### TREE PRESERVATION ORDER NO HC126, 2015 ESKART, BALMACAAN, DRUMNADROCHIT

### **Report by Director of Development and Infrastructure**

#### Summary

A Tree Preservation Order has been served on an area of mature oak woodland at Eskart, lying on the southern edge of a larger oak woodland owned by the Woodland Trust just off Balmacaan Road, Drumnadrochit. The Committee is invited to consider confirmation of the Order as it stands.

### 1. Background

- 1.1 A Tree Preservation Order was served on 23 January 2015 covering an area of woodland on the southern edge of a Woodland Trust property just of Balmacaan Road, Drumnadrochit. A location map (Appendix 1) and copy of the Order map (Appendix 2) are attached.
- 1.2 The serving of the Order was as a result of tree removal on two occasions in 2013 and 2015 which the owner has stated was clearance of storm damage. The site was subject to a planning application for one dwelling (10/02103/PIP) which was refused and a Notice of Review (11/00001/RBIREF) which was dismissed.
- 1.3 A Tree Preservation Order lasts for a period of six months then lapses if not confirmed.

#### 2. Representations

- 2.1 One letter of objection has been received from Mr George MacWilliam of McArthur & Co on behalf of the owner, Mr David Turnbull. A copy of the letter is appended (Appendix 3).
- 2.2 In summary, the points of objection are as follows:
  - a) Trees were felled following storm damage.
  - b) Trees were not felled as a direct result of the refusal of planning applications.
  - c) The woodland is not regarded as an important amenity feature.
  - d) The Notice states that objections shall specify the particular trees or groups of trees in respect of which the Order is made. In terms of Schedule 1 of the Order no trees or groups of trees are specified. The Notice in so far as it

requires specification of particular trees or groups of trees is incorrect and accordingly invalid.

- e) It is unreasonable for the Council to include the whole area within the Order and the Order should be modified so that it refers only to trees of an appropriate quality.
- 2.3 One letter in support of the TPO has been received from Mr N J Curley. A copy of the letter is appended (Appendix 4).

# 3. Appraisal

- 3.1 The woodland cover within the TPO area has local visual amenity value; it acts as separation and setting for existing properties and forms part of a larger area of ecologically important oak woodland.
- 3.2 Under the Tree Evaluation Method for Preservation Orders (TEMPO), the woodland has been scored as "Definitely merits TPO". The Council uses TEMPO as an independent method for assessing the need for Preservation Orders. TEMPO is used by almost all Local Authorities in the UK when evaluating a possible TPO.

# 4. Response to Objection

- 4.1 Trees were storm damaged On visiting the site in 2013 it was found that one twin stem willow had been storm damaged and felled. There were a number of birch trees which had also been felled and the stumps showed no evidence of storm damage.
- 4.2 Trees not felled as a direct result of the refusal of planning applications It was not suggested that the trees were felled as a direct result of the refusal of planning applications. It has been noted that there is a planning history on the site and that since then trees have been felled.
- 4.3 The woodland is not regarded as an important amenity feature The TPO area is regarded by Highland Council as an area which offers amenity value to the properties Eskart and Tordarrach and also to walkers linking through from Balmacaan Road to Balmacaan Wood. The decision to serve a TPO is based on the use of the Tree Evaluation Method for Preservation Orders (TEMPO) which is used by most local authorities in Britain.
- 4.4 No trees or groups of trees are specified in the Order The Notice states that objections and representations shall specify trees or groups of trees in respect of which the order is made and should also contain the word 'woodland', as it appears in Schedule 1. It will be arranged with colleagues for future copies of the Notice to also contain the word 'woodland'. It will in this instance be taken that the representation relates to the woodland area (W1) in Schedule 1.
- 4.5 Modification of the Order to only include trees of appropriate quality The TPO was served as a woodland TPO and as such trees of all ages and quality are protected, not just the specimen trees. This allows for younger trees to be protected by the TPO as they will be the mature trees in the future.

# 5.0 Conclusion

In conclusion, it is considered that the woodland has local visual amenity value; it acts as separation and setting for existing properties and forms part of a larger area of ecologically important oak woodland. Ongoing management is a key consideration and a TPO provides for that. The Council will be pleased to work with all owners in securing longer term management.


### Recommendation



We refer to the Notice dated 23 January being a Notice in respect of the above numbered Tree Preservation Order. We act for David Paterson Turnbull of 106 Balmacaan Road, Drumnadrochit upon whom the said Notice was served. Mr Turnbull wishes to object to the Tree Preservation Order on the following basis.

- 1 The occasions when trees have been felled on the site in the recent past were in late 2013 and January this year. On both occasions our client required to deal with trees which had been damaged by storm force winds. The trees were not felled as a direct result of the refusal of the Planning Applications. The said area is described in the Order as an important amenity feature when this is not the case. The facts and circumstances do not justify the issuing of the Order.
- 2 The Notice states that objections and representations shall specify the particular trees or groups of trees in respect of which the Order is made. In terms of Schedule 1 of the Order no trees or groups of trees are specified. The Notice in so far as it requires specification of particular trees or groups of trees is incorrect and accordingly invalid.
- 3 There are several specimen trees within the area specified in the Order. These are situated near to the boundaries of the area identified on the plan. It is unreasonable for the Council to include the whole area within the Order and the Order should be modified so that it refers only to trees of an appropriate quality which have been identified in the Order.

Dear Sir,


Am writing in support of the above referenced tree preservation order.
