Report title: Application for the renewal of a public entertainment licence – High Life Highland, Nairn Leisure Centre, Marine Road, Nairn (Ward 18 – Nairn)

1. Purpose/Executive Summary

1.1 This Report relates to an application for the renewal of a public entertainment licence.

2. Recommendation

2.2 Members are asked to determine the application in accordance with the Hearings Procedure.

3. Background

3.1 On 25 May 2018 an application for the renewal of a public entertainment licence was received from High Life Highland in respect of Nairn Leisure Centre, Marine Road, Nairn.

3.2 In terms of the Civic Government (Scotland) Act 1982 (the Act) the Licensing Authority have nine months from receipt of the application to determine the same, therefore this application must be determined by 25 February 2019. Failure to determine the application by this time would result in the application being subject of a 'deemed grant' which means that a licence would require to be issued for a period of 1 year. The application is before this Committee as this is the last meeting before the determination date expires.

4. Process

4.1 Following receipt of the application a copy was circulated to the following Agencies/Services for consultation:

- Police Scotland
- Scottish Fire and Rescue Service
- Highland Council Environmental Health Service
- Highland Council Building Standards Service

4.2 All of the above Agencies/Services have confirmed that they have no objections to the licence being issued.

4.3 As part of the application process the applicants are asked to submit an electrical certificate in respect of the premises.

4.4 The new fixed electrical installation certificate dated 27 August 2018 for the leisure centre and pool that was submitted was unsatisfactory as it has C2 faults on it which require rectifying before any licence can be granted.

4.5 At the time of writing the Council's Environmental Health have advised that due to the installation being unsatisfactory, the licence cannot be issued until the electrical installation is satisfactory. A minor works certificate confirming this together with an updated electrical certificate is awaited.

4.6 Environmental Health are also waiting for written confirmation that the lift slings for the hoist have been replaced before any licence can be granted.

4.7 At the time of writing of this report the applicant has advised that the lift slings are in the process of being replaced.

4.8 Until the above outstanding matters have been addressed, the Principal Solicitor (Regulatory Services) is not currently in a position to issue the licence under delegated powers. As detailed in paragraph 3.2, the application requires to be determined by 25 February 2019.

5. Determining issues

5.1 Paragraph 5(3) of Schedule 1 of the Act states that a licensing authority may refuse an application to grant or renew a licence where:

- (a) the applicant or anyone else detailed on the application is not a fit and proper person;
- (b) the activity would be carried out by a person other than the applicant who, if he had made the application himself, would have been refused;
- (c) where the licence applied for relates to an activity consisting of or including the use of premises or a vehicle or vessel, those premises are not or, as the case may be, that vehicle or vessel is not suitable or convenient for the conduct of the activity having regard to
 - (i) the location, character or condition of premises or the character or condition of the vehicle or vessel,
 - (ii) the nature and extent of the proposed activity,
 - (iii) the kind of persons likely to be in the premises, vehicle or vessel,
 - (iv) the possibility of undue public nuisance, or
 - (v) public order or public safety; or
- (d) there is other good reason for refusing the application.

5.2 If required the Principal Solicitor – Regulatory Services will offer particular advice on the criteria relating to this particular application.

6. Options

6.1 If Members are minded they could grant the application with an additional condition attached to the same to the effect that no public entertainment activities should take place until a satisfactory minor works certificate, a satisfactory updated electrical certificate and written confirmation that the lift slings for the hoist have been replaced is received.

6.2 Alternatively the Committee could grant delegated powers to the Principal Solicitor to refuse the application if the certificate has not been received by 25 February 2019.
