Ashton Road Children's House

The Children's House at Ashton Road, Inverness, has been graded 'Excellent' by the Care Inspectorate for the Quality of Care & Support and the Quality of Environment. Young people reported to the Inspectors that "the staff are amazing" and "got me to where I wanted to be - always supportive and full of the joys." Parents said: "the place is just excellent", "I get treated with respect" and "the staff go out of their way to resolve any things as quick as possible."

Caitlin Jupp

Caitlin Jupp from Tain Academy, has won the title of MFR Young Musician of the Year at the annual MFR awards. She was nominated by friends, who highlighted the many different instruments that Caitlin plays. She takes lessons for the violin and accordion but self teaches guitar, piano, ukulele, and mandolin. Caitlin plays fiddle with Gizzen Briggs and the regional orchestra, was part of the Highland String Orchestra last year, and plays in the school orchestra.

Educational Psychology Services

Highland Council's Educational Psychology Services have completed a validated self-evaluation with Education Scotland.
