Performance against the Highland Local Policing Plan 2014-2017

Report by the Highland Local Policing Commander – Chief Superintendent Julian Innes

Summary

To provide an update to Committee Members on the progress with reference to the objectives outlined in the Highland 2014-2017 Policing Plan.

1. Performance

1.1 Crime in the Highland area has risen over the past year; Recorded Class 1-4 Crimes have increased from 4738 last year compared to 5062 this year to date which is an increase of 6.4%¹.

The Performance in Highland remains strong with an overall detection rate of 63.7% (Class 1-5 Crimes).

- Class 1- Crimes of Violence: 29.8% increase from the previous year (165 last year compared to 235 this year to date).
- Class 2- Sexual Crimes: 23.4% increase from the previous year (350 last year compared to 457 this year to date).
- Class 3- Crimes of Dishonesty: 3.1% reduction from the previous year (2693 last year compared to 2610 this year to date).
- Class 4- Fire-raising, Malicious Mischief: 13.1% increase from the previous year (1530 last year compared to 1760 this year to date).
- Class 5- Other (Pro-Activity) Crimes: 14.2% increase from the previous year (1780 last year compared to 2075 this year to date).

Recorded Class 1-5 Crimes have also increased over the past year; from 6518 last year compared to 7137 this year to date which is an increase of 8.7%.

1.2 A summary of the current performance against the 2014-17 Highland Local Policing Plan objectives is at Appendix 1. The period covered by the report is as at 31 January 2016 unless stated otherwise.

The Disclosure Scheme for Domestic Abuse provides a formal mechanism for potential victims, their family members, or another concerned member of the public or professional body e.g. Police Scotland, Social Work, Advocacy Services, Woman's Aid etc.) to make enquiries about an individual who they are in a relationship with or is n a relationship with someone they know, and there is a concern that the individual may be abusive towards their partner. It provides Police Scotland with a way of disclosing information about a partners abusive past with their potential victims and gives people at risk of Domestic Abuse the information they require to make an informed decision on whether to continue in a relationship. The scheme operates two entry pathways that may lead to a disclosure being made: 'Right to Ask' and 'Power to Tell'.
