Highland Foodbank was launched in 2005 with the opening of the Foodbank Centre in Madras Street, Inverness. A second Foodbank Centre was opened at Hilton Village in 2014 to provide easier access to clients in the Ness-side, Inverness South and Millburn Wards of the city. With the growth of the use of foodbanks we were having to store and sort food at four main locations which involved some double-handling of stock and also additional staff and volunteers for sorting and driving. It was decided that the best solution was to find suitable premises in Inverness that could be the central store and to also be open Monday to Friday for clients to come for food.

In September 2018 we located to premises in Glebe Street, Inverness. During the last three years the centralised facility has provided a more efficient service. Highland Foodbank has a Highland-wide reach with support for rural foodbanks being managed from the Glebe Street centre. This is a far more manageable and efficient set up that has been highlighted all the more during the pandemic.

The Glebe Street centre has a custom-designed lounge / meeting room for clients to be seen in a more relaxed environment than the previous centres. Feedback from clients and referring agencies who have visited is all positive with a 100% preference for the new centre.

The Foodbank exists to provide emergency food supplies to local people suffering financial crisis – these come from a wide cross-section of the community including people awaiting benefits, people on low incomes, and people who have been made redundant. The food distributed by Highland Foodbank is donated by members of the local community, including groups such as businesses, churches and schools. Clients

are referred to Foodbank by one of the 100+ partner agencies who work with Foodbank in Inverness including the Highland Council's Care Health & Social Care Service, the Service Points, the Highland Council's Housing Services, the Scottish Welfare Fund, local branches of the Citizens' Advice Bureau and the local Women's Refuge. The Foodbank Centre aims to offer a welcoming space where besides getting food, client scan discuss their current issues should they wish to do so, and be signposted to other appropriate agencies should this be necessary and should they wish to be referred.

Usage of Highland Foodbank remains high -2,736 people from the Inverness area were provided with food in financial year April 2020 to March 2021. For all our Highland Foodbanks combined people fed during January to December 2020 is 8,267 which represents an increase of 7% on 2019. This would have been higher if it were not for the introduction of the increase of £20 per week for those receiving Universal Credit and also the opening of a number of smaller temporary food projects locally. As well as this the introduction of vouchers given to families whose children would normally receive free school meals made a difference. The expectation is that we will see an increase in referrals to Foodbank with the ending of the Universal Credit additional £20 per week and also the ending of the Job Retention Scheme that could see higher unemployment.

The £20,000 being sought from the Common Good Fund will contribute to the total running costs of the Inverness element of the project at the Glebe Street centre. This will help us provide support and will be a massive benefit to Inverness people suffering real hardship.

The service provided in Inverness by Highland Foodbank addresses, in an equitable way, the needs of people in the community who are facing financial crisis. The Foodbank service is available to everyone in need, and clients are referred by one of the local partner organisations, of which there are about 100, including the Highland Council's Care and Learning Service the Inverness Service Points, the Highland Council's Housing Services, the Scottish Welfare Fund, the local branches of the Citizens' Advice Bureau and the local Women's Refuge.

These partner organisations are responsible for assessing the need of the clients before referring them.

The main centre has continued to provide an efficient streamlined provision with the majority of people coming from the local community. The running of all Highland Foodbanks is managed from Glebe Street. Support is still provided to people who would have attended the other locations we used to have centres but a review showed numbers there remained lower and the public are best served with having the main base and staff at one location.

Numbers have increased in the last year which indicates that people needing Foodbank continues to grow. With the impact of Covid-19 still being felt we were able to provide a Highland-wide service more easily as our infrastructure was in place. We are continuing to deliver food to people unable to come to a Foodbank centre.

The longer-term vision for the Ice Centre is to create a new facility with two ice pads to meet the growing demand for skating and ice hockey whilst continue to provide curling on the other. The aspiration is to have spectator capacity at the new Ice Hockey arena for around 1500 visitors.

The immediate aims of the current Ice Centre project however are: -

- to create a multi-function festival, cultural and events centre from the benefit of Inverness city and the Highlands.
- to generate much needed off ice income for the Ice Centre. The potential income that can be generated from our 2000 capacity events venue is significant.
- to secure the long-term viability of our community-based facility correspondingly preserving and protecting the future of the Inverness Ice Centre.
- to contribute to the wider community through bringing acts and visitors to Inverness. Increasing bed nights and other revenue generation and economic growth for the city without displacement.
- to preserve and enhance our sporting offering and facilities from the increased revenue
- to create additional jobs and the opportunity for upskilling.
- to continue to be socially inclusive.
- to develop an uninterrupted ice programme which have benefits to health, physical and mental wellbeing, and fitness, helping to reduce the pressure on health care.
- for any new fixtures, fittings, equipment, and technology to be portal and transportable to ensure maximise benefit from the investment should there be further developments in the future

Who will benefit?

The potential financial benefits are recorded within our aims noted above.

To provide some additional context, we provide ice sports for all ages and all capabilities in the Inverness and surrounding Highland area. Uniquely for a Rink with just 1 ice pad we provide all 3 ice sports, Curling, Skating and Ice Hockey, offering the widest spectrum of opportunities for ice sports participation to the city.

The benefits are far reaching however and go well beyond the provision of ice sports.

