The key performance indicators (KPIs) above have been extracted from the suite of KPIs contained within the Scottish Fire and Rescue Framework Document 2013.



- Reducing the number of attendances to unwanted fire alarm signals (false alarms)



Commentary

The tables above represent the number of accidental dwelling house fires that occurred within the Local Committee boundary. Tolerances are set in context of the number of previous incidents by reporting month and, where there has been an increase in overall incidents, the colour coding is identified with the application of the red, amber and green (RAG) system.


Trend lines also identify the number of incidents over the reporting 5-year period, both by month and by reporting quarter. Comparative quarterly review indicates a lower-than-average outcome to the wider Highland area.

The Service works closely with partner agencies and communities to reduce the number of accidental dwelling house fires through the delivery of targeted Home Fire Safety Visits (HFSVs) and the installation of free smoke and heat detectors. Supporting the targeted delivery, partner agencies routinely share data identifying residents that would benefit from this free service, aiming to reduce the risk of fire and harm to householders and their property.

Post Domestic Incident Response (PDIR) is undertaken after every incident as a means of generating HFSVs, and raising fire safety awareness in the community.




Commentary

The figures show no accidental dwelling fire fatalities for the reporting period.




Deliberate fires include those as a result of fire related antisocial behaviour (ASB) and wildfires. Analysis of the overall incidents and the periods in when they occur, identify seasonal variations e.g. Muirburning season and holiday periods. The Service has introduced several fire reduction strategies and thematic action plans targeting these types of incidents. Working in partnership with other key agencies, the Service is working hard to reduce these incidents overall. Examples of which include the promotion of fire reduction through the Safer Highland ASB Group, promoting best practice and partnership working through the Scottish Wildfire Forum (SWF) and targeting key groups ahead of known peak activity periods.

There were 2 incidents identified in April 2022, these were wildfire related incident type, these incidents are on the increase due to climate change however are currently less common within the committee area than elsewhere within Highland.

We continue to work in partnership with Police Scotland and other partners to investigate the causes of these incident types. We also work with landowners, the media and the public to highlight the risk of wildfires and the challenges we will face with climate change seeking to reduce the number and severity of these incident types.



Commentary

Special Service incidents involves an operational response to a range of emergency activities including life critical road traffic collisions, flooding events, industrial accidents and in support of other emergency service colleagues at larger multi-agency non-fire related events.

The majority of the RTC's attended were of a lower incident type response requirement however two were extrication and one resulted in a fatality.


The most common type of special service is as a result of a road traffic collision involving, in most cases, a response from all three emergency services. The Service is working in partnership with other emergency response colleagues and partner agencies through the Highland Road Safety Group to reduce these incidents in the communities of Skye and Raasay.

Road safety activities in the area include e.g. Driving Ambition and Safe Highlander, all of which have a focused message of road safety, targeting key groups in the reduction of road related incidents as identified in Scotland's Road Safety Framework to 2020.



Commentary

The Service responds to several false alarms over the reporting year, most of which are unwanted fire alarm signals (UFAS). The number of UFAS calls across the areas of Skye and Raasay remain low in comparison to the wider Highland area.

A new policy was implemented on the 1st of December 2014 which requires SFRS personnel to work closely with duty holders in order to reduce the number of UFAS events. SFRS personnel will continue to do this to focus on driving these numbers down further.

A specific premise was recorded as a repeat offender and the local district commander has engaged with the duty holder to seek improvements which will be monitored on an ongoing basis.

Commentary

The table shows the current staffing levels on stations and total availability that these individuals have been available for calls, and how this affects the availability of the station's fire appliances.

The Service works closely with employers and RDS staff to support an improvement in availability. However, we recognise the challenges faced by RDS staff when combining primary employment and their operational availability across the communities in Highland area.

The Service is actively recruiting in several communities to improve station and fire appliance availability and therefore improve on the availability statistics for Skye and Raasay Stations.

Recruitment continues to be a significant challenge across the wider Highland area with social and demographic changes, work is underway within SFRS to streamline the recruitment process and support improved recruitment processes.
