### 1 Purpose/Executive Summary

- 1.1 The Sub-Committee is invited to consider applications for Town Twinning funding from the Inverness Common Good Fund.

### 2 Recommendations

- 2.1 Members are asked to:
- i. Consider the funding requests listed in the attached Appendix 1;
  - ii. make recommendations to the City of Inverness Area Committee at its meeting on 18 August 2025 for £26,350 to be drawn from ICGF Reserves to fund the 2026 Town Twinning Augsburg Anniversary Year Activities.

### 3 Implications

#### 3.1 Resource

There is £10k available in the Town Twinning budget and £6k available in the Civic Contingencies budget for 2025/26, the funding requests detailed in Appendix 1 amount to £26,350 and are in respect of activity taking place in 2026/27.

Noting that these funding requests are in excess of the available budgets for Town Twinning and the Civic Contingency and that these activities will take place next financial year 2026/27, should Members support these funding requests, a recommendation to the City of Inverness Area Committee at its meeting on 18 August 2025 for the use of ICGF reserves will need to be made.

The Sub-Committee have no power to award grants in excess of the available budget.

- 3.2 **Legal** – All relevant Governance and Standing Orders will be complied with in respect of the civic event activity set out in this report. There are no other Legal implications contained in this report.

- 3.3 **Risk** - Projects have been impacted by recent rises in costs and steps have been taken to monitor deliverability. This will help ensure that funds awarded remain focused on supporting deliverable Town Twinning activity.
- 3.4 **Health and Safety (risks arising from changes to plant, equipment, process, or people)** - Consideration will be given to ensuring that appropriate standards are applied to any town twinning activity approved for financial support from the Inverness Common Good Fund.
- 3.5 **Gaelic** - Where appropriate, town twinning activity and civic events will comply with the Councils policy in respect of supporting Gaelic language and culture.

## 4 Impacts

- 4.1 In Highland, all policies, strategies or service changes are subject to an integrated screening for impact for Equalities, Poverty and Human Rights, Children's Rights and Wellbeing, Climate Change, Islands and Mainland Rural Communities, and Data Protection. Where identified as required, a full impact assessment will be undertaken.
- 4.2 Considering impacts is a core part of the decision-making process and needs to inform the decision-making process. When taking any decision, Members must give due regard to the findings of any assessment.
- 4.3 **Integrated Impact Assessment - Summary**
- 4.3.1 An Integrated Impact Assessment screening has been undertaken, and the conclusions have been subject to the relevant Manager Review and Approval.

## 5 Background

- 5.1 Inverness and Augsburg, Germany, have a town twinning partnership that began in 1956. The twinning was established after a football match between the two cities. Whilst we are a smaller city with a tourist-driven economy and Augsburg is a larger city with a strong industrial base, the recent developments of the Freeport and UHI

Inverness have led Augsburg to have a significant interest in developing mutually beneficial economic links focussed on green energy.

- 5.2 The general aims and objectives of town twinning are to promote friendship, better mutual understanding and social, cultural and commercial exchange between the partners. This was initially intended to help post-war reconciliation and social reconstruction, but has evolved over time into an informal network and process for forging better pan-European education, understanding and social and commercial relationships at the grass roots level.
- 5.3 There is strong anecdotal evidence in Inverness of success in fulfilling these aims: as successive generations of school children, students and apprentices, sportsmen, musicians, youth organisations and other civic groups have enriched their lives and broadened their horizons through their international experiences. Tangible evidence of commercial benefits is harder to identify and impossible to quantify, although mutual promotion of tourism is a constant theme.

## 6 **Proposed 2026 Town Twinning Activity**

- 6.1 **Civic Exchange Visit** - A reciprocal exchange comprising of civic and citizen representatives is proposed to take place in May and July 2026 to celebrate the 70<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Twinning arrangements between our two cities as detailed in **Appendix 1**.
- 6.2 **Augsburg Celebration of 70<sup>th</sup> Anniversary** - The Sporting Alliance Youth Exchange has been initiated by the Federation of Sports Clubs in Augsburg and will see reciprocal visits take place in May and June 2026 with up to 10 young people from Inverness travelling to Augsburg and a reciprocal group visiting from Augsburg. Full details are set out in **Appendix 1**.
- 6.3 The proposed 2026 Town Twinning Augsburg Anniversary Year Activities set out in this report will underpin the Alliance between the two cities and is especially important, noting the 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the twinning alliance taking place in 2026.
- 6.4 Members are asked to support these Town Twinning activities and make a recommendation to the City of Inverness Area Committee at its meeting on 18 August 2025 for £26,350 to be drawn from ICGF Reserves to fund the 2026 Town Twinning Augsburg Anniversary Year Activities.



A reciprocal exchange comprising of civic and citizen representatives is proposed to take place in May and July 2026 to celebrate the 70<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Twinning arrangements between our two cities.

1. Augsburg Invitation – the City of Augsburg are proposing to invite a civic/citizen delegation from the City of Inverness, led by the Provost, to visit in May 2026. Details to be confirmed but likely dates are May 7<sup>th</sup> to 11<sup>th</sup> inclusive.
2. Inverness Invitation – The Provost wishes to invite a civic/citizen delegation from the City of Augsburg led by Mayor Weber arriving Friday 10<sup>th</sup> July 2026, departing Tuesday 14<sup>th</sup> July to coincide with the Inverness Highland Games on Saturday 11<sup>th</sup> July.

This will include an exchange in training methods, giving an insight into how sports training works in our respective countries and will act to connect volunteers from the two countries</li><li>• Additionally, it is hoped that the exchange will result in sustainable exchange arrangements being set up across a network of sports clubs within Inverness &amp; Augsburg.</li></ul> <p><u>Plan:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Age – We are targeting young people within various sporting disciplines all who have shown an inclination to take up sport.
