Performance against the draft Highland Local Policing Plan 2014-2017

Report by the Highland Local Policing Commander - Chief Superintendent Julian Innes

Summary

To provide an update to Committee Members on the progress with reference to the objectives outlined in the draft Highland 2014-2017 Policing Plan.

1. <u>Performance</u>

- 1.1 Performance is being maintained within the Highland Area and overall crime continues to fall with a drop of 210 Class 1-4 crimes as at 26 May 2014 (941 crimes last year to date and 731 crimes this year to date¹). There has been a 60.6% drop in Class 1 violent crimes (such as murder, attempted murder and serious assaults) from the previous year (from 33 last year to date and 13 this year to date). It should be noted that the timing of this meeting is in advance of the completion of the year end procedures and reconciliation processes that are undertaken each year in association with the publication of official statistics. For this reason the baseline averages have not been included but will appear in the October report. Should Members wish a year-end report for performance against the 2013-2014 Local Policing Plan, this can also be provided to the Committee at the next meeting in October.
- 1.2 A summary of the current performance against the draft 2014-17 Highland Local Policing Plan objectives is at Appendix 1. The period covered by the report is as at 26 May 2014 unless stated otherwise.

Recommendation: It is recommended that:

- (i) Members scrutinise the progress made against the objectives set within the draft Highland Local Policing Plan 2014-2017.
- (ii) Members note the new performance reporting format.
