	<b>Festive Drink/Drug Drive Campaign 2019</b> ran between 1 December 2019 and 2 January 2020. Police Scotland is committed to achieving the Scotlish Government's 2020 casualty reduction targets. Increasing awareness of the risks associated with drink/drug driving supports the Force's efforts to reduce road casualties. The campaign was conducted through a combination of intelligence-led high visibility patrols and static road checks. Thirteen drink drivers were reported in the Inverness area, this is an increase of +8 on the same period last
	year. Following the introduction of S5A Road Traffic Act 1988 in October 2019, preliminary drug drive testing is now available to officers. There were nine positive drug tests obtained in the Inverness area command during the campaign period.
Road Traffic Operations/Campaigns	<b>Driver Engagement North</b> , a multi-agency initiative makes use of an interactive driving simulator designed to assess and highlight a participant's reactions, hazard awareness and any potential vulnerabilities on the roads. The project, launched in Inverness during October, received funding from Transport Scotland and is led by Police Scotland, with support from a number of partners including the NHS, Local Authority Community Safety Groups, IAM Roadsmart, Age Concern and RoSPA. The simulator has been specially designed to assess and demonstrate a driver's reactions and abilities in a safe environment under the supervision of specialists who will be able to offer support and advice. While this initiative is aimed at older drivers, we will also be able to offer advice to family members or friends who are concerned about whether someone they know is fit to drive.

# PRIORITY – Violence, Disorder and Anti-social Behaviour including Alcohol and Drugs Misuse

Intention – With partners, better understand the causes to prevent and reduce instances of Anti-social Behaviour, Violence and Disorder to enhance community safety across the Highland Area

Objective – Work with partners to share information, support Education, Prevention, Diversionary and Enforcement Measures linked to harmful alcohol consumption; maintain robust procedures around licensed premises; support victims of violent crime by working with partners to improve service provision and prevent repeat victimisation.

**Positive Stop Search** - A positive stop and search is when an item is recovered where possession of same implies criminality on the part of the individual being searched or any other; or potentially compromises the safety of that individual or another.

A **seizure** occurs when - alcohol, and/or; tobacco product, and/or; cigarette papers are surrendered, or are removed from an individual by a Police Officer, for the purpose of safeguarding the health and well-being of that individual or any other, in circumstances where the stop and search tactic has NOT been utilised and no physical search of an individual has taken place.

# **PRIORITY – Acquisitive Crime**

## Intention – With Partners and Communities, prevent instances of acquisitive crime across the Highland area

Objective – With Partners, share information, support education, prevention, diversionary and enforcement activity linked to acquisitive crime; develop work with targets - recidivist offenders - to reduce reoffending linked to acquisitive crime e.g. Persistent Offenders programme; enhance the use of all media platforms to raise awareness of local and national preventative initiatives.

## Intention – Protect people at risk of harm

Objective – With Partners we will focus on safeguarding communities; with Partners we will address emerging issues through Prevention and Intervention

Prevention and Intervention Activity	<b>Missing Persons</b> – During this reporting period, there have been 371 missing person reports in the Inverness Command area, of this number (48%) reports relate to missing children. This figure does not include missing persons from other areas who are traced in the Inverness Command area. These incidents represent a very high risk area of police business and necessitate immediate response. Police					

Scotland employs a missing person co-ordinator who meets with the local authority on a weekly basis to review placements for looked after children. Where necessary this includes daily contact when incidents occur. Inverness Area Command have two local police liaison officer who maintain contact and liaison with the residential units in the area. This role has developed and regular contact has built a good relationship with residential unit(s). Where required this officer also works in conjunction with the missing person co-ordinator who similarly enjoys a good working relationship with residential units.
Education and awareness raising enhances multi-agency work in relation to protection of people at risk of harm. Numerous sessions took place at Community Fayre Alzheimer events, internet safety awareness, party safe sessions and drug/alcohol awareness at UHI.

