

Children who will be five on or before 28 February 2026 are eligible to be enrolled for Primary 1 starting August 2025.
Enrolment will take place in the week commencing 27 January 2025.

Which children are automatically admitted to primary school?

Only children whose fifth birthday falls between 1 March 2025 and the last day of February 2026 will automatically be admitted to Primary 1 in August 2025.

What is deferred entry?

If your child's birthday falls between 19 August 2025 and the end of February 2026 (e.g., still 4 years old on the school start date in August 2025) you are entitled to defer entry to primary school. If you believe your child is not ready for school, you should discuss this with your child's Early Learning and Childcare setting. When do I enrol my child for school?

If your child is due to start school in August 2025, they should be enrolled at their catchment area primary school. Please complete the online form at <http://www.highland.gov.uk/enrol>.

Local newspaper advertisements issued in January each year provide full details on how to enrol your child.

Which is my catchment school?

Each school has a defined geographical catchment area (except for denominational and some Gaelic Medium schools) and normally your child will attend your local catchment area primary school. School catchment maps are available online, you can search for your nearest schools at https://www.highland.gov.uk/downloads/download/678/school_catchment_maps

Can I request a school other than my catchment school?

You may make a placing request for your child to attend a school other than your catchment school. Information on placing requests can be found on the website ... https://www.highland.gov.uk/info/878/schools/887/enrol_your_child_for_school/2.

It is important, however, that your child is registered at their catchment area school in advance of making a placing request application.

Please note too that if a placing request is granted, transport is the responsibility of parents.



What are the arrangements for starting school?

Primary 1 pupils should attend the full infant day from the start of the school session in August 2025.

Head Teachers will ensure that local arrangements are communicated to parents at the earliest opportunity.

How can I get Additional Support for my child?

If your child requires a special diet for school meals, please follow this link to our website

<https://www.highland.gov.uk/specialdiet> . Parents/carers can click on the 'request a special diet for a pupil' box and can progress without an account. If necessary, please provide a packed lunch for your child until your request has been approved by the Special Diets Team, who will contact you directly in due course. Requests normally take 2 weeks to process but may be longer at busier periods. **Please be aware that submitting your request at least 2 months before your child starts in school will result in a quicker response.**

Once submitted the form will go to the special diet team to be approved. The information is then communicated to the catering, Early Years and education staff where appropriate as well as the relevant special diet menu distributed if needed.

Free School Meals and Assistance with School Clothing

Bilingualism and Gaelic Medium Education

Dà-chànanas agus Foghlam tron Ghàidhlig

Gaelic Medium Education is acknowledged through practice and research as a way of ensuring that children learn to speak Gaelic and reap the benefits of being bilingual from an early age. It is available to children from both Gaelic and non-Gaelic speaking homes. Enrolment to Gaelic Medium Education can take place at Primary 1 stage and in some circumstances at Primary 2, or thereafter, between Gaelic medium primary schools/departments. The Highland Council is a leading Local Authority and amongst the largest providers of Gaelic Medium Education nationally. Gaelic Medium Education represents one of the best means of reversing the decline of Gaelic in the Highlands, especially if it is supported by opportunities for young people to use Gaelic in the home and community. The Council is committed to continuing to develop Gaelic Medium Education in pre-school and primary schools, as well as expanding Gaelic Medium Education in the secondary sector. Gaelic Medium Education is provided in 20 primary schools across the Council area (detailed below). We also continue to develop Gaelic Learning through English Medium Education, through the provision of a Primary Language Learning programme. Gaelic Medium subject teaching and Gaelic language courses, for both fluent speakers and/or learners are offered in a total of 19 secondary schools. The Gaelic Medium Education map on our website (www.highland.gov.uk/info/878/schools/18/gaelic_medium_education) provides information regarding all provision across the Highlands. In addition, we also provide support for parents and other learners in communities through a coordinated system of adult tuition, including a progressive tuition plan.
