# **Purpose/Executive Summary**

Description: Kirkton Wind Farm - Construction and operation of a wind farm

comprising up to 14 turbines with a blade tip height of up to 149.9m and

ancillary infrastructure with an installed capacity of up to 70MW

**Ward:** 01 – North, West and Central Sutherland

#### Recommendation

Members are asked to note the submission of the PAN and highlight any material issues they wish to be brought to the attention of the applicant before the submission of an application for planning permission.

#### 1.0 BACKGROUND

- 1.1 This report informs the Planning Applications Committee of the submission of the attached Proposal of Application Notice (PAN).
- 1.2 The application is likely to generate more than 50MW of electricity therefore the proposal will be required to apply for consent under the Electricity Act. The PAN which was received by the Council on 14 September 2021 and has been submitted voluntarily. The PAN is not a statutory requirement for an application made under Section 36 of the Electricity Act 1989, as is the case for full planning applications for major or national developments. It has therefore been submitted in the spirit of public engagement to advise the Council of public exhibitions taking place ahead of the submission of a Section 36 application to the Energy Consents Unit.
- 1.3 The submitted information attached includes:
  - Proposal of Application Notice (Application Form)
  - Location Plan
- 1.4 In line with Covid-19 public health advice and temporary modifications made to the Town and Country Planning (Development Management Procedure) (Scotland) Regulations 2013, the prospective developer proposes to undertake one in person public event and one online public consultation event. Both formats will allow members of the public to engage in live discussion. Two events are due to take place on:
  - Event 1 6 October 2021, 1500 1900hrs at the Strathy Village Hall; and
  - Event 2 anticipated to take place in November 2021 online.
- 1.5 The project and virtual event webpage is: <a href="www.kirktonwindfarm.co.uk">www.kirktonwindfarm.co.uk</a>
- 1.6 The consultation will be publicised and advertised in accordance with the appropriate statutory requirements with adverts to be placed within the Northern Times and the John O'Groat Journal. An invitation maildrop will also be undertaken by the applicant to make people aware of the proposed development. The catchment for its distribution has been specified by the Planning Authority and will cover properties with visibility within a 10km radius. Details of all notified parties are contained and appended to the PAN form, and include the Melvich, Caithness West and Strathy and Armadale Community Councils, with the prospective applicant separately confirming that local ward Councillors, MP and MSPs are also to be notified.
- 1.7 The forthcoming application will be accompanied by a Pre-Application Consultation (PAC) report explaining the consultation undertaken, feedback received, and any resultant amendments made to the planning application.

# 2.0 DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT

2.1 The prospective development comprises: the construction and operation of a wind farm comprising up to 14 turbines with a blade tip height of up to 149.9m and ancillary infrastructure with an installed capacity of up to 70MW.

2.2 The applicant has sought formal pre-application advice from the Planning Authority via the Pre-Application Advice Service for Major Developments prior to lodging the PAN. The pre-application advice pack was issued on 5 February 2021 with the submitted details and advice given remaining confidential until such a time an application is submitted.

#### 3.0 SITE DESCRIPTION

- 3.1 The site extends to approximately 455ha and lies around 2.6km to the south of Melvich. The site generally sloping westwards. Topography ranges from approximately 100m AOD to 150m AOD with the western extent of the proposed site forming the most elevated section. The site is predominantly moorland and grazing land with a relatively small area of forestry at its northern edge. Currently there is an existing track from the public road to the site, but it is expected main access to be taken from the A836 located to the north east. A core path located approximately 1km east of the PAN boundary.
- 3.2 To the north, the surrounding areas is rural in nature, with land predominantly used for grazing, agriculture and forestry. To the east, the A897 runs parallel to the site boundary within approximately 1.5 km distance. Common Grazings are located to the south of the site.

The site entirely sits across the sweeping moorland and flows Landscape Character Area identified by NatureScot. The Kyle of Tongue National Scenic Area (NSA) lies 16km to the west of the proposed site boundary. A number of Special Landscape Areas (SLA) are located in proximity of the site including the Farr Bay, Strathy and Portskerra SLA, Dunnet Head SLA Ben Griam and Loch nan Clar SLA.

To the west, the majority of the site lies mainly within three main nationally important designations of Special Protection Area 'SPA' and Special area of Conservation 'SAC' due to the Caithness and Sutherland Peatlands Ramsar and 'SSSI' site of West Halladale SSSI due to the presence of Carbon Rich Soils Deep Peat and Priority Peatland Habitat. In wider area, the designated area of Forsinard Flows 'NNR' is located approximately 11km to the south.

- 3.3 A number of small tributaries run through the site and join the larger Halladale river to the east. The Allt an Tigh-choinneimh watercourse runs from south west to north east through the site area. The site is identified being within the 1 in 200 years fluvial flood risk as mapped by SEPA due to a number watercourses within the PAN boundary and the site being enclosed by number of water surfaces as well. Based on knowledge of the area the site is within areas of Class 1 and 2 peatland habitats, identified being nationally important within Carbon and Peatland Map 2016.
- 3.5 Within the site boundary there are no designated cultural heritage features. However, within the wider area there are significant number of built and cultural heritage assets. This includes three Scheduled Monuments, fifteen Listed Buildings including Category A, B and C.
- 3.6 The similar developments in the wider area which will require to be considered by the applicant in their cumulative assessments are listed below:
