Proposal of Application Notice

Description: Formation of a wind farm including the erection of up to 7 wind turbines

(up to 126.5m to blade tip), access tracks and other ancillary development. The development is to be known as Carr Bann Wind

Farm.

Ward: 13 - Aird and Loch Ness

1.0 BACKGROUND

- 1.1 To inform the Planning Applications Committee of the submission of the attached Proposal of Application Notice (PAN).
- 1.2 The submission of the PAN accords with the provisions of the Planning etc. (Scotland) Act 2006 and was lodged on 17th September 2014. Members are asked to note this may form the basis of a subsequent planning application.
- 1.3 The following information was submitted in support of the Proposal of Application Notice:
 - Site Location Plan; and
 - Supporting Statement which includes:
 - Description of Development;
 - Details of Consultation to Date;
 - Details of Proposed Consultation; and
 - Details of Any Other Consultation Methods
- 1.4 In addition an e-mail was submitted on 30th September 2014 advising that the development would be known as the Carr Bann Wind Farm, not Dinichean as set out in the PAN.

2.0 DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT

- 2.1 Based upon the information provided, the development is likely to comprise of the following:
 - Up to 7 wind turbines of up to 126.5m tip-height;
 - Access tracks: and
 - Associated ancillary works.

3.0 SITE DESCRIPTION

- 3.1 The site lies approximately 4.5km to the south of Inverness to the west of the B861 and extends to approximately 205 hectares, although the built development will occupy a much smaller area. The turbines will be set on a plateau which is currently forested at elevations of between 220m AOD and 240m AOD.
- 3.2 The site will be accessed from the B861 road which connects to the A9(T).
- 3.3 There are a number of sites designated for natural heritage interests in the wider area. The closest designated sites are the Loch Ashie and Loch Ruthven Special Protection Areas.
- 3.4 There are a number of scheduled monuments in the area, including but not limited to the following:
 - Mains of Gask, ring cairn and standing stones (Index no. 4651);
 - Balnafoich Cupmarks (Index no. 11557);
 - Carn Glas Chambered Cairns (Index no. 2392);
 - Achvraid Hut Circles (Index no. 11561);
 - Clachandruim Hut Circles (Index no. 11543); and
 - Baile nan Creige Cairns (Index no. 11552).
- 3.5 In addition to the above there are a number of archaeological records, identified within the Highland Historic Environment Record, which exist within and in proximity to the site.
- 3.6 The site contains a number of watercourses which feed into Loch Bunachton and the Gask Burn.
- 3.7 The site is not located within any international or regional landscape designations. However, it is in close proximity to the Loch Ness and Duntelchaig Special Landscape Area (SLA).
- 3.8 When assessing a wind farm proposal consideration of similar developments around the site is required. The list below sets out the projects around this development site that are operational, approved or have been submitted but not yet determined.
