Landfill Communities Fund

Report by Director of Community Services

Summary

This report invites Members to approve applications to the Highland Council Landfill Communities Funding.

1. Background

- 1.1 Landfill Operators, including The Highland Council, pay a tax to the Government on every ton of waste that they dispose of in a landfill site. The Landfill Communities Fund (LCF) allows the landfill operator to offset 5.1% of their landfill tax liability and gives a 90% tax credit against their donations to organisations who deliver Environmental Objectives, and are registered with ENTRUST, the Government regulator for the LCF.
- 1.2 The Highland Council removes the need to register with ENTRUST by employing E B Scotland, a 'Distributive Environmental Body'. This means that E B Scotland register the projects in the Council's name and undertake all regulatory and administrative responsibilities.
- 1.3 The Highland Council, as a Landfill Operator, distributes its Landfill Communities Fund to local biodiversity conservation projects with a maximum contribution of £10,000 to any one project annually, subject to approval by the appropriate Area Committee, as agreed by Members when they considered report COM /03/14 to the Community Services Committee on 15 May 2014.

2. Applications for Consideration

2.1 Members are invited to consider the following application to the Highland Council Landfill Communities Fund. The details of the project are set out in the Appendix.

2.2 Coigach & Assynt Living Landscape Partnership – Development Phase by Scottish Wildlife Trust

The restoration project will run over five years and will involve communities, landowners, and community organisations across the area delivering in the region of 35 closely integrated, holistic and cross-cutting projects, which will help to sustainably conserve, restore and enhance the outstanding natural, built and cultural heritage found in Coigach and Assynt.

Background:

The Coigach and Assynt Living Landscape Partnership (CALLP) is an unprecedented partnership of community organisations, private landowners, individuals and conservation charities. There are currently 12 partners - Assynt Foundation, Assynt Field Club, Coigach Community Development Company, Coigach Salmon Fisheries, Culag Community Woodland Trust, Eisg Brachaidh, Historic Assynt, Isle Martin Trust, John Muir Trust, Kylesku Estate, Scottish Wildlife Trust and Tanera Mor.

In 2010 the partners launched the Coigach and Assynt Living Landscape Programme Plan; this brought together the views and aspirations of the partners and crucially also those of a wide range of other community-based organisations within the Coigach and Assynt areas. The CALL partners are now working together to deliver one of the largest ecosystem restoration projects in Britain – an aspirational 50-year plan to bring woodland connectivity, species-rich flora and fauna, and economic prosperity to Coigach and Assynt.

The CALL project covers over 60,000 hectares (232 sq miles) and is one of the largest landscape restoration projects in Europe

Project Description:

In 2013 the CALL partners submitted a proposal to the Heritage Lottery Fund Landscape Partnership scheme requesting a grant of £3,000,000 towards an ambitious landscape scale restoration scheme with a total cost of £4,607,892 – the Coigach and Assynt Living Landscape Partnership (CALLP). The restoration project will run over five years and will involve communities, landowners, and community organisations across the area delivering in the region of 35 closely integrated, holistic and cross-cutting projects, which will help to sustainably conserve, restore and enhance the outstanding natural, built and cultural heritage found in Coigach and Assynt. As a result of this project at least five new jobs will be created.

We were delighted to be awarded a Stage One approval by HLF late last year (in practice a Stage 1 pass means that the full grant will be awarded as long as the match funding is secured).

We have now employed a Development Manager and Development Assistant (job share) to prepare and develop the various elements required to build a Stage 2 submission.

By working together to see the bigger picture and breathe new life and connectivity into the ecosystems of Coigach and Assynt, globally rare species will be given a chance to increase in number and thrive once more. Key species set to benefit from this project encompass a wealth of biodiversity, including Scottish wood ants to iconic golden eagles and important habitats such as carbon-storing peatlands and rare Atlantic oak woods.
