Prevention and Intervention Activity	The Banking Protocol is an initiative between the police, banking institutions & Trading Standards. Its aim is at the earliest opportunity to identify vulnerable victims who are in the process of being defrauded of funds from their bank accounts by unscrupulous criminals and to intervene to prevent these crimes. Victims, particularly elderly and other vulnerable people are targeted by suspects for a range of fraud offences, including courier fraud and bogus worker offences. These crimes often involve the perpetrator encouraging the victim to attend their bank, post office or other financial services provider in person and withdraw or transfer cash. The Protocol is designed to provide a standardised method for how these concerns are dealt with and reported to police and to stop multiple victimisation. Divisional Operation – ongoing investigation into recent online/electronic frauds which have targeted local business/charities and have resulted in the loss of substantial amounts of money in the Division and in the Caithness Area over the current reporting year.
Prevention and Intervention Activity	N Division P&I unit are currently in the process of planning an event in relation to Vishing scams. An online safety leaflet is attached for your information and attention, please distribute it to colleagues/service users/friends and family. Operation Monarda - Although the likelihood of being a victim of crimes such as housebreaking, thefts and bogus caller fraud is small, when they do occur they have a disproportionate effect on individuals, families and communities in respect of their feelings of safety. Two week period of action carried out across the N Division with roadshows taking place throughout the Highlands. These involved Prevention and Intervention unit officers, Crimestoppers and Trading Standards. In addition visits were carried out to all quarries, builders' merchants, banks, financial institutes and caravan sites to brief them on door step crime issues. Scam/bogus caller talk delivered to friendship clubs, lunch clubs and to members of Mens Shed throughout Highland.

PRIORITY - Counter Terrorism & Domestic Extremism

Intention – Support the delivery of the CONTEST strategy to reduce the threat posed by terrorism and domestic extremism

Objective – Strengthen PREVENT work with Partners and institutions; with Partners, support individuals who are vulnerable to terrorism and violent extremism; strengthen PREVENT work in relation to the internet and Social Media; Effective Multi-agency planning in respect of Counter Terrorism is taking place; Develop our ability to response effectively to any terrorist attack (with a specific focus on emerging high-risk threats, and specialist capabilities).

Counter Terrorism & Domestic Extremism

Workshop to Raise Awareness of Prevent (WRAP)

WRAP is an interactive facilitated workshop aimed at front line staff such as police, social serves, probation, education and health staff. It seeks to support staff to recognise that using their existing expertise and professional judgement, they may be able to recognise potentially vulnerable individuals.

Work is ongoing to develop contacts in the Caithness area in order to run workshops for relevant staff.
