1. PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT

- 1.1 The application seeks planning permission for the installation of a plinth and public artwork at Gynack Gardens in Kingussie. This application is advanced by the Kingussie Community Development Company (KCDC).

2. SITE DESCRIPTION

2.1 The gardens are located in the centre of the village to the south of the Duke of Gordon Hotel on Newtonmore Road and contain new planting and hard landscaping. Paviours have been laid in the area so that a memorial/public art can be installed.

- 4.2 Material considerations raised are summarised as follows:
 - a) Design will enhance the large open area while leaving plenty of room for planned events.
 - b) Encourage locals and visitors to stop (photo opportunities) and explore the town
 - c) Support incorporation of Shinty Camans in the sculpture
 - d) Art based attractions along active travel network encourages cyclists to explore
 - e) Enhancement of the neighbourhood to benefit of residents and visitors and encourage sense of pride
 - f) Note artists previous work and that sculpture would be unique to Kingussie

8. PLANNING APPRAISAL

8.1 Section 25 of the Town and Country Planning (Scotland) Act 1997 requires planning applications to be determined in accordance with the development plan unless material considerations indicate otherwise.

Determining Issues

8.2 This means that the application requires to be assessed against all policies of the Development Plan relevant to the application, all national and local policy guidance and all other material considerations relevant to the application.

Planning Considerations

- 8.3 The key considerations in this case are:
 - a) compliance with the development plan and other planning policy
 - b) siting
 - c) design
 - d) community engagement

e) any other material considerations

Development plan/other planning policy

- 8.4 The main policy of relevance in assessing the proposals is Policy 3 Design and Placemaking of the Cairngorms National Park Local Development Plan (2021). This requires that developments meet the six qualities of successful places which are:
 - i) Distinctive;
 - ii) Safe and pleasant
 - iii) Welcoming
 - iv) Adaptable
 - v) Resource efficient; and
 - vi) Easy to move around and beyond.

All development proposals must also be designed to be sympathetic to the traditional pattern and character of the surrounding area, local vernacular and local distinctiveness, whilst encouraging innovation in design and use of materials. Development must use materials and landscaping that will complement the setting of development.

Siting

- 8.5 The sculpture is to be sited within the Memorial Garden, also referred to as Gynack Gardens, which was previously associated with the Duke of Gordon Hotel. The area has recently been subject to redevelopment to provide a new landscaped open space. A large circular area of paving lies central to the landscaping fronting the High Street which is where the proposed sculpture is to be situated. This is considered to be an acceptable location and a good focal point within the context of the garden itself, but also on the High Street and main thoroughfare in Kingussie; a principal settlement within the National Park.
- 8.6 Representations note that the site is considered to be a positive addition to the village for residents, but it will also be a good stopping point for people passing through to take pictures and is located on an Active Travel route. It could encourage cyclists to stop and access local business on the High Street. The siting of a sculpture/public artwork in this location is supported in planning terms.

Design

- 8.7 The submitted documents emphasise that a renowned Scottish sculptor is to be commissioned to design the sculpture. The final design has not yet been established, however indicative drawings outline that the sculpture is to be of a thistle design measuring approximately 3.9m in height. The materials are to be galvanised metal, utilising local recycled materials as far as possible. The sculpture will sit on top of a granite boulder which measures 2m in width by 0.7m in height.
- 8.8 On receipt of planning permission, the applicant requires to gain permission from The Highland Council as landowner (separate to planning permission) to site the sculpture. It is noted that Sustrans has pledged financial support alongside possible

monies from the Town Centre Fund (managed by The Highland Council); however, funding will not be forthcoming until such time as planning permission is granted. Thereafter the artist can be commissioned to fully design the sculpture. The design of a thistle is being progressed, although, following public consultation, shinty camans are to be incorporated into this to reflect the areas strong ties with the sport. This has been welcomed however, until the funds are available to commission the artist and relevant consents in place, no further specific detail is available. The principle of siting and design is supported, although further detail will require to be secured by planning condition before works commence on site.

Community Engagement

- 8.9 Supporting documentation outlines that the applicant (KCDC) has since lodging the application engaged with the community through a survey, reaching 158 people. These were predominantly from Kingussie itself, with respondents also from nearby Newtonmore and Aviemore. A summary of the consultation appears to suggest that of those who responded 47% agreed with the principle of the design but had some concerns. It appears from those who responded that there is however support for some form of sculpture.
- 8.10 It is understood that the KCDC has also engaged with other local groups including the Community Council, Business Forum, Kingussie High School, Kingussie Shinty Club, Badenoch Heritage Project, The Community Support Manager, Cairngorms National Park Authority and Sustrans. It is submitted that of those groups who responded, feedback was largely positive.

Subject to the above actions, it is recommended to **GRANT** the application subject to the following conditions and reasons

1. No development shall commence until finalised details of the proposed sculpture design have been submitted to, and approved in writing by, the Planning Authority. For the avoidance of doubt this shall include detailed elevational drawings and detail on final materials to be used. The development shall thereafter be undertaken in accordance with the approved details.

Reason: As the design has not yet been finalised and in the interest of visual amenity.

TIME LIMIT FOR THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THIS PLANNING PERMISSION

In accordance with Section 58 of the Town and Country Planning (Scotland) Act 1997 (as amended), the development to which this planning permission relates must commence within THREE YEARS of the date of this decision notice. If development has not commenced within this period, then this planning permission shall lapse.

INFORMATIVES

Initiation and Completion Notices

The Town and Country Planning (Scotland) Act 1997 (as amended) requires all developers to submit notices to the Planning Authority prior to, and upon completion of, development. These are in addition to any other similar requirements (such as

Building Warrant completion notices) and failure to comply represents a breach of planning control and may result in formal enforcement action.

- 1. The developer must submit a Notice of Initiation of Development in accordance with Section 27A of the Act to the Planning Authority prior to work commencing on site.
- 2. On completion of the development, the developer must submit a Notice of Completion in accordance with Section 27B of the Act to the Planning Authority.


