Report Title: Progress against Gaelic Language Plan 3, quarterly report,

monitoring and scrutiny process

Report By: Executive Chief Officer, Performance and Governance

1. Purpose/Executive Summary

- 1.1 The main purpose of the report is to inform Members how the Gaelic Language Plan 3 (GLP3) is being monitored and scrutinised.
- 1.2 As highlighted in previous reports the Highland Council uses Performance and Risk Management System (PRMS) for the monitoring and scrutiny of corporate plans. It is important to recognise that GLP3 is a corporate plan, therefore it has been incorporated into the PRMS System which allows for a more streamlined and focussed reporting system on the implementation of the Plan.
- 1.3 Members of the Committee are asked to note the progress and challenges regarding the implementation of some enabling actions in the Plan. Challenges are largely due to the pandemic, which has impacted some aspects of project implementation and completion dates, however, the Gaelic Team have and continue to endeavour to adapt to an on-line or a bended approach to deliver the enabling actions.

2. Recommendations

2.1 Members are asked to:

- i. consider the progress made in both monitoring and implementing GLP3 on a quarterly basis utilising the (PRMS) support delivery of GLP3.
- ii. note the progress and challenges regarding the implementation of some enabling actions in the Plan.

3. Implications

- 3.1 Resource In addition to Highland Council funding, grant funding is also provided by the Scottish Government and the various Bòrd na Gàidhlig funding streams to assist in the delivery of the Plan. Currently part of the Council's Statutory Gaelic Plan Discretionary Grants Budget is used to provide financial support to key external organisations which assist to deliver services and key enabling actions with the GLP3.
- 3.2 Legal The Highland Council is required to have an approved Gaelic Language Plan in accordance with the Gaelic Language (Scotland) Act 2005. There are likewise obligations in ensuring that the Plan commitments are implemented.
- 3.3 Community (Equality, Poverty, Rural and Island) The implementation of GLP has a strong community focus across the Highlands and Islands due to the activities and the support that is provided in communities where Gaelic education and community support and development is provided.
- 3.4 Climate Change / Carbon Clever All meetings are held using the various virtual platforms approved by the Highland Council.
- 3.5 Risk Restrictions and lockdowns have curtailed, limited and in some cases stalled some project development and implementation, however, maximising the use of online technologies has generated new and innovative approaches to several development projects. The Gaelic Team have successfully delivered a number of activities in the current quarter due to the easing of lockdown restrictions.
- 3.6 Gaelic Hugely positive implications regarding the preservation and development of Gaelic and culture across all the sectors and age groups and it also enhances the social and economic value of the Gaelic and its associated culture.

4. The Gaelic Language Plan 3 (GLP3)

- 4.1 GLP3 has the following Themes, which are in-line with BnaG's high level aims:
 - Gaelic in the Home, Early Learning and Child Care
 - Gaelic in the Community
 - Gaelic in Education
 - Gaelic in the Arts, Culture, and Heritage
 - Gaelic in the Workplace
 - The Social, Economic and Cultural Value of Gaelic

5. PRMS Performance and Governance

- 5.1 The GLP3 has been 'ragged' on a quarterly basis. Quarter 4 from the previous year is included and covers the period 1 January to 31 March 2021. Quarter 1 from the current financial year dates from 1 April to 30 June and Quarter 2 from 1 July to 30 September 21.
- 5.2 **Appendix 2** summarises the current position regarding the progress made in implementing GLP3 within the timeframe set above. There are 126 enabling actions in GLP3 which span the 6 themes, most of which are subject to the following:
 - national position regarding the pandemic and Covid restrictions

- available resources
- support from the Scottish Government
- support from BnaG
- positive key stakeholder engagement and partnership working
- engagement with schools and community groups
- 5.3 A summary of the indicators is outlined in the table below. This shows that:
 - 5 Actions are continuing to show some slippage from the previous quarter
 - 5 Actions have moved from on target to complete
 - There is an increase from 9 to 14 completed targets

These indicators are set out in summary dashboard format in **Appendix 1**.

The primary cause of slippage has been the restrictions and pressures imposed by the national pandemic and these have been reported to Committee previously. Wherever possible the Gaelic Team has identified alternative approaches and adaptations to deliver against GLP3 targets. Although there is a degree of slippage, processes are in place and development meetings underway to take the initiatives forward.

6. Gaelic Community Learning and Development Project Updates

Gaelic Learning for Adults - MG ALBA describes SpeakGaelic as the new, wideranging, multi-faceted learning brand, offering the most comprehensive approach to learning Scottish Gaelic in a generation. The SpeakGaelic brand offers users the option of face-to-face classes, self-guided online learning, and media content through a variety of platforms – or all three at the same time. As well as complete beginners, SpeakGaelic aims at enabling lapsed or less confident speakers to use their Gaelic with confidence. Highland Council Community Learning and Development (CLD) officers arranged for Speak Gaelic training for Highland Gaelic Learner tutors. This provided an opportunity to engage with the brand and implement this approach within their classes.

