1.1 This report provides an update to Sutherland County Committee Members on progress against the priorities outlined in the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service Committee Plan for Sutherland

Priority areas are identified through a range of Intervention, Prevention and Protection activities which are delivered through partnership to reduce the risk to the communities of Sutherland.

The report also contains previously agreed information and performance data as requested by Area Committees.

4 Sutherland County Committee Report

- 4.1 The attached performance report provides the current figures for Quarters (Q) 1 and 2, 1st April 2025 to 30st September 2025 from the central Scottish Fire and Rescue Service (SFRS) performance management database against the key indicators and timelines of previous reports.
- 4.2 In achieving the priorities within the Local Committee Plan for the Sutherland area in 2025 & 2026, a number of activities continue to form a significant part of our prevention and protection plan with a view to reducing accidental domestic property fires and serious injuries and deaths resulting from accidental property fires. Free Home Fire Safety Visits (HFSV's) remain a key part of the prevention work undertaken by personnel across Sutherland, targeting Very High- and High-risk households to prioritise those most at risk within our communities, through our Operational on Call Staff and Community Safety Advocates (CSA).

4.3 Operational Incidents

Analysis of the detail behind the performance report for the Sutherland area shows very positive outcomes across the performance indicators during Q1 and Q2, April 2025 to September 2025 when compared with the previous reporting periods. However, it must be emphasised that the baseline figures for some indicators are very low, and this can make meaningful statistical analysis challenging.

- a. The occurrence of three (3) Accidental Dwelling Fires attended by SFRS in Q1 and Q2. The Operational on Call Staff and Community Safety Advocates (CSA's) continue to provide Post Domestic Incident Response (PDIR) in the community to provide reassurance and advice with positive results reflected in only three accidental domestic property fires.
- b. During Q1 and Q2 of 2025 / 2026 SFRS attended zero (0) Fatal Accidental Dwelling Fires in the Sutherland Area. There was zero (0) Accidental Fire Casualties across Sutherland for Q1 and Q2 of the 2025 / 2026 reporting periods, which again provides pleasing reporting. The service remains committed to supporting communities through the Home Fire Safety programme and continues to work closely with partner agencies to identify those most at risk and provide early preventative support and advice.
- c. A total of twenty-eight (21) occurrences of Unwanted False Alarm Signals (UFAS) were attended by SFRS during Q1 and Q2, 2025 / 2026 in the Sutherland Area. This represents an increase from the same reporting period last year. Crews are continuing to engage with premises to identify causes and reduce occurrences.

SFRS have now implement the new UFAS response policy 1st July 2023 and this is reflected in the reduction in figures year to date.

4.4 Station Crewing & Availability

Scottish Fire and Rescue Service has made significant investment in RVDS Recruitment with an RVDS support team now in place and working at a national level. The team has been put together with personnel from all three service delivery areas to support key issues, including staff recruitment and retention

SFRS continues to actively deliver and refine its Retained and Volunteer Duty System (RVDS) recruitment and training processes to meet national and local needs. Key stations and communities are targeted across the Sutherland area. SFRS promotes campaigns within partner agencies, through local media and key community contacts. Continued local area support is requested for recruitment in the following communities:

4.5 Community Safety / Community Action Team

SFRS Community Action Team (CAT) continues to engage and deliver all aspects of Community Safety and education throughout Sutherland, engaging with schools, community groups and the wider Sutherland Community. A locally delivered Fire Skills Course in Dornoch, allowing 12, third, fourth- and fifth-year pupils to attend, who all successfully complete the course over the duration of five days receiving an Employability Award.








Road Traffic Collisions





Trend by Quarter (4 years)







Hour of Day








Non-Domestic Fires in this period



Our Community Safety Advocates and Station personnel undertook 24 Home Fire Safety Visits (HFSVs) during this period. With the introduction of the new, modernised Home Fire Safety Visit (HFSV) system that enhances how we identify, assess and support the most at risk from fire, we may see an initial decline in referrals and HFSVs whilst the new systems and referral pathways are embedded.

Community Safety & Engagement

SFRS Community Action Team (CAT) continues to engage and deliver all aspects of Community Safety and education throughout Sutherland during Q1 & Q2 2025/2026, engaging with Sutherland Primary Schols to deliver Water Safety talks to P1 - P7 pupils. Visits to local Lochs and Beaches, engaging with members of the public highlighting the dangers of wildfires, camping and tent safety, leaflets being provided, resulting in around two hundred people receiving advice, information and guidance.

Through out this reporting period the Community Action Team have engaged with, and education a number of local organisations and community groups, including Students attending the UHI Freshers Fayre in Dornoch, where Fire Safety Guidance was delivered, Forestry Land Scotland, in Golspie, receiving a Wildfire Talk and a Telecare Road Show Event, promoting the available Tele Care Equipment and the SFRS, Home Fire Safety Referral process, all of these events and engagement sessions attend are delivered to educate and promote all aspects of Community Safety within Sutherland.



A highly successful five-day Fire Skills Course has been delivered in Dornoch Community Fire Station, attended by twelve S3 to S5 pupils from Dornoch Academy, resulting in an employability award being awarded.



13. Glossary of Terms

Term - What it means

ADF

Accidental Dwelling Fire.

HFSV

Home Fire Safety Visit.

PDIR

Post Domestic Incident Response, a term used to indicate actions taken following attendance at a fire or other incident in the home. PDIRs include amongst things the offer of a free follow up home fire safety visit.

RTC

Road Traffic Collision.

Special Service

Calls to incidents which are not fires or false alarms such as RTCs, rescues, flooding, incidents involving hazardous materials or the provision of assistance to other agencies.

UFAS

Unwanted Fire Alarm Signals. When an automatic fire detection and alarm system is activated as a result of anything other than an actual fire the activation is classed as a false alarm. If an attendance is made to such an event by the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service, then the event is recorded as an UFAS incident.

UFAS Policy Change

In response to COVID, on the 6th May 2020, the SFRS decided to send 1 pump to UFAS premises that did not have their own Predetermined attendance (PDA).

As of 1st July 2023, the COVID interim 1 pump response was ended and a new UFAS policy was implemented.

The new policy is to call challenge all UFAS incidents with the intention of non-attendance. Hospitals, care homes, and sleeping risk premises are all exempt and receive either 2 pumps or their premise specific PDA.