# **PRIORITY – Serious & Organised Crime**

Intention – With Partners, reduce the threat, risk and harm caused by Serious Organised Crime

Objective – With Partners work to safeguard the Highland area by taking all opportunities to prevent crime and make the Highland area a hostile environment for Serious & Organised Crime Groups; to improve outcomes for individuals and communities and reduce offending through prevention, early intervention and diversion; in support of our Partners in the Local Authority and NHS via the Highland Alcohol and Drug Partnership Strategy we will direct those who are substance dependant towards recovery through prevention, treatment and support services; with Partners work to reduce the instances of substance misuse in our communities

Serious & Organised Crime	<ul> <li>Divisional Operation - intelligence development and investigation into drug supply and use in educational establishments throughout the Division, including Inverness Area Command. All intelligence will continue to be monitored daily and passed to the local area inspector for proactive approach.</li> <li>Divisional Operation – ongoing investigation into recent online/electronic frauds which have targeted local business/charities and have resulted in the loss of substantial amounts of money in the Division and in the Inverness Area over the current reporting year.</li> </ul>
Prevention and Intervention Activity	Proactive drug seizures continue in the Inverness Command area and this reporting period has seen positive conclusions to several Operations and significant drug and cash seizures as well as the execution of 36 search warrants with a positive result. <b>The Slide</b> is a specially-created film detailing a young person's downward spiral into criminality from teenage years into early adult life. After watching each film scene, attendees participate in a range of discussions to promote positive lifestyle choices and discuss the consequences of becoming involved in crime. These sessions were delivered to Millburn, Charleston, Kilchuimen Academy and Glenurquhart High School. As with all policing priorites, awareness raising and education is important which is why <b>County Lines</b> presentation delivered to Barnardos and staff at the Corbett Centre can help communities identify people at risk of exploitation when their accommodation is taken over and drugs dealt from this address ( <b>Cuckooing</b> ) and how to report any concerns. <b>Romance Fraud</b> - Romance fraud is widespread, estimates suggest that only one in five instances of fraud is reported.

What happens? All frauds require the offender to establish trust and rapport with the victim. In romance fraud, the victim believes there to be a genuine relationship. Techniques include attempts to build rapport with and gain the trust of the victim by claiming to adhere to the same religious faith or spiritual beliefs and articulating an intense desire for and attraction to the victim.
Types of romance fraud include –
<ul> <li>'foot-in-the door' technique, in which the perpetrator initially asks for a small sum and, then having gained this small sum from the victim, manufactures new or escalating crises requiring larger and larger sums of money.</li> <li>'face-in-the-door' technique, in which the perpetrator initially asks for a sum of money so extreme that most would refuse, followed by a request for a far more modest sum(s) to persuade the victim to part with their money.</li> <li>Third is webcam blackmail.</li> </ul>
Police advice is always if someone asks for money, report it immediately to the dating platform, and call the Police on 101.

# **PRIORITY – Counter Terrorism & Domestic Extremism**

Intention – Support the delivery of the CONTEST strategy to reduce the threat posed by terrorism and domestic extremism

Objective – Strengthen PREVENT work with Partners and institutions; with Partners, support individuals who are vulnerable to terrorism and violent extremism; strengthen PREVENT work in relation to the internet and Social Media; Effective Multi-agency planning in respect of Counter Terrorism is taking place; Develop our ability to response effectively to any terrorist attack (with a specific focus on emerging high-risk threats, and specialist capabilities).

Counter Terrorism & Domestic Extremism	WRAP (Workshop to Raise Awareness of Prevent) The workshop covers issues such as crime, normal social processes that are used to influence and manipulate, case studies that cut across the spectrum of extremism, terrorist ideologies and factors which may contribute to an individual's susceptibility to a terrorist ideology.
	In particular, it seeks to support them to recognise that using their existing expertise and professional judgement, they may be able to recognise potentially vulnerable individuals who may be susceptible to being persuaded by an extremist or terrorist ideology.
	ACT Now delivered to Millburn Academy pupils, Extremism awareness raising to UHI Students.
	Partnership working in respect of Prevent agenda continues and regular liaison takes place, most recently in September when as part of a series of regular meetings Prevent subgroup and Contest group met.