The overview of Speak Gaelic classes across Highland is currently as follows:

- SpeakGaelicA1 two face-to-face classes running in Inverness and one online class in Skye.
- Two A1 classes have commenced online with 36 students registered.
- Two further Beginners A1 classes to commence in January 2022.
- SpeakGaelic A1 face to face classes are running in Dingwall and Thurso since September 2021.
- In Tain, Ullapool and Dornoch A1taster sessions are available prior to classes commencing in January 2022.

Gaelic Medium parents continue to access classes across Highland. Additionally, a 7 week online class aimed at parents of Gaelic medium children covering simple social language, colours, numbers, language around bedtime, washing and story-time including a look at Gaelic phonics has just been completed. Following the success of this class, it is hoped to run the same class again, beginning in January 2022.

6.2 <u>Mòd Fringe Programme -</u> The Highland Council Gaelic Team organised a series of family and children's events which took place in Inverness during the Royal National Mòd week 9th -15th October as part of a Mòd fringe programme. This was planned in collaboration with officers from various Gaelic organisations including Comunn Na Gàidhlig, Comunn Nam Pàrant, Fèis na h-Òige, Cultur-Lann, An Comunn Gàidhealach and Spòrs Gàidhlig.

Events opened with a pop-up ceilidh dance held in Falcon Square, Inverness on Saturday 9th October. Activities during the week included mini-Fèis morning workshops as well as a family ceilidh in Fairways, Inverness with music provided by young local musicians. CulturLann's provided fun session for toddlers with arts & crafts, games, and music. Additionally, outdoor activities included a family forest picnic took place in Abriachan and an outdoor music and story session held in Culloden woods specifically for pre-school children.

A workshop for adults and young people that incorporated the songs of the influential Highland Gaelic Bard, Màiri Mhòr nan Òran. The workshop culminated with a guided tour of the Chapel Yard cemetery where the Bard is buried. This event acknowledged the bicentenary of the birth of Màiri Mhòr nan Òran.

- 6.3 <u>Gaelic Medium Gaelic Football Camp</u> The Highland Council Gaelic Team organised a 3-day Gaelic Medium football Camp which was delivered by coaches from FC Sonas during the second week (18th-20th) of the October school holiday. The camp welcomed 24 pupils during the week which included Gaelic medium pupils from BSGI, Inverness, Dingwall, Nairn, Drumnadrochit and Ullapool. The children were given an opportunity to question and speak with Gaelic speaking players from Inverness Caledonian Thistle Football Club before being presented with a goodie bag at the end of the camp. - 6.4 School Community Support for Gaelic The Gaelic Team have been working in collaboration with GME schools to re-establish after-school clubs and activities. This supports GM pupils with their Gaelic language usage out-with the classroom. The CLD Gaelic officers have established a programme of out of school clubs initially targeting a small number of schools to accommodate the reintroduction of school lets and with the ongoing restrictions associated with COVID 19.
 - The GLAIF funded project Club Spòrs (sports club) at Bun-Sgoil Ghàidhlig Loch Abar has re-started.
 - The GLAIF funded after-school clubs programme at BSGPR are Girls Football, Gaelic cheerleading, Mini Sports sessions aimed at Sgoil Àraich and Early Level pupils and climbing wall sessions. With financial support from Bòrd na Gàidhlig and in partnership with Staffin and Kilmuir primaries GM pupils have the opportunity to participate in Gaelic Football, Film G, and a Club Gàidhlig after school activities.

- An after-school arts and crafts club has re-started in BSGI led by 2 former pupils, who are both intending to start a Gaelic and Education degree next September. Working with Secondary pupils is an important element of the community work provided by the Gaelic Team. This allows senior phase pupils the opportunity to engage with younger pupils and act as role models for language usage.
- After school clubs in Dingwall Primary, Thurso, Ullapool and Tain will begin in January 2022 providing a range of activities from drama, shinty to language support.
- 6.5 <u>Gaelic Sailing Taster sessions Highland Council Gaelic team</u>, in partnership with the Isle of Skye Sailing Club, organised a block of Gaelic taster sailing sessions for young people. Gaelic medium pupils from Bun-sgoil Ghàidhlig Phort Rìgh, Dunvegan and Kilmuir participated in the after-school sailing activity. The Sailing sessions provided the opportunity for young GM peers to get together outdoors and use their Gaelic skills in a fun and informal environment.

