1. Purpose/Executive Summary

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is to provide committee with an update on the Inverness and Highland City-Region Deal. We are in year three of the programme and the pace of delivery continues to increase; since the last report the annual report has been produced and reported to Council as per government requirements. The report has been well received by Government Colleagues as has the progress with the deal. Highlights for this period include:
 - Kings Course Opening;
 - Inverness Castle (Spirit of the Highlands) engagement has commenced
 - Mid Market rent In the previous quarter 12 new homes have been occupied; 8 in Inverness and 4 in Alness, turf cutting in Avoch; and
 - SSA Newton Rooms are fully booked, and have been selected (exclusively in Scotland) to live-stream the Royal Institution Christmas Lecture series they are the only hosts within Scotland to be selected to be part of this event.

2. Recommendations

2.1 Members are asked to note progress with the City Region Deal during 2018/19; and the positive feedback on 18/19 annual review.

3. Implications

- 3.1 Resource: There are no resource issues arising because of this report.
- 3.2 Legal: It should be noted that the City-Region Deal is a signed undertaking to deliver specified projects. These cannot be changed without the express consent of the UK and Scottish Governments. There are, however, no legal implications because of this report.

- 3.3 Community (Equality, Poverty and Rural): there are no community impact implications arising from this report.
- 3.4 Climate Change / Carbon Clever: There are no climate change or Carbon Clever related issues arising from this report.

4. Introduction

- 4.1 The Highland Council is the lead body for the Inverness and Highland City-Region Deal which is being implemented by a partnership between the Council, Highlands and Islands Enterprise, The University of the Highlands & Islands (UHI), and Albyn Housing Society Ltd
- 4.2 Collectively, this £315.1m funding package (Scottish Government £135m, UK Government £53.1m, local partners £127m) is provided over a 10-year period, subject to detailed business cases, statutory processes and implementation plans. We are currently in year 3.

5. Project Progress

5.1 The projects within the City-Region Deal are shown at **Appendix 1**, which provides a description and an update on the status of each project. Progress against the projects are reported to this Committee quarterly, regular reporting in a consistent format will facilitate transparency about where progress is good and where remedial action may be necessary. Highlights for the period can be found below:

5.2 West Link

The official opening ceremony for the Kings Course Golf Course took place on Friday 30th August 2019, with special guest Bernard Gallagher. At the same time Phase 2 is progressing at pace.

5.3 Inverness Castle

A Stakeholder Engagement programme for the Inverness Castle – "Spirit of the Highlands" project is now underway. The programme covers a wide range of stakeholders throughout the area, including project partners, young people, business organisations and community groups, providing updates on the project development, as well as opening a dialogue on the castle's transformation to a visitor attraction for the Highlands.

5.4 Science Skills Academy (SSA)

The Lochaber and Caithness rooms are fully booked from August-November 2019. The SSA hosted a public information session introducing the Dingwall Newton Room which was well attended by various members of the public. As well as Newton Modules, which are curriculum and STEM-career focused, the Newton Rooms are being used to deliver a wider range of STEM activity and the Thurso, Fort William and Inverness rooms have been selected to live-stream the Royal Institution Christmas Lecture series – they are the only hosts within Scotland to be selected to be part of this event.

5.5 Northern Innovation Hub

The majority of the Northern Innovation Hub projects are now up and running, with excellent feedback being received from participants of the various business support programmes.

5.6 Affordable Housing

Good progress is being made on several projects which will completing in the coming year with 18 expected in the current quarter. In the previous quarter 12 new homes have been occupied: 8 in Inverness and 4 in Alness.

6. Governance

- 6.1 The projects report to the quarterly City-Region Deal Programme Board, chaired by the Executive Chief Officer Transformation and Economy, and attended by the lead officers for each project, a representative from the Council's Finance Service, representatives from the business community, and both the Scottish and UK Governments. The Board reports to the Environment, Development and infrastructure Committee and undertakes the following roles:
 - ensures delivery of business cases and the implementation plan;
 - ensures effective co-ordination between partners;
 - ensures the ongoing overall alignment of the individual projects within the programme;
 - resolving strategic and operational issues between projects; and
 - monitoring project status and ensure project delivery; and manage risks and financial commitments.

6.2 Government Reporting

As would be expected from a programme of the scale of the Inverness and Highland City-Region Deal, accountability to the Scottish and UK Governments, as the major funders, requires a regular reports and programme management activities. The table below shows these activities and their status for the period.

7 Programme Level Risks

7.1 All projects within the City-Region Deal are required to maintain individual risk and issue registers, in addition to this an overall programme level risk and issue register is kept by the Programme Manager. The table below contains the risk or issues that have a value of 12 (or the highest level of risk) or above. The value represents the significance of the risk without mitigation, and the RAG represents the confidence in the mitigating actions; as can be seen, the Digital Project is the highest-level risk. A new risk has been recorded regarding the Life Science Innovation centre project. The

risk associated with the Castle Business Case risk has reduced and the risk on government reporting has now reduced to within the risk tolerance and is therefore not reported.

LONGMAN JUNCTION and A9/A96 INSHES TO SMITHTON LINK ROAD

As part of the Scottish Government's commitment within the Inverness and Highland City-Region Deal, Transport Scotland is taking forward plans for a single carriageway road connecting Inshes and Smithton and grade separation of the A9/A82 Longman Roundabout and a single carriageway road connecting Inshes and Smithton and grade separation of the A9/A82 Longman Roundabout. This new grade separated junction will unlock significant areas of land which, once remediated (see below), will provide much needed capacity for industrial office and retail developments. The Inverness and Highland City-Region Deal will support the development of the A9/A96 Inshes to Smithton Link Road (East Link) which will encourage more active use of the road network hierarchy.
