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	Questions from Members of the Public - Children's	 Members of the public may obtain information from Childcare Services via Clachnaharry, Inverness Information gathered will never be 100% as things change Review and update of the information will take place every 6 months by the Childcare and Family Resource Partnership Funding is limited so if a service has not been identified by the Plan, it will not receive funding One group identified was for Weaning - now have "Weaning Wednesdays" which are held in the Family Centre at Caithness House where parents/families can drop in to get advice, cooking skills, menus etc Agreed that Fire Service information to be included Further work on the plan/mapping will take place once the new Care & Learning Manager, Jacqueline Jennet, takes up post in August 2016. 2	Services Adult Services - Poppy Scotland	 The Partnership were given a presentation by NS, the main points being: Raises over 2m from the Scottish Poppy Appeal and other year round fundraising, no statutory funding given Financial assistance to ex-Service men and women and their families - noted that they have their sense of pride and can be difficult for them to ask for help Merged with The Royal British Legion in June 2011 Services offered - Tailored support and funding services eg grants to individuals, mobility services and Poppy Break service (affiliation with Haven Holidays for respite/family holidays); Advice, information and support services; Employment services; Support to organisations SSAFA (Armed Forces Charity) - 92% of grant applications are completed with assistance from SSAFA obtaining assistance from military organisations and charities throughout Scotland Employment Support Grants - up to £2,000 available to undertake course of vocational training which will hopefully lead to sustainable employment 		

		 Lifeworks - week long course for those with a health condition which they consider to be a barrier to employment or those who are actively seeking work but regularly failing to gain employment or the job they want Disclosure Service - Apex Scotland offers advice and guidance on how and when to disclose information on past or current convictions to prospective employers Advice - Legion Scotland's Pension Advice Service; Armed Services Advice Project; Inverness Welfare Centre Inverness Welfare Centre, open from Monday to Friday 10am - 4pm - mammoth amount of organisations to support armed forces and reservists. Since opening over 1600 individuals have accessed the service; over 500 accessed the general information and guidance service; 232 individuals with multiple needs benefited from the 1:1 specialist advice and support services. New partnership between Veterans First Post (VIP) Scotland, NHS Highland and Poppy Scotland Inverness. Finding the staff very helpful, proud and motivated of the service.
