupils identified who did not attain 5+@level 3. These included ASN/SEU pupils (7), three school refusers and three pupils at Airport House. The remaining 7 pupils did not turn up for all of their exams.

More positively attainment measures for 5+@level 5 have increased significantly from 31% to 39% (NCD 7 to NCD 5) having been the lowest in five years the previous year. Boys' attainment improved one NCD point from the previous year (NCD 4 from NCD 5). Girls' attainment improved from an NCD 8 in the previous two years to 6 this year.

Performance in Standard Grade English has improved this year. For all candidates relative position against comparator school is 6. This is an improvement from the previous year's 8.

All Skills for Work courses have satisfactory passes.

Significant trends in S5 attainment

The attainment of S5 pupils is up for all measures. The tracking of pupil progress has helped here.

The attainment of S5 girls is up in all measures compared to previous years. The attainment of S5 boys is up in all measures with the exception of 5+ @ level 5 and 5+ @ level 6 which are concurrent with last year (NCD 6 for both).

These are both pleasing and significant improvements.

Significant trends in S6 attainment

Attainment in S6 is down in all measures except Boys 5+ @ level 6 (1%). This is a concern especially the drop in attainment for girls.

Suggested Actions

- ♣ The school plans to bring renewed rigour and transparency to whole school, systematic tracking and target setting based on all available data, including Assessment for Excellence (AfE) and SOSCA.
- ♣ The school presentation policy is being reviewed to avoid the level of incompletes and no awards in almost all presentations
- Presentation must be based on tracking, involve pupils and parents when appropriate and be flexible to move pupils both up and down award levels.

3.2 Examples of the youth work presently undertaken within the Thurso ASG

The youth development team for Thurso learning community provides a mix of regular and project based youth work. At Thurso Youth Club there are twice weekly after school dropins and a Friday night youth club - all for S1 and above. Group work with girls around self-confidence and life skills happens twice a week.

Project based work over the last year has included - joint work with the Ormlie young mums group including some parenting classes in the high school; and work with non-attenders at the school. Plans for the coming period include activities over the summer holidays and developing the Friday night youth club along the Highland wide popular FUSION diversionary programme (arts, crafts, music, workshops). The Youth Worker also supports local youngsters to participate in the two Highland Youth Parliament conferences in June and November each year.
