Highland First Additions

Report by Chief Executive

Summary

The purpose of this report is to advise members of proposed additions to the approved programme for the Council 'Highland First'.

1. Background

1.1 At the Council meeting on 13 August, 2015 members agreed the Highland Council Programme 'Highland First'.

It was also agreed to finalise the Highland Council Programme 'Highland First' for the Council meeting in September - taking into account the additions suggested at the meeting from the SNP and Liberal Democrat Groups as well as from Councillor J Douglas.

1.2 Members also agreed to re-commit to the Programme 'Working Together for the Highlands' and that a separate report would be submitted setting out those commitments which had been completed and those which were on-going commitments. This is considered later on the agenda at item 9.