Our tenants are aligned to the values of the Ice Centre to deliver fitness, health, education, and general wellbeing also and they can all benefit from the project.

We work in partnership with the Highland Hospice to stage their largest annual fundraising event, Strictly Inverness. The capability to host more events will increase opportunities to generate revenue for our existing charitable and new charitable partners with clear benefits for the city and surrounds.

The financial opportunities and benefits of being able to stage more events are clear. We currently hold one large event per year which generated £160K net in 2019 prior to COVID however being able to flip the flooring quickly means we can stage many more events without disruption to our ice schedule. This means ice fees can be maintained whilst significant amounts of additional income can be generated from the events.

Proceeds of all fundraising activities will continue to be allocated to ice sports. "Strictly Inverness" is hugely successful and is staged in the Ice Centre for the benefit of the Highland Hospice and the Rink. The "Strictly" funds raised by the Centre have subsidised ice fees for over a decade, helping Skating, and Ice Hockey to be more affordable and accessible for many more families. As indicated this project provides the opportunity to host more events and correspondingly help more families and vulnerable groups.

The support we require is:

- to help fund new specialised ice pad flooring,
- to help fund new technology to provide streaming capability,
- to help fund improved toilet and changing facilities,
- to help fund improved disabled access and
- to help fund improved storage for the new flooring,

The plan is to acquire specialist insulated flooring, install technology, improve our changing, toilet and shower facilities and disability access.

The new flooring is a game changer for us. It will enable us to quickly flip from ice activities to being ready to stage events. This means we can increase the number and frequency of events, in turn increasing visitor numbers and generating significantly increased revenue without disrupting our ice activities programme. "Strictly Inverness" demonstrates what we can do and what is possible as an events venue.

We wish to install technology with the capacity to show the sports and events in our bar area and to stream to the public. This has the potential to become a significant new income stream for us.

The safety and wellbeing of our user is paramount and improvements to our toilets, changing and shower facilities and disability access for our wheelchair users is overdue. Enhanced facilities will encourage users to return to our Centre in safety.

These changes will be more attractive to the new user, visitor and patron and will encourage them to stay within the Centre and to come back. The improvements will help to build confidence of our existing users to return safely to the Centre, to stay to socialise in our bar area. The event goers will clearly benefit from these improvements also.

The project can be implemented quickly, with the ability to deliver on all our aims, including immediate and significant increases in revenue generation.

We provide ice activities for all ages from toddlers on skates for the first time, to some of our more elderly citizens who enjoy their senior curling sessions. Equipment and facilities are provided to make it easier for wheelchair users and the less able to

participate. The off-ice facilities is a great meeting place for the more vulnerable groups (and their carers) and when we re-opened last October the comment made was that was great to get back interacting again. Curling especially is a great social activity.

The project improvements are designed to further enhance the opportunities with improved access and the ability to view the sports and events in the bar or in time online. This means that the less able can sit in the comfort of our bar area or in their on home where otherwise they would miss out. Perhaps having an involvement or opportunity to watch the activities or events for the first time ever.

- 3) We were a popular venue in the past attracting many big acts. As the demand for ice activities grew, events became more difficult to host because the time needed to switch the old heavy flooring meant that the ice activities programme had to stop whilst the flooring was down.

The raised beds will make it much easier for everyone to access and participate in growing fruit, veg and herbs. As they will be in a long polytunnel, the growing season will be considerably lengthened, so we can produce more.

The food grown will be sold in our shop helping to make the Grow Project self-sufficient. Surplus will be given to Inverness Foodstuff at Ness Bank Church and Crown Community cupboard. Trainees are encouraged to take the food home to encourage healthy eating.

Help Required- Financial

- Material costs: recycled plastic, wood and other materials to build the beds.
- Labour costs: High Life staff will coordinate the building and installation of the beds with volunteers and Grow Trainees.

The Queen's Green Canopy (QGC - https://queensgreencanopy.org/) is a unique tree planting initiative created to mark Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee in 2022 which invites people from across the United Kingdom to "Plant a Tree for the Jubilee."

Everyone from individuals to Scout and Girlguiding groups, villages, cities, counties, schools and corporates will be encouraged to play their part to enhance our environment by planting trees from October, when the tree planting season begins, through to the end of the Jubilee year in 2022.

We are encouraging individuals, schools and community groups in Highland to get involved in the initiative and have put together some guidance for preparing, planting and maintaining the commemorative tree. While some guidance is available on the QGC website (https://queensgreencanopy.org/get-involved/plant/) we have also prepared and attached some tree planting and maintenance specifications for small (bare-root) trees and for larger specimen trees (root-ball) for additional assistance.

In order to participate in this project, we are able to purchase your own trees from a reputable nursery. Schools or community groups can apply for free saplings from autumn 2021 through the Woodland Trust partnership. The Woodland Trust have hundreds of thousands of trees to give away to schools and communities through application on the following website - https://www.woodlandtrust.org.uk/plant-trees/schools-and-communities/tree-pack-application/.

Once planted we will order an official plaque to mark the occasion for generations to come - templates for QGC plaques will be available on the QGC website in due course. From October, we will also be able to photograph our Jubilee trees and upload it on to the QGC map.
