Staffin Boatslip And Breakwater, Staffin

Purpose/Executive Summary

Description: Upgrade to existing slipway, construction of new breakwater,

installation of pontoon, construction of approximately 7 storage sheds, construction of toilet facilities, delivery of access improvements and ancillary infrastructure, quarrying of required rock from Lealt quarry.

1. BACKGROUND

- 1.1 To inform the Planning Applications Committee of the submission of the attached Proposal of Application Notice (PAN).
- 1.2 The submission of the PAN accords with the provisions of the Planning etc. (Scotland) Act 2006 and was lodged on the 9 March 2021. Members are asked to note this may form the basis of a subsequent planning application
- 1.3 The submitted information attached includes:
 - Proposal of application Notice
 - Site & Location Plan of the Staffin slipway
 - Site and Location Plan of the Lealt quarry
 - Copy of Advert

2. DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT

- 2.1 The proposal seeks to create a more sheltered harbour area through the upgrade of the existing slipway and the creation of a separate new breakwater a little further north along the coast. A new pontoon is proposed within the area created.
- 2.2 The proposal also includes the construction of up to seven storage sheds with potential for light industrial commercial use as well as a toilet block.
- 2.3 The construction of the new breakwater is to utilise rock from the re-opening of a previously quarried site at Lealt some 8km to the south of the slipway along the A.855 coastal road.
- 2.4 The transport of this material to the site will require improvements to the access road between the slipway and the A.855 and these works are also subject of this PAN

3. SITE DESCRIPTION

- 3.1 The existing slipway lies just the south of Staffin Bay in the waters bounded to the north by Staffin Island. It is adjacent to the An Corran beach and its well-known dinosaur footprint specimens.
- 3.2 To its landward side the site is bounded by steep coastal cliffs to the west with a small open coastal plain to the south.
- 3.3 The site is served by a narrow single track road which runs at the foot of the cliffs along a twisting route back to a junction with the A.855. A distance of some 1750m.
- 3.4 The topography around the site means that it is not readily visible from the Staffin settlement.