6.6 The National Mòd 2021 - After a year's hiatus due to the pandemic, the Royal National Mòd 2021 took place in Inverness providing eight days of events. The event brought fans of Gaelic music and culture together once again to celebrate the language, history and future of the Gaels.

This year's Mòd provided an opportunity to highlight not only the event, but Inverness and the wider Highland area. The Gaelic Team initiated a project to create a video to promote The Highlands and associated Islands. This highlighted the areas across Highland as both fantastic areas to live, to work, and to enjoy blended city and rural leisure time with regarding Gaelic and associated culture. The video was uploaded to Highland Council's youtube channel and shared on An Comann Social Media platforms. The video was also integrated into the Mòd's streamed programmes on Tuesday and Friday.

6.7 <u>Mòd Academy 2021 - The Gaelic Team in association with An Comunn Gàidhealach, with support from Fèisean nan Gàidheal regarding the delivery of the project, ran tutor lead support sessions for pupils between 4 May and 17 June 2021 for the online Mòd competitions. The project was restricted due to Covid regulations preventing singing groups from coming together and the project was subsequently delivered online. The Mòd Academy received support from Bòrd na Gàidhlig.</u>

Provision was as follows for both Gaelic Medium and Gaelic Learner competitions;

- Solo singing tutor support provided for pupils from Bun-Sgoil Ghàidhlig Inbir Nis; Craighill Primary, Tain; Mount Pleasant Primary, Thurso; Muirtown Primary, Inverness; and Inverness Royal Academy.
- Folk groups tutoring and support provided for pupils from Bun-Sgoil Ghàidhlig Inbir Nis; Craighill Primary, Tain; Muirtown Primary, Inverness.

 Due to schools concentrating on 'recovery', and there being no live singing group competitions for children at the Royal National Mòd 2021, a number of schools were not in a position to accept the offer of sessions this year.

Given that the project was quite different from that originally envisaged due to Covid restrictions, the alternative project activities were extremely successful with a number of the pupils going on to achieve success in their competition.

7. High Life Highland (HLH) Update

- 7.1 Highlife Highland are keen to ensure that the enthusiasm generated by the Mòd continues to gather momentum as services look to develop, welcome customers back and attract new service users. HLH services including Music, Museums, Archives and Libraries were pleased to help support and promote the recent National Mod in Inverness.
- 7.2 Across all Highlife Highland activities, HLH services are committed to developing and continuing Gaelic activities. For example, social media and Am Baile posts are currently providing new and enhanced opportunities for engagement with Gaelic language and culture.
- 7.3 The Library service is delighted to report that families may once again enjoy inperson Bookbug sessions including the much loved Gaelic sessions. Libraries will increase the number of sessions offered, where required, to ensure that no-one loses out owing to restrictions on numbers in the smaller spaces.
- 7.4 HLH Active Schools support a number of Gaelic Medium after-school clubs across the Highlands. After-school activities are now resuming as Covid restrictions on facilities ease. Highlights illustrating the breadth of provision are a new Shinty Club in Nairn, a Multi-Sport Gaelic Medium Sports Club in Lochaber and a Cheerleading group on Skye.
- 7.5 Skye and Lochaber Archive Centre (SLAC) are working to enhance Gaelic links with Education. The centre is supporting two projects with teachers; one is with Bun-Sgoil Ghàidhlig Phort Rìgh and the other with Bun-Sgoil Stafainn. The project aims to have an art installation at Bun-Sgoil Ghàidhlig Phort Rìgh with the potential to show work on an online platform. Bun-Sgoil Stafainn are looking at the environment, crofting and Salmon Fishing. The project is expected to run throughout 2022. SLAC is also establishing links with Sabhal Mòr Ostaig: and will visit to SMO to meet with staff and students, with arrangements made for a reciprocal visit from SMO staff and students to visit the archive to explore the resources.
- As part of their experience on the Youth Work Education Recovery Fund programme in Fort William some young people gained more confidence in their peer group including youngsters they hadn't met before through sharing their love of Gaelic to take on the character of a pro footballer speaking in Gaelic and supporting everyone to sing a Gaelic song as a way of using language and culture in communicating with each other. In working towards their DofE award one young person did their volunteering by helping children to prepare for their move from primary to secondary GM school in Bun-Sgoil Ghaidhlig Inbhir Nis.

7.7 The HLH youth participation team, including youth workers, Highland Youth Parliament reps and the Youth Convener, is looking forward to meeting and working with the new Gaelic Youth Champion so that each can hear about and support each other's campaigns and programmes. The Gaelic Youth Champion is a one year paid full-time post which has been possible to create following a successful application by the Gaelic Team to the Bord na Gaidhlig GLAIF fund. The post for a young Gaelic speaker in Highland will be based in Bun-Sgoil Ghàidhlig Phort Rìgh but will work across the whole of the Highlands.
