# 4. Introduction / Context Part 1

# 4.1 **The Ross and Cromarty Educational Trust**

- 4.2 Reports were previously made to the former Ross and Cromarty Committee. Following reorganisation of committees, reports will now go to the following local committees:
  - Wester Ross, Strathpeffer and Lochalsh
  - Easter Ross
  - Dingwall and Seaforth
  - Black Isle
- 4.3 This report was delayed due to the pandemic.
- 4.4 Due to the emergency response to the pandemic, some grants were unable to be awarded within the year 2019-20. The income for 2019-20, therefore, had to be put into the capital fund, under the terms of the trust. The applications were rolled into 2020-21.
- 4.5 In the financial year 2019-20, the income to the trust was £227,428.
- 4.6 In the financial year 2020-21, the income to the trust was £12,219.
- 4.7 The income from 2019-20 of £227,428 was largely as a result of a shares dividend which is required to go into the capital fund. The capital fund sits around £1.6 million. Previous investment income was in the region of £15,000 per annum. The reduction of income for 2020/21 reflects the worldwide financial challenges, primarily as a result of the Covid 19 pandemic.
- 4.8 It is anticipated that economic recovery during and following the pandemic may take some years and may well have a negative impact on the availability of funds for this trust.
- 4.9 Under the circumstances, the possibility of drawing down from the capital fund to allow grants to be made during these difficult times was explored. Legal advice was sought but it was discovered that it is not possible to draw down from capital, under the terms of the trust.
- 4.10 As part of the emergency response to Covid and to allow some payments to be made to applicants, one off funding of £21,000 was made available to the trust from Mid Area Education and Learning.
- 4.11 Awards were, therefore, made to the following within Ross & Cromarty within the financial year of 20-21 but actually covered applications from the previous year as well.
